Bronte Longhorn No. 1 golf team shot a team score of 341 Thursday to capture a 67 stroke victory in the District 19-B tournament. The tourney was held at Maxwell Municipal Course in Abilene. Blackwell No. 1 finished second with a 408, while Bronte No. 2 had a 414 for third place. Hawley had a 426, Blackwell No. 2 479, and Trent 526 to round out the team scoring.

Bronte also furnished the top individual golfer with Randy Parker taking medalist honors with an 81. Jimmy Tidwell finished second with an 84. Other members of the No. 1 team were Wayne Coalsen with an 86 and Mario Gonzales and Steve Clark, both with 90's.

Donald Butler led the No. 2 team with 96. He was followed by Turney Coulter with 98, Mike Bailey and Joe Bob Ragsdale with 110 and Jeff Easterly with 117.

The district win qualifies the Longhorns to participate at the regional tournament to be held April 29 and 30 at Brownwood Country Club. The Longhorns are defending regional champions and went on to capture the 1975 state title.

ABSENTEE VOTING TO CONTINUE THRU TUESDAY, APRIL 27

Absentee voting for the May 1 Republican and Democratic Primaries will continue through Tuesday, April 27.

A check with the County Clerk's office Tuesday showed that 10 persons had voted absentee, eight on the Democratic slate and two on the Republican ballot.

Qualified voters who are over 65 years of age can vote absentee during the regular absentee voting period as well as those who will be out of the county on election day and those who are physically unable to go to the polls on election day.

Absentee votes can be cast at the County Clerk's office during regular office hours or ballots can be mailed in the county upon written application or by calling the County Clerk's office. Applications must include the voter's home address, precinct number and the reason for voting absentee. Mailed ballots must be received at the Clerk's office before 1 p.m. on election day.

Coke County has approximately 1,875 qualified voters and a large turnout is expected at the polls Saturday, May 1.

Bronte Trackmen Tops in District

Bronte Longhorn tracksters captured the 19-B District title Tuesday taking nine first places and scoring 183 team points. The meet was held at Robert Lee with six teams participating.

Hawley finished a distant second with 126½ points. Other teams and their point totals were:

Blackwell 96; Eula 45; Trent 34; Divide 9½.

The Longhorns qualified 11 individuals in eight different events plus their two relay teams for the regional meet. Brownwood will be the site of the regional meet to be held May 1.

Wayne Coalsen led the Horns by taking both the 100 and 220 yard dashes and running a leg on the 440 relay team. Coalsen's time in the 100 was 11.2 and 24.9 in the 220.

Mario Gonzales also took first in two events and set the only new record of the meet. His toss of 125 feet 8¼ inches in the discus was a new meet record. He also captured first in the shot put with 43 feet 10¼ inches.

Other first places were turned in by the Horns in the 440 yard dash won by Paul Cervenka in a time of 57.0; Nelson Coulter in the 330 yard intermediate hurdles with a time of 44.1; Randy Parker in the mile in a time of 5:17.2.

The 440 relay team made up of Robert Ball, Cervenka, N. Coulter and Kyle James had a winning time of 47.6. The mile relay team, composed of Ball, Coalsen, Cervenka and N. Coulter, finished first in 3:40.2.

Other Longhorns who finished second and qualified for the regional meet were Kerwin Denton in the shot put with a toss of 40 feet and ¾ inches; Robert Ball in the 100 in 11.3; John Hibbs in the 120 yard high hurdles in 19.2; James in the 220 in 25.6. All first and second place finishers qualify for the regional meet.

Other point makers for the Horns were Bobby Hamilton, 3rd, and Billy Hamilton, 5th, in the 880; James, 3rd in the 100; Turney Coulter, 3rd, and Eliseo Sanchez, 4th, in the 440; Hibbs, 4th, and Joe Bob Ragsdale, 6th, in the 330 intermediate hurdles; N. Coulter, 3rd, in both the discus and pole vault.
