## Last Rites Held for Cortez Harmon

Cortez (Bud) Harmon, 46, of San Angelo, died about 7:40 a.m. Sunday in Shannon Hospital of injuries he sustained in an automobile accident around 8:30 p.m. Saturday in San Angelo. The accident occurred in the 1300 block of Bryant Boulevard North when an auto traveling south in the northbound lane was involved in a collision with the Welex Company car Harmon was driving as he was returning home from work. According to police reports, the impact of the collision knocked Harmon's vehicle backwards 109 feet.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Monday in Johnson's Funeral Home chapel in San Angelo with the Rev. Alvin Lay of the New Testament Baptist Church and the Rev. Jimmy Rogers of the Grace Temple Baptist Church officiating. Graveside rites were held at 4 p.m. at the Paint Creek Cemetery.

He was born Sept. 23, 1929, in Paint Creek community near Robert Lee and grew up there. He was a graduate of Robert Lee High School and after graduation, served in the Coast Guard for 4½ years. He was an engineer at Welex division of Halliburton at the time of his death and had been employed by Welex 20 years.

He was married to Olean Milligan June 16, 1951, in Robert Lee. They had made their home in San Angelo the past 20 years. He was a member of the New Testament Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Teresa Harmon, 16, and Betsy Harmon, 15, both of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. R. Several months ago the Board of Trustees entered into a study of the consumption of energy, the utilization of school facilities and the acceptable use of school equipment.

The application of this study has broad implications. For many years the students of the Bronte Schools have been encouraged and trained to be non-wasteful, to preserve property and equipment, and to be accountable not only for those things personal but for those things public. The management of student affairs is considered by school officials to be a controlled situation. The general public presents a different picture.

Bronte has been somewhat of a forerunner in the community-school concept. It has always been a blending agent, sometimes being the hub for the many spokes of activities and group interest. When it had a need of any

It opened many doors to the community. It was the solidifier of many fine relationships and it helped the community to accept the importance of education, and it gave the average citizen the feeling that he was an important part of the school community.

Into this scene of years of compatibility and near tranquility, crept some words that are distasteful to most of us — inflation and accountability.

Excessive costs and limited revenues have required new managerial practices.

Adults who desire the use of school facilities and equipment must first clear with school officials. Adult athletic teams must practice and play as a team if lights, air conditioning, or heating are used. Practice sessions need to be limited in number.

Some equipment will not be for loan to the general public because

of its value and priority status. Other adjustments will be made as the need arises.

The identification of the Bronte School as a community school has not changed. With the help and cooperation of the community, it is just adjusting to meet the needs of these times.

It seems the school is powerless to overcome inflation, but school officials can attempt to operate a school program effectively that is affected by inflation.

Dedicated school people should always want to account for each dollar spent, the utilization of each facility, and the care and maintenance of each piece of equipment. All these things can be done and the community can continue to be an important part of the school.

Communication lines need to remain open. If anyone in the community has a need with which the school might help, he should contact the school administration.

# Longhorns Squeak By Menard In Thriller, 27-25

The Bronte Longhorns kept local fans on the edge of their seats right down to the final play of the game as they defeated a bunch of Yellowjackets at Menard last Friday night 27-25. It was an exciting, wide open game with a lot of offense and little defense.

The Longhorns trailed at the end of the first half 18-13, but came back in the final two quarters for two TD's to Menard's one to take the win. But it took a last minute stand by the defense to preserve the victory as Menard drove deep into Longhorn territory only to see a field goal on the final play of the game come up short.

The win kept the Horns' season record at 3-0 and may have been just what they needed before they start district play this week.

### First Quarter

The Longhorns received the opening kickoff with Turney Coulter returning it to his own 10 back to the Menard 49. With the help of a 15 yard personal foul penalty, the Horns moved the ball to the Jacket 20 yard line only to give it up on downs.

Menard went right to work and 11 plays later had racked up the first TD of the night. A pass try on the extra point was no good and the Yellowjackets had a 6-0 lead.

Nelson Coulter carried the kickoff back to his own 38. Three plays later Wayne Coalson punted to the Menard 20 with a return to the 33. The Horns' defense got tough and Menard punted with Joe Bob Ragdale returning the kick 5 yards to his 37.

From the 37, the Longhorns moved steadily downfield with N. Coulter, T. Coulter and Kervin Denton getting good yardage. The 1st quarter ended with the Horns having a 4th and 5 at the Menard 16.

### Second Quarter

The Longhorns kept the drive alive when N. Coulter completed a 12 yard pass to his brother, T. Coulter, on the 4. T. Coulter got 2 yards and then Denton got the final 2 bring the score to 6-6. The EP was no good.

Clint Porter kicked off and Menard put the ball in play on their own 32. The Horns held and the Jackets punted to the Bronte 15. Denton gained 6 and N. Coulter 5 for a 1st. Another 1st down and the Longhorns were forced to punt. Menard was stopped on their 15 but Bronte drew a 15 yard penalty to move the ball out to the 30. On the first play, Keith Eubanks recovered a loose ball on the Menard 40.

It took N. Coulter one play to get the ball into the end zone as he weaved his way 40 yards for the TD. Denton kicked the EP and Bronte had a 13-6 lead. Menard returned the kickoff to

the Bronte 49. Four plays later the Jackets had narrowed the score to 13-12. The EP again was no good.

Following the kickoff the Longhorns coughed up the ball and Menard was in great shape at the Bronte 38. The Longhorn defense got tough and Menard was faced with a 4th and 6 at the 16. The next play was disaster for the Longhorns, however, as Menard not only got the 1st down but also the TD to again take the lead, 18-13, with the EP once again no good.

The Horns and Jackets exchanged pass interceptions as the first half ended.

### Third Quarter

Porter kicked off to Menard to begin the second half and the Jackets put the ball in play on their own 31. Following a 15 yard penalty for clipping, N. Coulter picked off a Menard pass at his 35 and returned it to the Bronte 47.

The Coulter boys and Denton picked up two 1st downs and an 11 yard pass completion to Ragdale set the Longhorns up at the Menard 15. Then disaster struck as Menard picked off an N. Coulter pass at the 2. Joy was short lived for Menard, however, as Bobby Frazee recovered a loose ball at the 12. Then with a 4th and 1 from the 3, Denton carried it in for 6 points. The EP was no good and Bronte once again led 19-18.

Menard returned Porter's kickoff to their 30. A 50 yard pass play was rubbed out by a holding penalty and the Yellowjackets were forced to punt. A 15 yard screen pass to T. Coulter set the Horns up on the Menard 44. Then N. Coulter hit T. Coulter for 10 more and Denton broke loose for 18 to move the ball to the 16. Then N. Coulter found Randy Parker in the end zone where he made a good catch for 6 more points. A fake kick and a pass from Coulter to Coulter gave the Horns 2 extra points and a 27-18 lead with the 2nd quarter drawing to a close. Menard completed a 52 yard pass to the Bronte 10 yard line as the period ended.

### Fourth Quarter

The Horns' defense again got tough for three downs only to see the Jackets complete a 4th down pass for the TD. This time the EP kick was good and the Horns' lead was cut to 27-25.

Following the kickoff the Horns were forced to punt with Coalson punting dead at the Menard 10. Three plays later Menard punted it back. Bronte couldn't move and once again Coalson was called on to punt. Menard completed one pass to the Bronte 44 and then T. Coulter intercepted a pass attempt at the Bronte 34 with 4 minutes left to go in the ball game.

After a 15 yard holding penalty and three unsuccessful running attempts, Coalson once again got off a good punt to the Menard 40. With excitement building with each play, the Jackets completed a 40 yard pass for what appeared to be the winning TD, only to have it wiped out by a clipping penalty. Only 40 seconds remained on the clock. With the ball at the 39, Menard picked up 2 yards running and then threw two incomplete passes to bring up 4th down. A 4th down pass went incomplete, but Bronte was called for interference at the 15 and Menard had another chance. First down pass went incomplete and with one second showing on the clock an attempted field goal went awry and the Longhorns had their third straight victory, 27-25.

Besides those already mentioned other Longhorns who played important roles in the win were Paul Cervinka, Mark Lee, Kyle Lee, Eddie Angel, Darron Koenig, Johnny Hibbs, Eliseo Sanchez, Randy Leigh, Donald Butler, Kevin Gibbs and Mario Gonzales.
