EDITORIAL

An important election, to Dimmitt and Castro County, will be held Tuesday when Dimmitt voters will ballot on a \$100,000 airport bond election. Adequate airport facilities are a must for a community that expects to hold its place in the sun and continue to grow and develop. In the distant past airports near the larger cities, and especially at small or towns, was strictly a pleasure facility, accommodating the barnstorming pilots that had as their main purpose the carrying of passengers for joy rides, and performing acrobatics for the entertainment of onlookers. What was once a hobby for a few people has become a necessity for many people and the public in general.

The Dimmitt airport, in its primitive stage, has been of inestimable value to our town and county, but at best it has been only a get by or stopgap facility. With heavy industry moving into our community adequate runways, to accommodate the heavier type private planes, and other modern airport facilities are a must if we hope to reap the maximum benefits expected in a growing community. To name a few of the more important needs for an adequate airport facility would give top priority to the needs of representatives of business concerns that are required to make frequent, but brief, business visits to our city and county; the need for a base for crop dusting and charter flight operations of established companies, and a means of quick, fast, transportation in cases of emergency. And of course there are the local business people that own their own planes and use that means of transportation to make important trips, in the promotion of their business and the best interests of our community. Many of the promotional trips that have resulted in some of our major businesses, and industries, moving to the county have been made by private plane.

The repayment of monies received from the sale of the bond issue will, no doubt, be made from city tax revenue. However, it is believed that the airport, through the rental of hangers and charges for other services will show a neat profit that can be applied against the initial cost of the facility.

The \$100,000 bond issue, coupled with a like amount from the Federal Aviation Authority, will be sufficient funds to construct needed paved runway, lights and beacons for night flying, and other necessary facilities to take care of the increasing demands on the airport. Dimmitt needs a modern airport and the project merits and deserves the support of a progressive citizenry.

City Commission Makes Statement To Dimmitt Voters

On Tuesday, May 10, the qualified tax paying voters of the City of Dimmitt will vote on the passage, or rejection, of a bond issue in the amount of \$100,000, to be matched by a like amount by the Federal Aviation Agency, monies from which will be used to purchase land and construct and equip an adequate airport facility for the City of Dimmitt.

These bonds, a general tax bond issue, will bear interest to exceed five percent per annum, and to be retired in eleven years. Purpose of the short-term bond issue is because of the cheaper interest rate on short term loans.

Based on the present tax structure in Dimmitt, the sale of a \$100,000 bond issue, repaid over an eleven year period, would necessitate an average increase in taxes of \$11,000 per year. When this increase is added to the present city annual budget of \$190,000 the budget would be increased to \$201,000 which would amount to approximately a five percent increase. As an illustration, tax-wise, a home that is assessed at a valuation of \$3,267 at the present tax rate, would have a tax obligation of \$49.00 annually. In event the bond issue carries the home would have a tax obligation of \$53.91 annually based on the value as it appears on the city tax roll.

Money derived from the sale of bonds, and matching funds from the Federal Aviation Agency, will be used to purchase 90 acres of land, present site of the Dimmitt Airport, and to pave a 50 foot wide, 4,000 foot long runway, or landing strip. There will be paved turn-arounds at each end of the landing strips. In addition to the purchase of present hangers and facilities, there will be a paved access road and a paved plane parking area as well as adequate lighting facilities and a signal beacon light for night flying.

We, the City Commission, recommend the passage of this bond issue to fill the need of a transportation gap in the services needed and required by our city and community. We feel that further development of our community is tied directly to available transportation facilities, and because of the fact that air travel is becoming more important in the operation of various types of businesses, adequate airport facilities are a must if we are to meet the needs of an expanding economy and a growing industrial area.

In order to take advantage of the proposed grant from the Federal Aviation Agency, from appropriations in the present budget application must be made before the close of the current fiscal year. It is possible that funds for this purpose may not be included in the new federal budget, so it is necessary that, if we are to insure the participation of the Federal Aviation Agency in bearing the cost of the project, that this bond issue carry and a commitment be secured from the Federal Agency before the new budget is adopted.

Bob McLean, chairman of the Castro County Action Committee stated that this county had received Federal Grants in the amount of \$24,477, \$10,028 of this amount will be used in making a survey of the socio-economic needs in the county. \$14,419 of this grant is to be spent in a

Head Start Program now in operation in Dimmitt and Hart.

Frank Latimer has been employed by the committee to serve as director in making a county survey. He will request volunteer assistance from citizens of the county in completing this study. The Head Start Program is in operation with two classes of 20 children in Dimmitt and one class of 20 children in Hart. These 3 classes will continue through the summer months of June and July. A supplemental Head Start Program has been requested for 4 and 5 year olds to operate during June and July for 8 weeks. It approved this will take care of over 125 children.

The citizens of Castro County have a wonderful opportunity to give the underprivileged people an opportunity to better themselves. It will take more than Federal Grants to make these programs go forward. Many volunteer workers are needed.

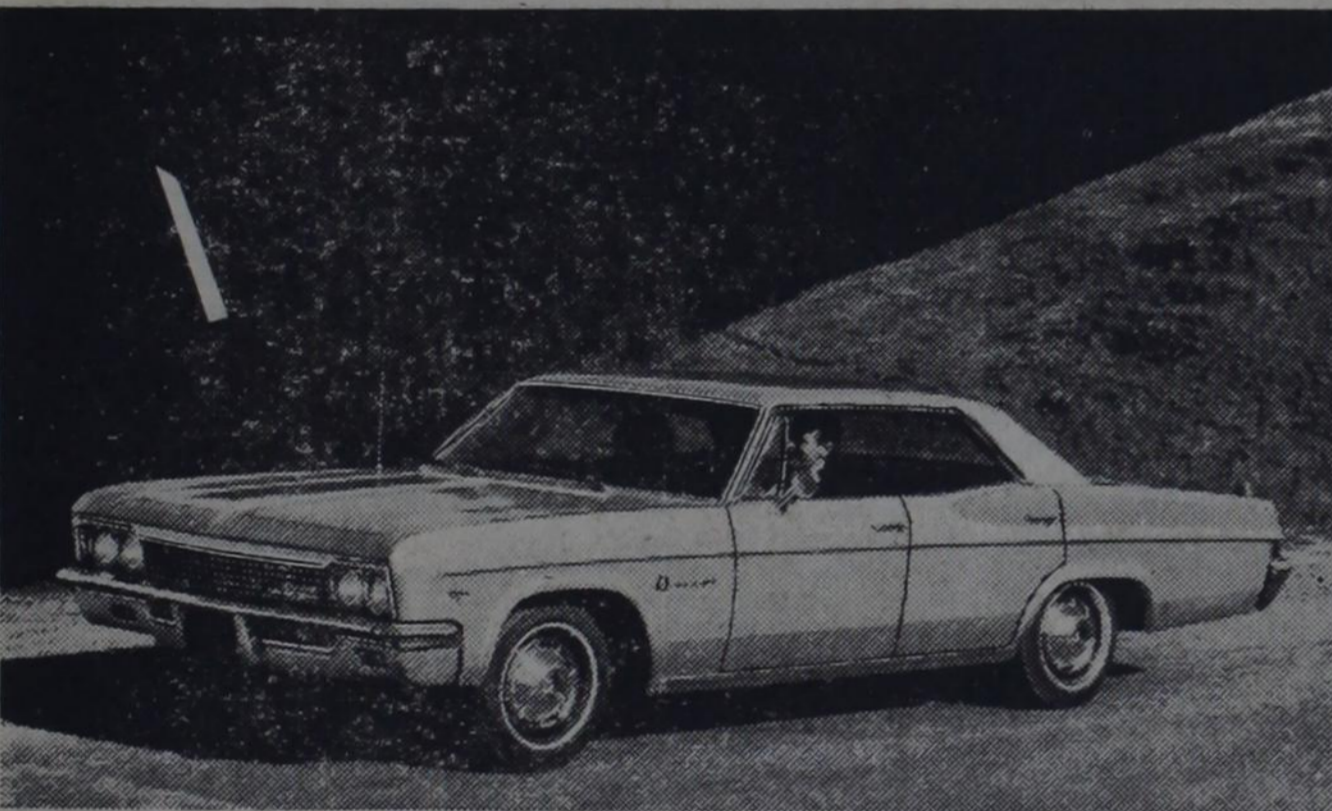

In the last several decades we have seen a determined effort to pervert our government from that inspired and lofty purpose into a welfare state, where an all-powerful federalism, aided by a perverted Supreme Court, have steadily impaired what was once the bastion of our liberties.

Smokey Bear Receives Salary

If you think that the Vice President or the Chief Justice receives the highest salary in the United States, you are sadly mistaken. One of the highest paid public officials is none other than Smokey the Bear. He averages from \$35,000 to \$50,000 a year. He receives most of this money from royalties on fifty-eight products bearing his endorsement. They include everything from ashtrays and cigarette snufflers to litter bags and T-shirts. Every cent goes to the Cooperative Forest Fire Prevention Program. Smokey Bear's mail is so voluminous that he has his own zip code number, 20252. About 1000 cards and letters arrive daily. Smokey has had quite an effect upon American youngsters. Many of them have written about the concern they feel about their parents' negligence with matches and cigarettes. Smokey began his career in 1950, after fire fighters in New Mexico's Lincoln National Forest found the cub burned and dazed, clinging to a smoldering tree. When his burns had healed, he was flown to the Washington zoo. The public loved Smokey, and soon he became the living counterpart of a symbol that the Advertising Council of the Conservation Service had created some years before - a friendly bear, in a ranger's hat, who always doused campfires.

News Roundup

For the first time, U. S. killed and wounded began running ahead of South Vietnamese casualties in the war. The U. S. Supreme Court struck down an Arizona law requiring a loyalty oath of state employees. Ford Motor Company dealers ask thirty thousand owners of 1966 model cars to return for inspection of a brake line. Poland celebrated one thousand years as a nation.
