prise will be suspended next week in order for staff members to have a short vacation. There will be no Observer dated July 3 and no Enterprise dated July 4.

Weekly newspapers worked a long time to get the Texas Legislature to pass a law allowing them to take off a couple of weeks each year. The new law provides that a weekly newspaper may retain its legal status with the publication of 50 issues during a calenyear. Formerly, in order for a newspaper to be classified as a legal publication, it had to publish 52 issues each year.

We hope you miss our papers next week, but we also feel sure you will understand everyone needs a few days off once in awhile. Even though we went 24 years without missing an issue, it is a desirable thing to do.
