

Paul, the aged Jew preacher who had been con fined in Rome's dungeon for many years, was iteheaded yesterday by order of Caesar.

This man was arrested in Jerusalem 8 year's ago on charges of inciting a riot and defiling the Jewish Temple. After two trials at Caesaria, Paul appealed his case to Caesar's court at Rome and was brought here to stand trial.

Last week Paul came before the court once more and was sentenced to die. The Jews have been giving the Empire much trouble lately and Caesar has little patience with them. Paul tried to tell the court about one Jesus whom he claim rose from the dead, but the court had no time to listen to such fables from this old Jew, and the trial was quickly over.

Paul had no attorney appearing for him and only one or two friends in the whole court room. Asked if he had any statement to make before his execution. Paul said:
