



COKE COUNTY HAS SREWWORM CASE

By County Agent Sterling Lindsey

Coke County is now on the list of Texas counties with confirmed screwworm cases. A case was found in a baby calf on the Nolan-Coke County line near Blackwell-The sample was collected on May Hopefully, no additional cases have been found in the area.

The screwworm control officials are fearful of having another bad year in 1976. The mild winter in South and Central Texas in combination with timely rains and ear tick infestations have sustantiated their fears to date.

All operators are encouraged to submit worm samples for positive identification. This is the major means of locating infestations and for determining sterile fly place-

Also, spraying of livestock with system sprays, checking animals at regular intervals and delaying surgery where possible can be helpful to the overall program.

materials in current inventory?



Whether or not inventory is included depends on the wording hich was used on the Fire Policy. A Fire Policy covers one of three broad categories. These categories are: (1) stock, (2) furniture, fixtures and/or machinery, and (3) contents. Stock is defined as all stocks of merchandise, including packaging materials. Furniture, fixtures and/or machinery include all contents not included as the building or stock. Contents includes all property included in the definition of stock and furniture, fixtures and/or machinery. There, if the policy reads "stock" or "contents" the inventory would be covered in case of fire . . . "contents" being the most comprehensive coverage and the one most frequently used with Fire Policies.


