The Federal Land Use Bill which has been in committee and was voted down is of particular interest to farmers and ranchers of West Texas. Horace L. In view of the interest you have heretofore expressed in opposition to Federal Land Use Planning Legislation, I am pleased to advise that the House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs has today voted down the Federal Land Use Bill and laid on the table a motion to reconsider. This action ordinarily would spell the doom of the legislation. For many reasons with which you are familiar, it is hoped that this is the case: but no relaxation of vigilance on the part of those of you who are fully aware of the adverse effect of such legislation is warranted.
