The news of Dean Burch's announced intention of resigning as Republican national chairman should be welcomed by everyone interested in responsible two-party government. A fight to the finish between the two warring factions of the Republican party could well put the GOP out of contention for years to come. A result of a disastrous split in either of the two major political parties, would mean government based on one splinter party, thus the demise of our vaunted two party system. Senator Goldwater, Chairman Burch and Congressman Miller are to be commended on their effort to reunite the Republican party.

On the local scene we would still like to see some small changes that would be of inestimable benefit to business interests and the safety of people venturing into local automotive traffic. It is imperative that traffic lights be placed at major downtown intersections. Dimmitt is probably the only town in Texas, or anywhere else, with only one traffic light to regulate the amount of traffic that flows over our streets daily. Dimmitt is definitely a five traffic light city, and that is a minimum. The city should do something about installing traffic signals before more serious accidents occur.

Then there is the business of paving a parking area on the west and north sides of the square. This should be done before the end of the year. Downtown merchants are being penalized because of lack of parking space, and it is an inconvenience to rural, as well as city dwellers, to have to scrounge for a parking place while doing their shopping or taking care of business at the courthouse or the county agricultural offices. Paving the courthouse square would also be an economy move so far as county business is concerned. It would be much cheaper to maintain a paved parking area than it is to plant, nurture and mow a lawn.

With the State Legislature opening up at the same old stand and the National Congress convening to consider the implementation of the "Great Society", this bids to be an interesting year legislatively. There will be many pieces of legislation both state and national, either rejected or enacted into law before the prospective long sessions draw to a close.

So far as the conservative state legislature is concerned, we can expect a lot of talk but very little action. No legislation of a progressive or constructive nature can weather the opposition of the Austin lobbyists, especially when the lobbyists will have ready helpers in the leadership of both houses and in the governor's mansion. The people of Texas will have very little representation in Austin until they change their voting habits. One project that the legislature will have to cope with, or be guilty of dereliction of duty, and that is to meet the constitutional requirements for legislative redistricting. If the legislature, and it is altogether possible, fails to redistrict the state, Texas Congressmen will be elected at large in the 1966 election. This would be a calamity so far as the best interests of the people of Texas are concerned. Only wealthy men can afford to make a state-wide race, or those who have the backing of money supplied by special interests. If the legislature fails to do its duty in the matter of redistricting we can expect a vast majority of our Congressmen to be elected from the big cities of South and East Texas.

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Major Improvements Are Planned By West Texas Telephone Company

New Stop-gap equipment, a 100-line board, will be added to the present switchboard facilities of the local West Texas Telephone Company, according to an announcement last Friday by Bill Woodard, local manager. 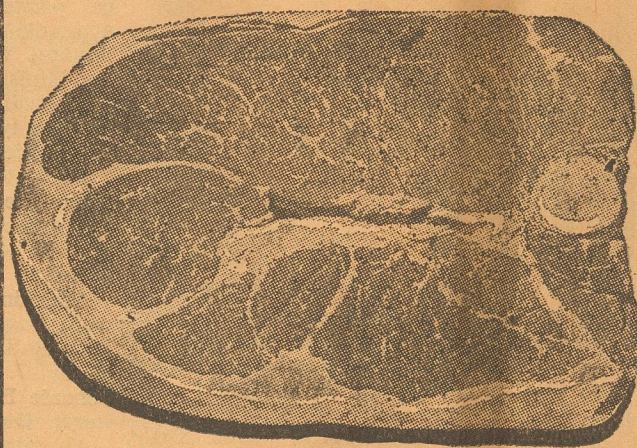

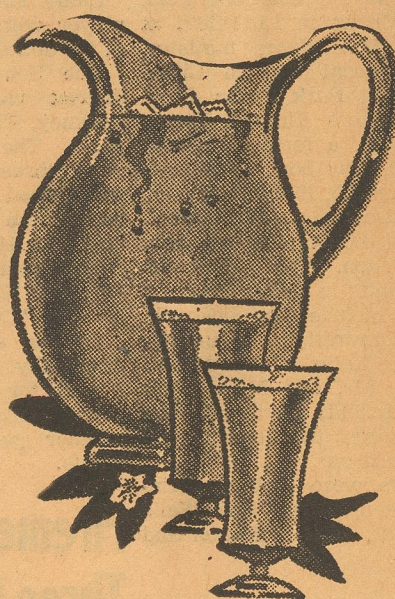

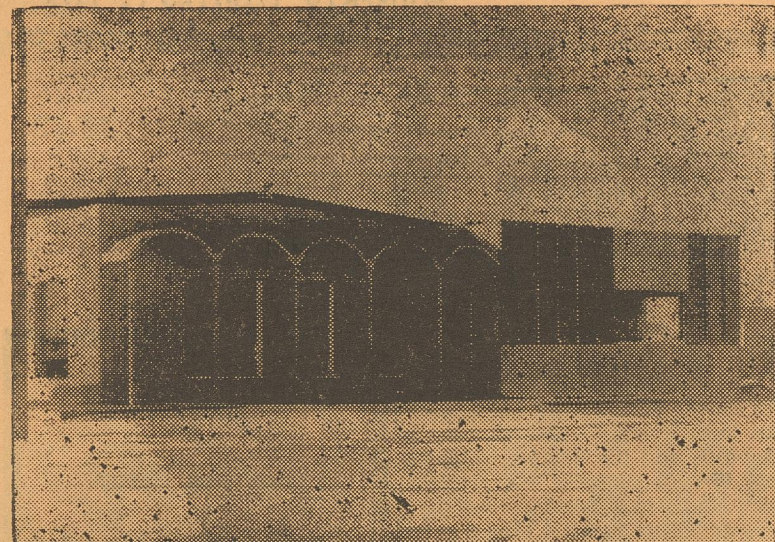

Slaton Court will have a reception of new members on April 4. Anyone wishing to join the society may do so at this time.

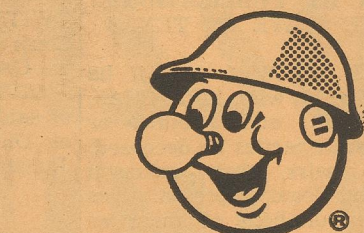
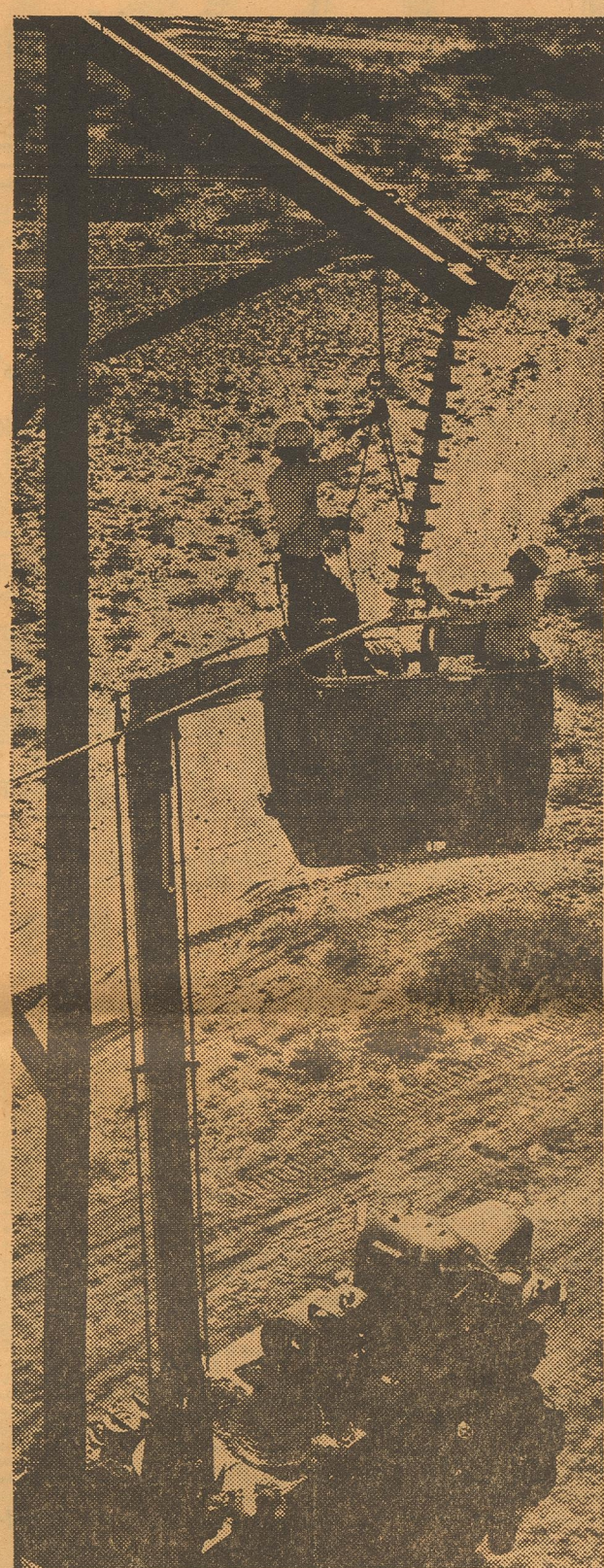

AMMO NOTES

FERTILIZING SUGAR BEETS...
Fertilization of sugar beet land is just around the corner. From observations of this past year's crop and experiences with the crop, certain trends are developing in regard to sugar beet fertilization.

Rates used this past year seemed to be about right. The 100 lb N rate should continue to be used where beets follow summer-till land.

If the land has a history of low nitrogen use on the pre-vious wheat crop or if beets should follow meize rate of nitrogen should be higher. Some observations indicate that phosphorus rates may need to be 125 to 150 lbs. P2O5 per acre as compared to 100 lbs. P2O5. This would be true in fields which have not had any phosphate used in the past.

In regard to source or grade of fertilizer to use, observations have been that ammonia has been a very satisfactory source of nitrogen. Indications on phosphate show that ammonium phosphates, such as 11-37-0 or 18-46-0 will give better results than the same amount of actual phosphate from the calcium phosphates, such as 0-20-0 or 0-46-0.

This is particularly true on fields which have had little or no phosphate in the past. Some relatively high yields were grown with 600 to 700 lbs. 0-20-0 per acre but in nearly every case, these fields had been phosphated for several years in a row. However, the ammonium phosphates have generally been superior.

Source of fertilizer is closely related to method of application in that the calcium phosphates are generally broadcast, whereas, the ammonium phosphates, particularly liquids are generally banded.

Banding in the bed or in the sides of the bed has proven to be

better in most cases than an equivalent quantity of phosphate as a broadcast application. If a dual application of ammoni and phosphorus is used, it should be placed in the sides of the bed rather than directly under the seed in the middle of the bed.

In summary, general observation this past year would indicate that rates of 100 lbs N and 100 lbs. P2O5 per acre should be about right this next crop season with the possible exception of extra phosphorus where none has been used in the past. Source should generally be an ammonium phosphate - either liquid or dry - and it should be banded for best results. All nitrogen and phosphorus should be applied preplant.

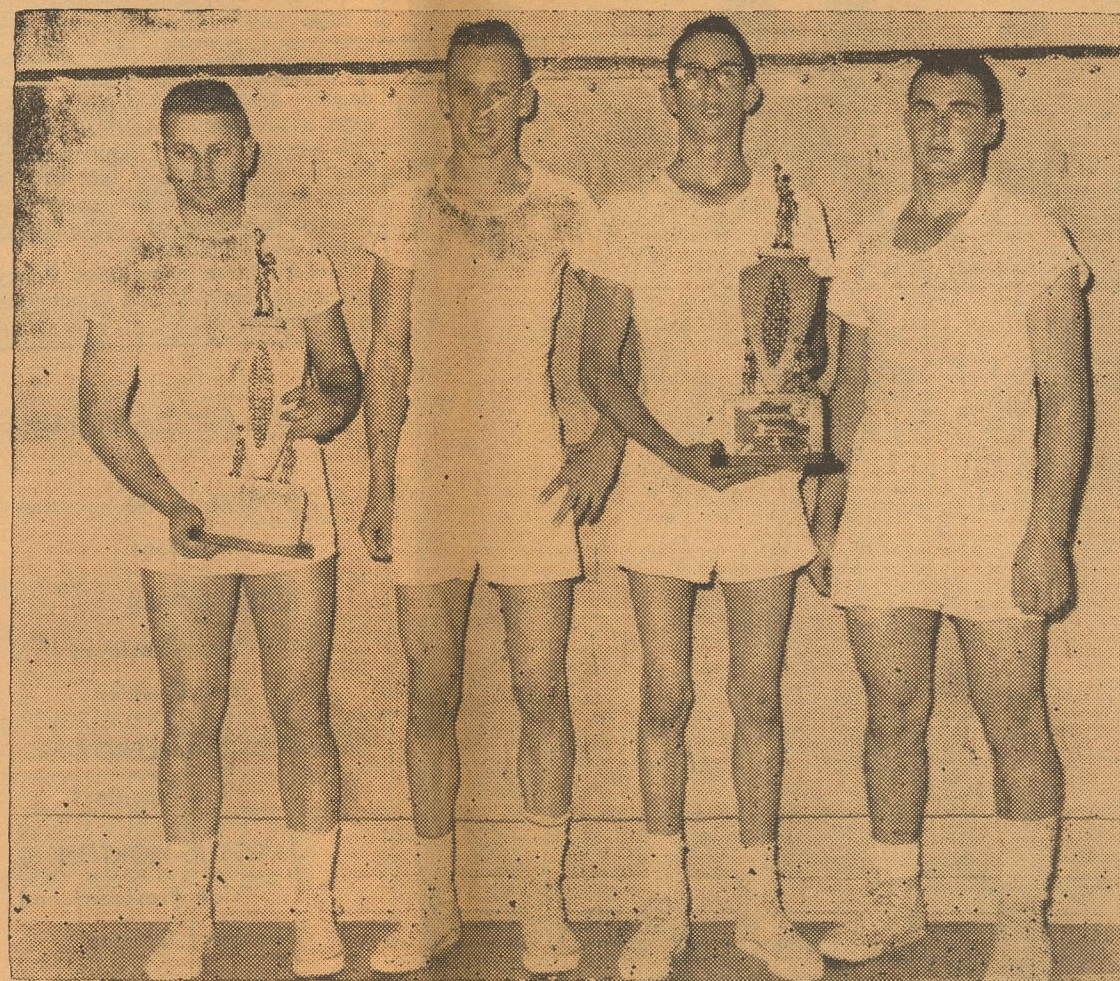
Car-Pickup Collide Here

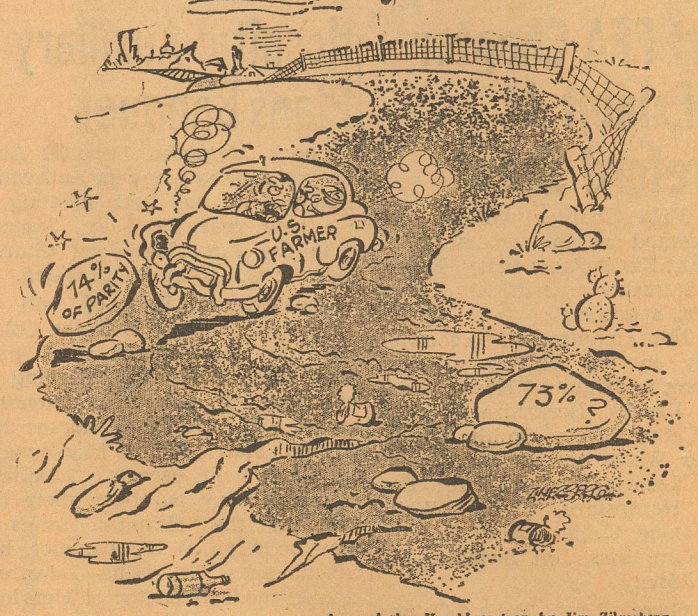
McAdoo hit a 30 foot jump shot in the last three seconds to win the game.

It is further ordered by the Court that this raise in salary be effective as of January 1, 1965, and that notice of the raise in salary be published one time in one newspaper in each county of this judicial district, and the cost of publication of said notice be paid by the Commissioners Court of each county out of any funds available in accordance with Article 2225j as amended of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, and it is further ordered that a copy of this order be placed on the minutes of each county of the district and a copy be furnished each clerk of the Commissioners Court of each county of this district, and then sent by said clerk to the treasurer of said county of each county.

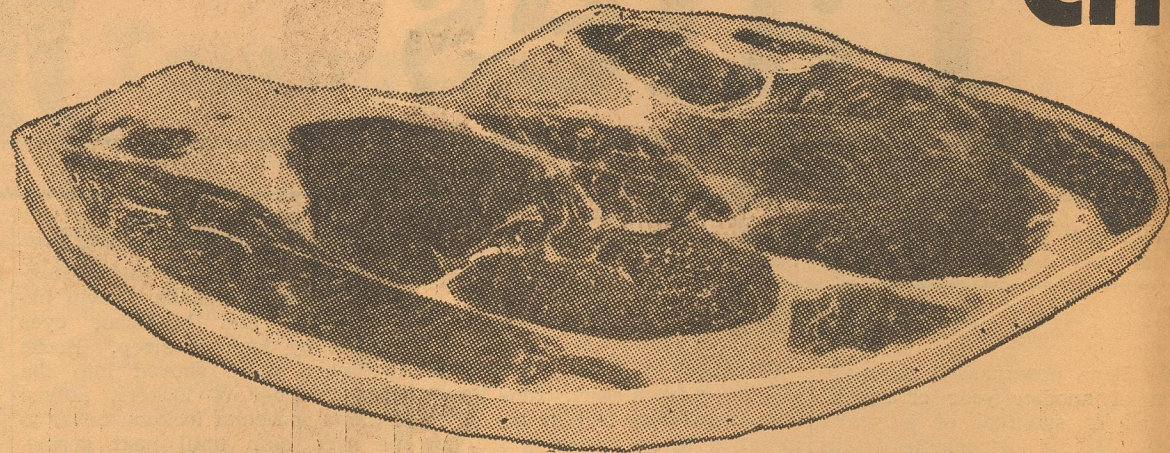
