Tom Carlisle Has His 90th Birthday

Tom A. Carlisle celebrated his 90th birthday on July 4.

The longtime Blackwell merchant moved to Blackwell in 1908 and opened a "Country Store" with his brother-in-law, C. H. Bolin. In 1916 he bought his partner's interest and for many years he and his late wife, "Miss Martha," operated the "Country Store" which was known far and wide, selling items for every member of the family, plus groceries.

Mr. Carlisle is still active and uses same old location as the office for the Blackwell Water Cop, an organization he helped found in 1955 to provide water for the City of Blackwell. He remains on the board of directors.

Mr. Carlisle served as mayor of Blackwell almost six years. He has been a member of the Blackwell United Methodist Church since 1908 and has taught a Sunday School class all these years and is still a teacher. He has been a member of the Hylton Masonic Lodge since 1912.

Mr. Carlisle and his wife, who died Sept. 4, 1974, have one son, Tom G. Carlisle, of Yoakum.

Mr. Carlisle helped organize the Nolan County Welfare Board in 1932, the first such board to be organized in the United States. Records show the board was created June 13, 1932, very soon after the Texas Legislature authorized commissioners' courts to create such boards.

When the U. S. Congress passed the Social Security Act in 1935, some funds were made available for Child Welfare Services and records show that Nolan County Commissioners' Court and the City of Sweetwater voted to provide funds to employ a child welfare workers, thus establishing a Childfare Office in Sweetwater. Mr. Carlisle was chairman of the board at that time.

Mr. Carlisle remained on the Child Welfare Board until he resigned in 1952. He continued to serve as a member of the Nolan County Welfare Board until July 5, 1975, when he planned to resign after 43 years of service.

Mr. Carlisle is the oldest member of the Blackwell United Methodist Church, but is next to the oldest person in Blackwell, as George Russell is 92.

All of Mr. Carlisle's friends wished him a "Happy 90th Birthday" on July 4 with many happy returns.

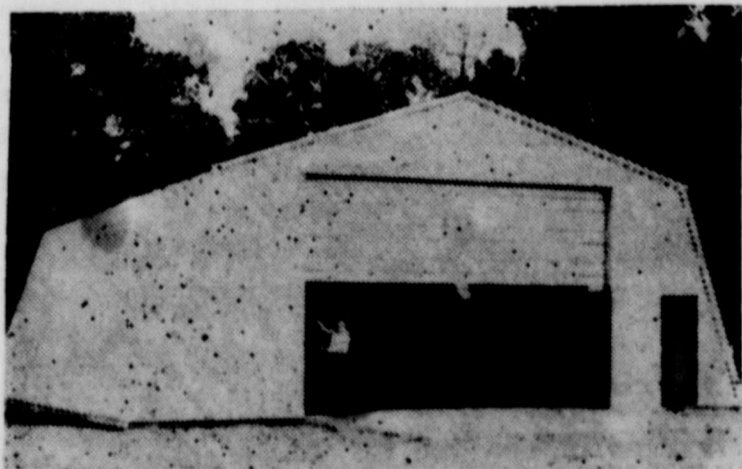
