The Bronte Rejects captured first place in a volleyball tournament held last week in Blackwell. The local women downed another Bronte team, the Town Clowns, 15-8 and 15-12, to win the title.

The Rejects downed Ballinger and Winters before disposing of Roby 15-13 and 15-12. Then they downed the Town Clowns 15-9 and 16-14 to drop the Clowns into the losers bracket of the double elimination tournament.

The Clowns had advanced by topping Blackwell No. 1, Highland and Tuscola. After dropping to the losers brackets after losing to the Rejects, they downed Roby 15-10, 11-15 and 16-14 to move back into the winners bracket. They downed the Rejects in the first match 15-9 and 16-14, to force another match for the titles. The Rejects were victorious in this one.

Eugene E. (Gene) Wojtek, 72, of Robert Lee, died Tuesday at 3:25 a.m. in Shannon Hospital at San Angelo after a short illness. He had been admitted to West Coke County Hospital Sunday afternoon and was transferred to Shannon Hospital early Monday night by Newby ambulance.

Services were held Wednesday at 2 p.m. in First United Methodist Church at Robert Lee with the Rev. Arthur Kendall of San Angelo officiating. Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery.

He was born July 20, 1903, in Bell County, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank C. (Anna Hruska) Wojtek. He came with his family to Coke County in January 1904. He was married to Mildred Murtishaw Oct. 12, 1932, at Robert Lee. He was a rancher and stock farmer.

He is survived by his wife; a son, Dale Wojtek of Robert Lee; a daughter, Mrs. Otho (Melba) Long of Robert Lee; three brothers, Otto Wojtek, Frank Wojtek and Victor Wojtek, all of Robert Lee; two sisters, Mrs. Tom (Leta) Wiginton of Robert Lee and Mrs. Earl D. (Inez) Nutter of Bronte; and six grandchildren.

Snake Show Plans Being Completed

Work has been underway in getting ready for the Rattlesnake Roundup which will be held March 12, 13 and 14 in the Rawlings Building next door to Sims Food Store.

Search Continues For Missing Man

Searching operations have been underway at Lake Spence since Sunday night as members of the Coke County Sheriff's Dept., CRMWD personnel, Texas Parks and Wildlife, San Angelo Emergency Corps, the Odessa Sheriff and Police Departments and others continue to search for Ernest Ray London of Odessa, who supposedly drowned late Sunday afternoon.

London, James Martin Rymer and Keith Allan Watts, also of Odessa, were reportedly out on the lake in a boat when the accident occurred around 5 p.m. Reports are that the boat had run out of gas and London disappeared in the waters after leaving to go for help.

The Coke County Sheriff's Dept. was notified by an unidentified person who was in another boat and had a CB radio.

Divers had joined in the search Wednesday and a helicopter had been called in from Odessa for an aerial watch of the lake.

Funeral services for Winifred E. Lee, 68, of Ballinger will be held Friday (today) at 10 a.m. in the Allen Davis Funeral Home Chapel in Ballinger.

Mr. Lee died at 5:20 p.m. Wednesday in Ballinger Memorial Hospital.

He was born Oct. 4, 1907, in Longview and came to Runnels County in 1921. He was married to Josephine Bains March 5, 1936, in Ballinger. They lived in the Maverick community until 1942.

Mrs. Allen died Saturday at 8:30 p.m. at West Coke County Nursing home where she had resided since Nov. 6, 1974, after suffering a broken hip in a fall at her home and undergoing surgery.

Amelia Boyce Caraway was born March 6 1881, at Gonzales, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wylie (Nannie Frances Byrd) Caraway. She came to Tom Green County in 1883 with her parents. This was five or six years before Coke County was cut out of Tom Green County and the county seat was built at Hayrick where the Caraways established a home.

She taught school in Coke County at Olga, west of Blackwell, for several years before her marriage and was always interested in education in the area.

She was married to Hawley C. Allen Sr. June 15, 1902, in the ranch home of her parents in the Hayrick community. They lived near Sherwood and at San Angelo before they returned to their ranch in Coke County in 1920. Mr. Allen died Jan. 11, 1974.

She is survived by three sons, Gerald Allen and Frank Allen, both of Robert Lee and Hawley Allen Jr. of San Angelo; two grandchildren, Bill Allen of Robert Lee and Lisa Allen of San Angelo; two great grandchildren, Mrs. J. D. (Sterling) Koehn of San Angelo and Clay Allen of Robert Lee.
