District Attorney Dickey Resigns

Frank Dickey Jr. will end 12 1/2 years as 51st District Attorney, which includes part of the district work in San Angelo, as well as Coke County.

Dickey is a Coke County native and was appointed to the DA post in 1963 and elected in 1964, 1968 and 1972.

He also served as Coke County Attorney before moving to San Angelo.

Gerald Fehn of Uvalde has been appointed by Gov. Dolph Briscoe to take Dickey's place.

Dickey graduated from Ballinger High School in 1943 and served in the U. S. Marine Corps during World War II. After his discharge he completed his pre-law work at Yale and Baylor universities.

He graduated from Baylor Law School in June 1952 and was admitted to the bar two months later.

Dickey plans to devote all of his time to private practice and will maintain his offices in San Angelo and Robert Lee.

OIL NEWS

Coke County drew two locations for wildcats and a confirmer recently.

R. L. Burns Corp. of Dallas will drill a 7,200 foot wildcat 13 miles northwest of Robert Lee, 1/2 mile north of the depleted one well FP (Pennsylvanian) field and 3/4 mile southwest of the Lygay, South (Strawn) field. It is the No. 1-72 Blanks.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 2,310 feet from the west lines of Section 72, Block 2, H&TTC Survey. Ground elevation is 2,080 feet.

The discovery, Pan American Petroleum Corp (now Amoco Production Co.) No. 1 Foster S. Price, was finalized April 16, 1968, for 202 barrels of 44.3 gravity oil with gas oil ratio of 1,230-1.

Exxon Corp. will drill the No. 37 R. H. Harris Estate as a 6,640 foot wildcat six miles northwest of Robert Lee and 3/4 mile southeast of the I-A-B. South Field.

A directional hole, surfaced location is 500 feet from the northeast and 1,300 feet from the northwest lines and bottomhole location is 575 feet from the northwest and 3,300 feet from the northeast lines of Carlos Flores No. 1003.

Sojourner Drilling Corp. of Abilene will drill the No. 2-A R. E. Hickman Estate as a 933 foot south and slightly west offset to its I-A Hickman Estate, current lone producer in the Wendkirk, North (Cisco 3700) field, eight miles southwest of Bronte.

Location is 4,400 feet south of the northwest corner in James W. Davidge No. 967 1/2. Contract depth is 3,800 feet.

The District Food Show is planned for Feb. 17, 1976 and the County Food and Project Show will be January 31.



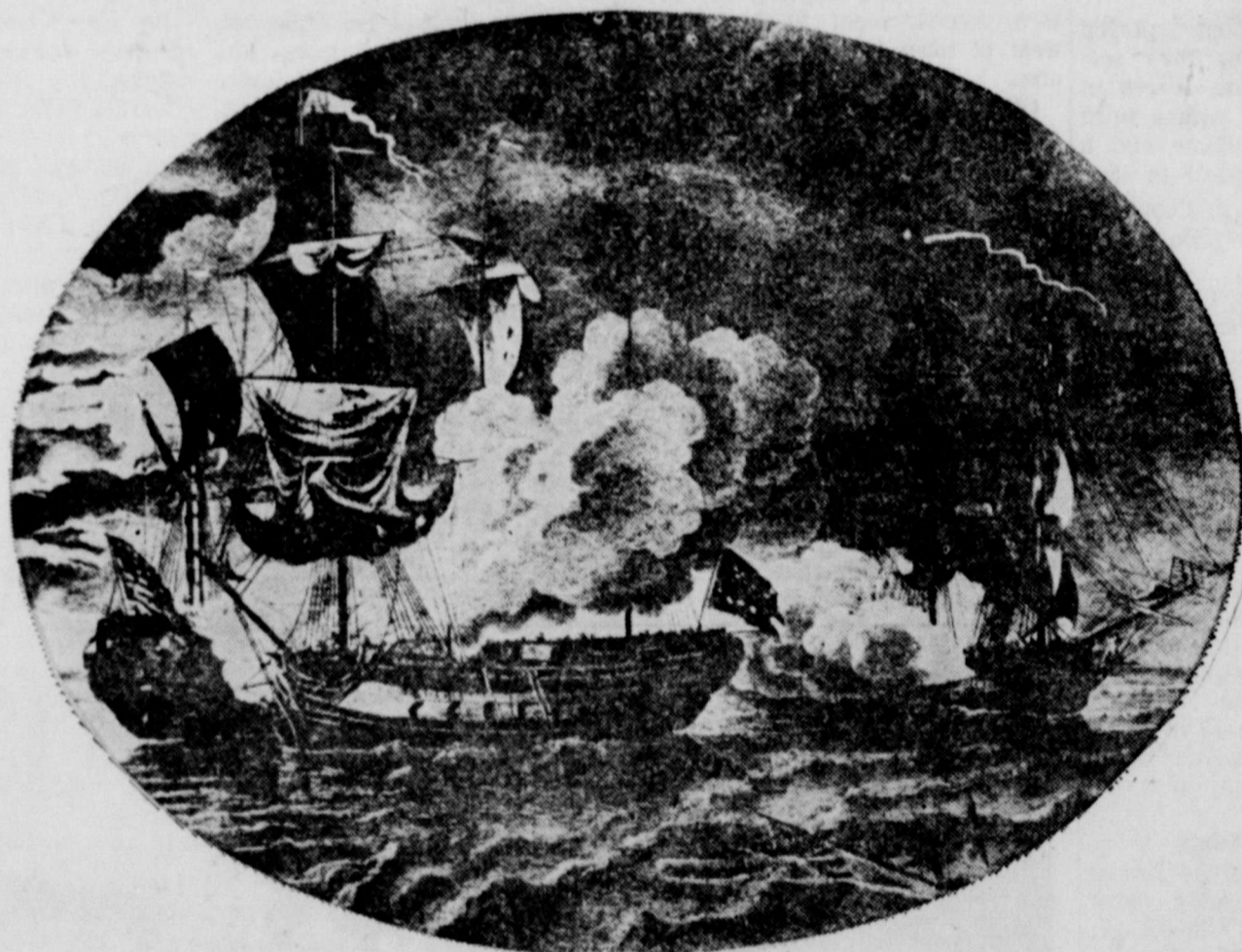

August sales of Series E and H United Savings Bonds in Coke County were reported this week by County Bond Chairman G. C. Allen of Robert Lee at \$1,541. Sales for the eight month period totaled \$28,282 for 94 per cent of the 1975 sales goal of \$30,000.

Texans purchased \$21,075.759 in Savings Bonds during the month for an increase of 12.9 per cent over the same period last year. Year to date sales amounted to \$162,055.315 with 69 per cent of the yearly sales goal of \$234.3 million.

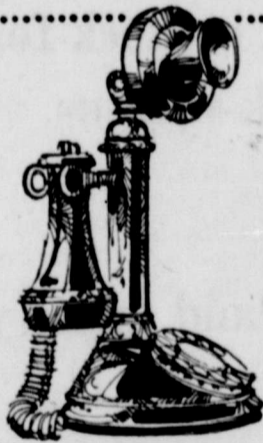
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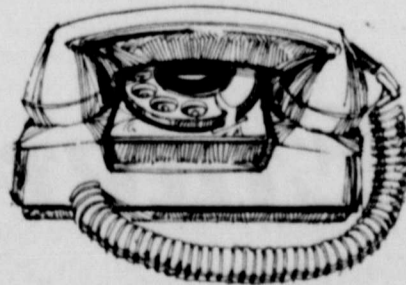

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Horns Bury Sands, 31-7

The Bronte Longhorns built up a 12-7 halftime lead and then broke loose for 19 points in the final quarter to whip the Sands Mustangs 31-7 in a district game played here last Friday night. It was the second straight district win for the Horns and their fifth straight of the season.

Longhorn quarterback Nelson Coulter led his teammates in the win. He scored three touchdowns, while Kerwin Denton and Billy Ren Lee had the other counters. Wayne Coalson kicked one extra point. Numerous other Longhorns also figured in the win as the defense looked good and the offense had enough zip to reach their highest point total of the season.

First Quarter

N. Coulter received the opening kickoff and returned it 20 yards to his 35. With Turney Coulter doing most of the ball carrying, the Longhorns used 11 plays and less than five minutes to put the first points on the board. T. Coulter was helped along by a 15 yard run by N. Coulter for a 1st down on a 4th down play, Denton went

the final two yards for the score. Denton's try for the extra point was no good and Bronte led 6-0.

Following Clint Porter's kickoff the Mustangs drew two penalties and were forced to punt. A clipping penalty moved the ball back to the Horns' 16. The Longhorns began another drive with Denton picking up 6 yards, N. Coulter 5 and 18, and T. Coulter 5, to move the ball out to the 46 yard line. A pass completion to Coalson was rubbed out by a 15 yard clipping penalty. Then Sands intercepted an N. Coulter pass to stop the drive and take over at the Longhorn 31 as the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Following three running plays the Mustangs faced a 4th and 1 when their punter kept for 12 yards and a 1st at the 10. Two plays lost 2 yards but a 3rd down pass went for six points and the EP kick was good, and Sands took a 7-6 lead.

Bronte was unable to move after the kickoff and Coalson punted out of bounds at the Sands 15 yard line. They almost broke the first play all the way but were finally pulled down at the Longhorn 44. The Horns' defense got tough there and three plays later Sands punted dead on the Longhorn 3 yard line.

The Horns were unable to move and Coalson, punting from his own end zone, got off a fine punt that rolled dead at the Sands 47. Bronte once again held and a bad snap on 4th down turned the ball over to the Horns on the Sands 44. It took the Longhorns one play to go all the way as N. Coulter weaved his way 44 yards on a beautiful run to put the locals back in the lead 12-7. The EP try was no good.

Following Porter's kickoff the Mustangs picked up one 1st down before N. Coulter picked off a pass at his own 26. He lost 4 yards on his first carry but picked up a big 24 as the first half ended with the Horns leading 12-7.

Third Quarter

Sands received the second half kickoff and began a good drive which moved from their 31 to the Bronte 13. Then Kevin Gibbs got in front of a would be receiver to intercept and give the Horns the ball at their own 4 yard line. N. Coulter carried three times for a 1st at the 15. Three plays picked up no yardage and once again Coalson was called on to kick from deep in his own territory. The punt carried to midfield where Sands took over.

Sands once again threatened, picking up a 1st down at the 39 and then completing a long pass to the Horns' 9. Three running plays picked up 3 yards and a 4th down pass went incomplete and the Longhorn defense had held once again.

Following two running plays and a clipping penalty the Horns were faced with a 3rd and 12 at the 4. A quick kick carried out to the Bronte 42 where Sands was once again in good field position. Two plays later the quarter ended with the Mustangs on the 38.

Fourth Quarter

The Horns' defense again got tough and held with Bronte taking over at their 36. N. Coulter picked up 3 and Sands was penalized 5. Then Denton broke loose on a fine run of 26 yards to set the Horns up at the Sands 30. N. Coulter carried for another 1st at the 15 and then kept for the final 15 yards to increase Bronte's lead to 18-7. A pass try for the EP was no good.

Following the kickoff Sands drew two 5 yard penalties and faced a 3rd and 9 when Denton picked off a Mustang pass and returned it deep into Sands territory. However, the Longhorns drew a 15 yard penalty and when Coach Gerald Sandusky protested loudly, they

were given 15 more yards for unsportsmanlike conduct. The Horns now had the ball at their own 41. The walkoffs seemed to fire up the Horns and following two carries by Denton and a 15 yard penalty against Sands, Lee carried the final 10 yards for the TD to move the score to 24-7. The EP pass try once again was no good.

Bronte drew a 15 yard personal foul penalty on the kickoff and Sands put the ball in play at their own 47. Two plays picked up 3 yards. Then Coalson picked off a Mustang pass and returned it to the Sands 40.

N. Coulter picked up a 1st at the 26 before the Mustangs recovered a loose ball. On their first play Sands fumbled with Coalson once again coming up with the ball at the Mustang 21. Lee picked up 1 and Denton 7 before N. Coulter again swept around left end to go 14 yards for the final score of the night. Coalson this time added the EP to make the score 31-7.

Sands ran two plays following the kickoff before the Longhorns recovered another fumble. They ran one play before the final gun sounded with the Longhorns the victors 31-7.

Turning in good defensive jobs were N. Coulter, Coalson, Denton, Paul Ceryenka, Mark Lee, Jimmy Tidwell and Randy Leigh. Almost all the Longhorn saw some action and did a creditable job.
