## UIL Places Horns In New District

University Interscholastic powers have more than a little changed the football setup for Bronte next year. Bronte changes from District 3-B to to District 6-B which will move most district games to the east. The new district for the Horns now contains 11 teams, which will require zoning it in half and having a playoff at the end of the season to determine the District 6-B champion.

Supt. C. B. Barbee and Coach Gerald Sandusky attended a meeting Monday night to work out details of the new arrangement for the 1976 football season.

District 6-B has been split into west and east zones. Naturally, Bronte is in the west zone, along with Irion County (Merizon), Santa Anna, Eden, Miles and Richland Springs.

The Longhorns will come up

against these teams in 1976 to see who wins the West Zone championship.

Five teams will make up the East Zone of District 6-B, including Blanket, Evant, Gorman, Lometa and Rising Star.

The new arrangement will give the Longhorns five district games to play, excluding the district playoff which is scheduled for Nov. 12.

Denton gained 2, Lee 0, and Coulter 1 to bring up 4th and 7. Coulter then found Randy Parker alone in the end zone for 6 more points and the Horns had an early 12-0 lead. The EP kick once again was no good.

Porter's kickoff put the Lions in a hole as it went to the 10 yard line with no return. The Lions picked up one 1st down and had the ball at the 25 as the quarter ended.

Roby then picked up two more 1st downs before Parker stepped in front of a Lion receiver for an interception at the Longhorn 22. Three running plays lost 2 yards and Wayne Coalson got off a good punt to the Roby 38.

Roby was forced to kick and three plays later the Horns' Coalson once again punted with the Lions getting the ball at Bronte's 49. Roby picked up one 1st down and faced with a 4th and 6 attempted to make a 1st by passing. Coalson stepped in front of the receiver and 75 yards later had put 6 more points on the Longhorn side of the scoreboard. Denton also kicked the EP and the Horns had a 19-0 lead with only a short time left in the half. Three plays after the kickoff the half ended.

## Second Half

Bronte received the second half kickoff and put the ball in play at their 23. Three plays netted 9 yards to bring up 4th and 1. Coalson got off a poor punt which carried only to the Horns 46. The defense played it tough and Roby once again was forced to punt, with the Horns taking over at the 18. Lee picked up 3 and a Coulter to Coalson pass netted a 1st down.

The Horns proceeded to pick up two more 1st downs before being forced to punt with the kick carrying to the Roby 36. The Lions then started their only scoring drive of the night. A completed pass with a penalty tacked on carried them to the Horn 39. Another completed pass moved the ball to the 19. Six straight running plays netted the TD to cut the score to 19-6. The EP try was no good.

The Roby kickoff man almost completely missed the ball and the Horns took over on the Roby 43. The Horns failed to pick up a 1st and Coalson once again got off a fine punt that was killed at the 11 yard line. The Lions picked up 1sts at the 11 and 36. Two passes went incomplete and a third picked up 7 to bring up the 4th down at the Roby 43. With time running out the Lions tried for the 1st down but were stopped short and the Horns took over at the 43.

Lee picked up 4 yards and Coulter 5 before Denton made a 1st at the 31. Then on 1st down Coulter surprised everyone by hitting Parker for 31 yards and the TD. Denton's kick was good and the Horns led 26-6.

Following the kickoff Roby completed passes good for 20, 13 and 12 yards to place the ball on the Longhorn 23 as the game ended.

Outstanding play was turned in by the entire Longhorn defensive team.

## Board Accepts Bid of Austin Firm

The Bronte School board of trustees accepted a bid of \$16,092 for a special education building when they met Oct. 14. The bid was submitted by Noble W. Walker of Austin. A provision in the contract with the Walker firm calls for approval by the Texas Education Agency before it becomes effective.

The new building will house special programs of the school such as remedial reading, and the federal government will pay \$7,763 toward building and equipping the new facility.

In other business at the board meeting the trustees:

\* Authorized borrowing operational money from the First National Bank in Bronte for the completion of the period until tax money starts coming in Oct. 1.

\* Approved to participate in the program of the District XV Education Service Center's program on drug abuse and crime prevention. The State Legislature has allowed 90 cents per ADA on this program.

\* Agreed to install a Coke machine which will be under the supervision of the Student Council.

\* Agreed to sell an electric welder which is officially advertised in this week's Enterprise.

\* Reviewed a recent opinion of the attorney general which prohibits the school from requiring a student from paying for any materials or services. Barbee said the ruling might cause some band uniforms to get a bit unkempt, as students are required to pay for the cleaning of their uniforms.

\* Agreed to go along with state

and national designations on the time schedule which will return everyone to Standard Time next Sunday morning.

\* Reviewed scholastic eligibility of cheerleaders, twirlers, band members and members of athletic teams.

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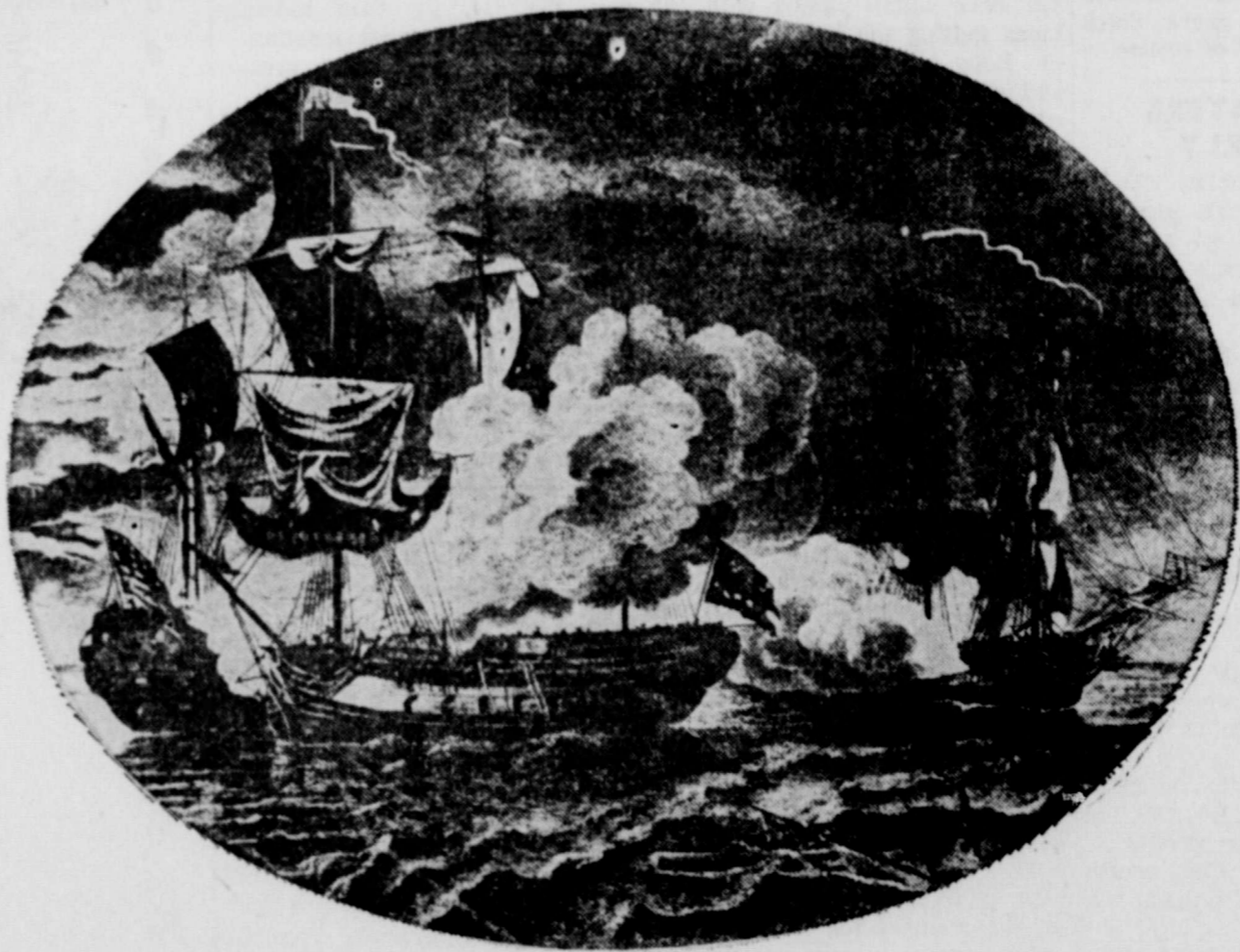

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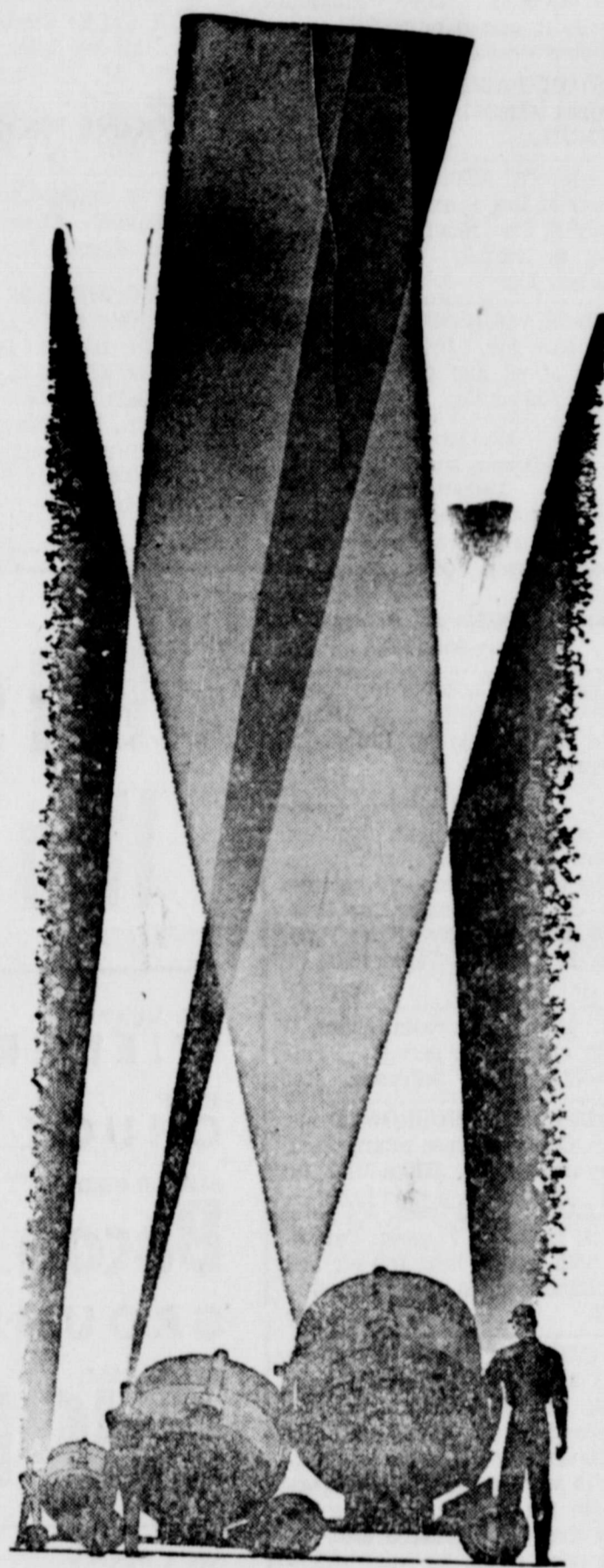
