He was a generous man who gave his grandchildren a check every year for the lambs and wool their ewes (which he had given them to start with) produced each year. He was good and interesting company and a fine Christian gentleman.

A good citizen, friendly neighbor and loveable kinfolk like Mr. Bryan will not soon be forgotten by his many friends and relatives.

There was a rancher in South Texas who was helping his wife dye some drapes. After finishing the job, he left the vat of dye sitting out back. One of his lambs fell into the vat and turned a bright red. Soon his neighbors took notice and great numbers of people from all over the state began to call on him to dye their lambs. The business grew and grew, and now this rancher is known as the biggest lamb dyer in Texas.

## FINAL RITES HELD THURSDAY MORNING FOR FINIS BRYAN, 74

Funeral services were held Thursday morning at the Main Street Church of Christ in Winters for Orbie Finis Bryan, 74, Leon Bahlman of San Angelo officiated. Burial followed in the Wilmett Cemetery under direction of Spill Funeral Home of Winters.

Mr. Bryan was found dead on his farm five miles west of Bradshaw about noon Monday by his wife when she went out to look for him when he didn't return home when she was expecting him. Justice of the Peace Silas Clark ruled death was due to natural causes.

Mr. Bryan was born May 10, 1902, in Hill County. He moved to Rannels County as a child, settling in the Norton community. He was married to Edith DeVore on Dec. 3, 1922, at O'Donnell. They lived in the Norton community until 1946 when they moved to their farm near Bradshaw.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Joe of Winters; a daughter, Mrs. Ernest Barker of Hayward, Calif.; five brothers, Glenn Bryan, Leroy Bryan, Elmer Bryan, Douglas Bryan and Wayne Bryan, all of Winters; a sister, Eva Hutton of Ballinger; seven grandchildren and one great-grandchild. Three children preceded him in death including Allen Bryan, who formerly lived in Bronte.

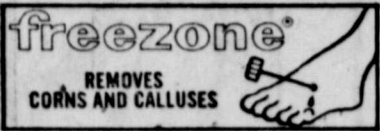
