The total enrollment included 609, the largest enrollment in the school's history. The largest segment of the school's enrollment came from Texas, but there were students from Oklahoma, Arkansas, California, New York, New Jersey, Illinois, Missouri, Tennessee, Florida, Colorado, New Mexico and Arizona.

The reception was held at Las Brisas Inn in San Angelo.

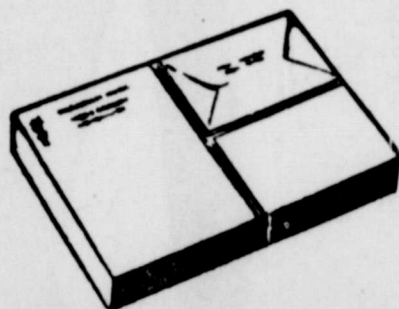
