ILLEGAL TROTLINES WILL BE CONFISCATED

Trotliners be forewarned-Texas Park and Wildlife Dopartments will confiscate all untagged, improperly tagged and illegal trotlines in pub. lic fishing waters, according to Tim Leifeste, regional information officer, and released here by R. L. Flanagan, game warden of Rob-

"The tagging requirement was initiated to alleviate this and our game wardens will be check- er at 7 lbs. and 1 channel cat at ing to see that the requirements 8 lbs. of the law are being followed. Any trotline not meeting these requirements will be removed."

The law requires that all trotlines placed in freshwater must be identified by a legible tag, constructed of a material as durable as the trotline, bearing name and address of the fisherman and the date the line was set out. All trot_ lines remaining in public waters must be redated every 90 days.
