sales averaged \$262 in receipts—a total of more than \$17,000 for the day, according to the Chamber of Commerce. Also, the city-wide event added almost \$13,000 to the usual daily sales volume of local retail stores and restaurants.

Bargain hunters invade city Saturday

They came by the hundreds in pickups, campers, suburbans and cars; all seeking, all searching for that coveted treasure - a BARGAIN!

People from Dimmitt, Hart and Nazareth joined by flocks of people from all over the Panhandle packed the city's streets Saturday, making Dimmitt's first city - wide garage sale a smashing success that exceeded the expectations of every-

"We gave out 1,500 maps, but there were usually several people in each group, so there's really no way to tell just how many people were actually here," said Delores Heller, Chamber of Commerce Director.

"I was super pleased with the way it turned out. The weather cooperated and people turned out from other towns. It was a good, fun day. It seemed like everyone was enjoying themselves."

"Overall it was a big success," said Walter Linville, chairman of the Retail Merchants Committee. "It just goes to show what we can accomplish if we work together and support our home town."

Almost \$30,000 was raised during the garage sale and several retail merchants reported greatly expanded business Saturday, including C.R. Anthony, Co., who more than doubled its usual Saturday sales.

"I was pleased with how the sale

went," said David Cummings, manager of Anthony's. "We had approximately 300 customers during the day. We did very well."

"We were surprised at how well the garage sale benefited the retail businesses," said a member of the

Merchant's Commitee. Restaurants in town experienced larger-than-usual lunch hour rushes and were pleased with the success of the sale.

Dairy Queen set an all-time record Saturday, selling about 50% more than the previous record, according to manager Curtis Ritchie.

"It was like a tornado hit us," Ritchie said. "We weren't prepared for the crowds we had. I feel like



Corn prices take upward turn

"We have a bona fide bull market on corn," Bill Clark of Dimmitt Agri Industries said Tuesday. "It wouldn't be out of the realm of reasoning to see it (corn price) go to \$5," he added.

Clark said dry conditions in the midwest and a continuing hot and dry forecast for that area had caused active trading on the Chicago Board.

Daily trading had been up the limit for three days running, causing the Chicago Board of trade to raise the contract trading limit from ten to fifteen cents per bushel Tuesday.

Clark said that Dimmitt Agri had made a contract for \$4.80/cwt on some corn to be delivered next fall.

Clark said that prices are up on soy beans and wheat also.

Carl King, president of Texas Corn Growers Association, said that there are several factors, other than weather conditions in the midwest,

which could be contributing to the current hike in corn prices. The current export enhancement, the drop in the value of the dollar and the volume of corn being produced are all factors that weigh into the corn

King said that corn prices could be riding on the coattails of higher soy

bean prices to a certain extent. He said that it was good to see prices up for a change, but that the market could be as changeable as the weather.

Clark said that a rain in the midwest could cause a sharp drop in corn

prices, but that it would not cause a disaster.

With four months to go before harvest, a great many changes can take place in the corn market. For now, area corn farmers will probably be watching the weather in the midwest as closely as they watch the forecasts here.

the story goes, a farmer unearthed historic artifact. But the farmer re-

mission. Acting on a warrant from the state, the sheriff "arrested" the artifact and held it in the Hockley County Jail until the case could be resolved in the courts.

Fortunately, there's been no such dilemma over ownership of Castro County's mammoth skull-partly because it was discovered on public land (a road right - of - way), and partly because it doesn't come under the jurisdiction of the state's Antiquities Act.

"The mammoth belongs to the people of Castro County, and they will have some say about where it is exhibited," Mark Denton of the Texas Antiquities Committee said from the pit while the skull was

still being excavated.







an artist's trowel to search for evidence of teeth or a jawbone. The jawbone was missing, but one tooth was found in the skull. A row of gigantic teeth found at the same spot a year earlier by Stanley Wilcox of Hereford are assumed to have belonged to this prehistoric elephant, but that hasn't been proven yet. The exit angle of the tusks identifies the animal as a mammoth instead of a mastodon, whose tusks were more parallel.




The exposed skull, estimated to be 11,500 to 25,000 years old, shows where a tusk emerges from its skeletal cap; the two nasal cavities above the tusk-caps; an eye socket on the side of the skull; and the rather flat-topped cranium. (The ear socket is not visible). Approximately three feet of each tusk had been knocked off through the years, the archeologists said. The flat cranium and the angle of curvature of the left tusk indicate it may be an imperial mammoth-a rare find, indeed, in this area.









The property owners remarked that they would not be able to pay the estimated amount and inquired about an alternate route. Currently, the homes and church buildings (First Christian Church) use septic tanks and cesspools for waste disposal.

Alderman Don Sheffy suggested that it might be easier to go to the Eleventh Street lift station, which might not require digging as deep a trench, thus saving on expenses and enabling the city to use city personnel and equipment where possible.

Mayor Wayne Collins told the group that each property owner would have to petition the city seperately for annexation. Edwards added that single-family dwellings and the church would probably be able to come in "as is," but noted that the mobile home parks would have to meet zoning requirements.

The aldermen agreed to look into what alternatives are available and notify the property owners.

In other business, City Manager Reeford Burrous and Works Dept. Head James Killough were authorized to travel to Topeka, Kan. to look at a used scraper that the city may convert to a packer for use at the city landfill. Burrous said the estimated cost is \$7,000 plus ship-

Burrous also asked the aldermen






