"Dear Mother of God." There certainly was nothing sacrilegious in their utterances. They were praying sincerely with all the faith they could muster.
Besides being stupid this disqualification was unjust to the Bronte cast. Those who had seen the play said it was the best ever produced by Bronte High School. The kids in the cast and crew had gone far beyond the usual amount of time and effort in perfecting their performance and everybody thought they had a sure winner.

Paul tried to tell the court about one Jesus whom he claim rose from the dead, but the court had no time to listen to such fables from this old Jew, and the trial was quickly over.

Paul had no attorney appearing for him and only one or two friends in the whole court room. Asked if he had any statement to make before his execution, Paul said:
"I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand."
