# Plans Received For County Recreation Project

## Tragic Accident Takes Life Of Farmer-Businessman, J. G. Davis

J. G. Davis, a prominent young Dimmitt farmer and business man was killed Thursday night, at about 11 o'clock, in a tragic accident about a mile and a half north of Dimmitt on Highway 385.

Returning home from Hereford, where he had been to attend a meeting of the board of directors of the Hereford Country Club, Davis' car ploughed into the rear of a large tank transport truck belonging to Dimmitt 66 Inc. Cause of the accident is a matter of conjecture, but the most common supposition is that Davis, who had been working long hours, either went to sleep momentarily or blacked out. Davis was a superb pilot and a skillful driver and it was believed to be very doubtful that the accident resulted from misjudgment or a driving error.

Mr. and Mrs. David Adams were the first to arrive at the scene of the accident and on investigation it was determined that Davis was killed instantly. Adams summoned aid and called an ambulance. The accident was investigated by Sheriff's officers and members of the Highway Patrol. About 11:00 o'clock in a tragic truck said that he was unaware of the accident until he was told of the tragedy after arriving in town. The car was totally demolished and the rear end of the transport truck sustained considerable damage. Striking the left rear bumper of the truck the car bent the bumper upward and forward, and the force of the impact knocked the dual wheels of the truck out of alignment and broke a heavy steel chassis support.

Funeral services for Davis were conducted at 3 p.m. Saturday at the First Methodist Church in Dimmitt with the pastor Rev. Weldon McCormick, officiating and assisted by Rev. Darris Egger of Colorado City, a former pastor of the Dimmitt Methodist Church and Rev. Frank Pollard, pastor of the First Baptist Church Dimmitt. Interment was in the Castro Memorial Gardens Cemetery under the direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

John Guy Davis, Jr., whose home was at 301 NW 6th Street, Dimmitt, was born November 11, 1917 at Snyder, Texas. He moved with his parents to Dimmitt and had lived here continuously for the past forty years. He attended schools and was a graduate of Dimmitt High School. After graduating from high school he attended Lipperts Business College at Plainview, and was a student at Texas Technological College in Lubbock for one year. Davis' college career was terminated when he enlisted in the

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## County Schools To Graduate 110

### Democrats Will Open Five Polls For 2nd Primary

Instead of the usual fifteen, there will only be five voting places in the county for the Democratic runoff primary to be held Saturday, June 4, according to an announcement this week by Ray Bearden, County Democratic Chairman.

Due to the light ballot, with candidates only in the Attorney General race and the Precinct 4 Commissioners race, it was deemed by the County Democratic Executive Committee both economical and expedient to reduce the number of voting places.

The usual four boxes in Commissioners Precinct 4 will be open because of the runoff in the commissioners race in that precinct. All other Castro County voters will do their balloting in a single voting place in the Community Room at the courthouse.

The four voting boxes in Commissioners Precinct 4 will be at Jumbo, Arney, Nazareth and Commissioners Courtroom in the courthouse.

Candidates in the runoff primary are, for state office, Crawford Martin and Franklin Spears, and in the county, for commissioner of Precinct 4, W. H. (Bill) Simpson and Alfons (Al) Maurer. Absentee voting will begin today and continue until three days before the election.

Leroy Moore, teenage son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Moore, sustained a broken leg and numerous lacerations and bruises Friday afternoon when he narrowly escaped more serious injury when he was struck by a pickup truck at the intersection of Halsell and Highway 385. It was reported that the accident happened when the lad rode his bicycle into the path of the northbound truck, and that apparently the accident was unavoidable.

Leroy received treatment at the Plains Memorial Hospital for his numerous injuries and was released after an overnight stay in the hospital.

In an effort to avoid hitting the lad, the driver of the truck, Robert Ellis Clements of Dalhart, applied his brakes causing the truck to jack-knife which resulted in considerable damage to the pickup and the trailer.

Mrs. Andrews died at about 7:30 p.m. in the Medical Center Hospital in Plainview of injuries received in a train-car crash at the Santa Fe Railroad crossing on Highway 400 in southeast Plainview.

Mr. Andrews, according to information received here, was in critical condition in the intensive care unit of the Methodist Hospital at Lubbock. He suffered head and chest injuries according to hospital attendants.

The Steering Committee of the Castro County Recreation Association announces the acceptance of preliminary plans and budgets for recreational facilities, including golf, swimming, skeet shooting and land for the use of the Little League and Pony League organizations to build regulation size baseball parks.

In announcing these plans the steering committee has set the month of June as the period for purchase of Charter memberships in this association. A membership in the association will entitle a family to use the facilities of the association without any fee except a payment of monthly dues. This will also entitle the member of the association to vote on by-laws of the organization, elect officers, and carry on other such business as the membership dictates. This association will be a private non-profit corporation.

The fee for a membership will be \$100.00 until the end of June. There is no limit on the number of memberships that can be purchased. Projected dues are \$10.00 per month which includes the use of the facilities. On July 1, 1966 membership fees will be increased to an initial cost of \$250.00 each.

Business firms may purchase memberships for their employees but one membership must be purchased for the individual use of each employee family that is to use the facility.

The land on which these facilities are to be located is the O. K. Howe property on the west edge of Dimmitt. The land will be purchased by and owned by the association for the purpose of providing land for recreational purposes.

The funds for purchase of the land, and building of the facilities, will be borrowed from the Farmers Home Administration. Final commitment on these funds cannot be secured until memberships are sold and the organization formalized.

Mr. Ed Biggs of Wichita Falls has been the engineer for the Steering Committee. He has developed the plans up to this point and will in fact be the supervisor of the project until it is completed. Mr. Biggs has had previous experience working with this type association using these same financing arrangements.

Memberships can be purchased now from the members of the Steering Committee. This committee is composed of Dr. James Wohlgenuth, Jim Ross, M. E. Clevenger, Gerald Hardin, Jack Miller and Don Newman.

The \$100.00 membership fees will be placed in an escrow account at the First State Bank and the funds will be refunded if the loan is not approved.

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### Library Has "Forgiveness Day"

In order to have as many overdue books as possible returned, Castro County Library is going to try a new policy called "Forgiveness Day."

"Forgiveness Day" will be the first Tuesday of every month. Persons bringing overdue books back to the library on this day will not be required to pay book fines of two cents per day.

The first "Forgiveness Day" will be Tuesday, June 7. Anyone having overdue books should take advantage of this day.

### Notes On Medicare

Medicare, the new program of health insurance for the aged, begins on July 1, 1966, for all people over 65 who have signed up for it.

Many people are asking what they should do about their private health insurance plans. While this decision is a private one, Travis Briggs, social security district manager in Amarillo cautions: "do not cancel any other health insurance you have until your medicare coverage actually begins."

This warning also holds true for people who become 65 in the future. If they apply for medicare in the three-month period before their 65th birthday, their coverage will not begin until the month they are 65.

Briggs said that it is important that people approaching 65 do three things:

1. Obtain good evidence of your age well before your 65th birthday, so you will know when your benefits under medicare can begin.
2. Visit your local social security office as early as possible in the three month period before your 65th birthday.
3. After you have established your age with social security, get in touch with the agent or company that provides your health insurance.

Local social security offices have pamphlets that describe the medicare program. You can get one by asking for pamphlet OASI-883.

**Washington Report**

In April and May of this year, virtually all sections of Texas were affected by heavy rain storms, violent weather and flooding. Hardest hit were areas and communities along the Trinity River from Fort Worth to the Gulf of Mexico. Flooding in the Dallas area was responsible for 19 deaths, and millions of dollars were lost in property damage.

But, the greatest story was the flood that did not happen. The Army Corps of Engineers flood control and reservoir projects saved the city of Dallas and surrounding communities — indeed, communities down to the Gulf — from an estimated \$51 million in damages. However, there are additional actions which can be taken to safeguard and warn communities of the imminent danger of flooding, hail, lightning, etc., hurricanes and tornadoes.

The Department of Commerce has proposed the establishment of a national natural disaster warning system which would be

of inestimable value in saving human lives and safeguarding against property damage. The Department's proposal would establish an integrated natural hazards detection system, utilizing existing facilities, and would, also with the help of existing facilities, expand its communications network for dissemination of violent weather information and upgrade its capabilities for immediate alert to all sections of the nation.

After studying the proposed "Nationwide Natural Disaster Warning System" (NADWARN), I find I am in complete accord with the objectives of the program. It is my hope that the Appropriations Committees of both Houses will include funds for the system in their final appropriation bill for the Department of Commerce.

With such a system in effect, our Nation would make valuable headway in reducing the number of deaths attributable to natural disasters, estimated at between 500 and 600 yearly. It would assist in halting the economic losses to our country, estimated at between \$1 Billion and \$15 Billion annually, caused by tornadoes, hurricanes, floods, seismic

In each of the above examples, the "C" represents the row of crop and the "X" represents the idle or fallow row. In all cases the lister must have been set on the same width for all rows and it could be anywhere from 32 inch centers to 42 inch centers. Please remember that all row widths in the plot must be exactly the same width. In other words, do not have your lister set on 36 inch centers and then set the planter on some other width rows.

When the crop being measured is planted in strips of two or more rows alternating with strips of idle land, another crop, or combination thereof, and the distance between strips of the crop being measured is as wide as four normal rows of the crop, consider half a row width (but not less than 16 inches) beyond the strips of the crop as devoted to the crop. Example: Double row grain sor-

ghum planted 12 inches apart on 40 inch rows, alternating 4 rows of double row grain sorghum with four rows fallow land. The grain sorghum is 6 inches off the center of the row, add 6 inches to half a row width, which in this case is less than 16 inches, so 16 inches would be used, this equals 22 inches, or 2 inches of the fallow row being counted as grain sorghum. With 8 rows or 320 inches involved, 164 inches or 51% per cent will be counted as crop and 156 inches or 48% per cent will be counted as fallow land and will be eligible for diverted acres.

## Congressman Rogers Continues Opposition To Regulating Broadcast Signal Reception

Congressman Walter Rogers said Saturday he will continue to express his "adamant opposition to any attempt to turn over to a Federal bureau the right to tell an American citizen what he can or cannot receive on his radio or television set."

Several proposals affecting community antenna television (CATV) and radio and television broad-

casting are now before the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce on which Congressman Rogers serves as ranking majority member and chairman of the Subcommittee on Communications and Power.

Congressman Rogers has stated repeatedly that "the basic issue involved is centralization of government and control of communications." He added, "The question is this: Do you want a Federal bureau to censor directly or indirectly what free people can see or hear on radio and television?"

"The Communications Act expressly prohibits censorship. However, Federal bureaus are constantly seeking to control the information they give to the average citizen. This is abhorrent to me — and I will continue to fight it," Congressman Rogers said.

This week's agenda for the other committee on which Congressman Rogers is a ranking member, the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs, calls for a Mines and Mining Subcommittee hearing on bills relating to the disposition of geothermal steam resources on U. S. public lands.


