HOME CANNING LIDS BEING DISTRBUTED

Home canning lids are being distributed through the mail by Goodwill Industries and the Commerce Department. The address is Goodwill Industries of Minneapolis, 3800 Washinton Avenue North, Minnesota 55412.

A check or money order in the amount of \$5.00 will cover the cost of nine dozen lids (\$4.00 and mailing \$1.00). The sender should also enclose a self-addressed stamped envelope for return of the check or money order if the supply is exhausted. There is a limit of one order per household.

Homemakers should order lids only if needed for this year's canning season. Two or three homemakers may want to share an order to avoid over buying.

Next year's supply should be adequate as manufacturer's are "catching up."
