Preliminaries are underway for the big shoot-out next year. Indications are that it will be a rough and tumble election year with no holds barred. For starters the democratic party anticipated the need for some funds, and hit on the idea that the faithful would respond to a teleshon cash raising gimmick. They bought the time from the networks, arranged for banks of telephones, with 800 numbers, and started the proceedings. Their purpose was to raise a few million dollars from friendly callers over the watts lines. A few democrats did possibly get through to make their contribution to what they perceived to be a good cause, but the number was drastically restricted by a very unethical procedure, if ethics apply in politics.

What happened was that the membership of the Moral Majority was urged, told or commanded by their very moral leader, Jerry Falwell, to watch the teleshon program and make note of those toll free numbers and start calling. The purpose was, of course, to jam the lines and cripple the democrats fund raising effort. The morality of people that will pull a ploy of that nature is very suspect.

The letter that Jerry Falwell sent to the members of his ultra-right Moral Majority members follows:

"Please help! Liberal Democrats are planning a two-day teleshon starting Saturday, May 28, on NBC to raise funds for a massive warchest to use in the 1984 elections against conservatives.

"Democratic National Committee plans to use the teleshon to raise between \$8 and \$10 million to elect liberal, anti-family, pro-homosexual, pro-nuclear freeze, pro-abortion candidates.

"The teleshon will also be a vehicle to lambast our beloved President, reportedly through a series of insulting and distorted so-called man on the street interviews.

"Ultra-liberals such as Ted Kennedy, former Vice President Walter Mondale and leading Hollywood left-wing activists will most likely appear together to smear and denounce conservative gains made under President Reagan.

"I cannot sit still and watch them degrade our President who has stood up to Communist terrorists, fought against abortion, promoted voluntary school prayer and religious freedom and stood against the ERA and has started us on the road to economic recovery.

"I am calling on you as a loyal conservative to stand up against this biased and expensive liberal media attack.

"Here is what you must do to counter this smear campaign:

"1. Watch the teleshon on your local NBC affiliate.

"2. Call in on their toll free number that appears on the screen. Let them know that you support the President and resent their slanted distortions.

"3. Immediately send a gift of \$15 to Moral Majority to help mount a counter media campaign.

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PICKET LINE formed last Thursday in front of the Dimco vegetable processing plant east of Dimmitt waving signs and flags to bring attention to their cause of allegedly unfair hiring practices by the plant.

Dimco representatives had not spoken with representatives of the protestors by press time Wednesday morning.

Farm workers hold protest march

During the past week, a protest march, a hunger strike and the threat of a lawsuit have been aimed at the Dimco vegetable processing plant in Dimmitt in an effort to influence the hiring practices of the company.

Farm labor leader Jesus Moya of Hereford arrived in Dimmitt last Thursday and led about 50 marchers, mostly women and children, from the Castro County Courthouse to the Dimco building east of Dimmitt on SH 86, about a mile-and-a-half hike.

Moya told members of the news media present that Dimco was going to give its entire onion harvest to only one labor contractor, Luisa Lopez, who allegedly imports migrant laborers.

The protestors want at least half of the work to be given to two local labor contractors, Joe Rodriguez and Americo de la Paz, and their local workers.

"The workers should at least get half of the harvest, because it was the local workers and de la Paz and Rodriguez who have been working planting the onions for Dimco for the last several years and it is an injustice to leave them out of the onion harvest," Moya said.

After marching out to the Dimco plant, the workers stood along the bar ditch outside the company's property line and waved signs and listened to several speakers, including Moya. No office personnel were at the plant at the time.

Moya told the workers that they should continue their efforts until someone from the company would speak with them.

Picketing continued Friday and Saturday, with a hunger strike in front of the courthouse beginning at 5 p.m. Saturday and lasting until 5 p.m. Sunday. Moya said that about 10 workers participated in the strike.

Tuesday, Moya said that 53 laborers signed a petition to join in a class action suit against Dimco for allegedly not paying minimum wage to workers in 1981, '82, and '83.

Moya said the suit, asking \$50,000 damages on behalf of 225 workers, would possibly have been filed Wednesday, unless Dimco spokesmen are willing to negotiate with the workers.

"We might be willing to drop the lawsuit if Dimco will give local workers a fair share of the harvest work," Moya said. "But we'll just have to sit down with them first and see what they're willing to do."

Noting that he has not

spoken with any representatives of the protestors, Dimco manager Alan McClure said that last year his company hired at least 80 to 85 percent local people to do the harvest work.

"The crews haven't been hired yet for this year, but locals can work under Luisa if they want to. She doesn't bring in all her workers from out of town," McClure said.

McClure added that his company cannot put on extra workers, because it would bring in the onions

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work.

"The quality and quantity of the wheat look good, real good," Matthews said. "When you produce a lot of wheat though, the protein is down."

The great amount of wheat will not have any effect on the storage for this year's fall crops, but Easter Grain will have a problem.

"We are full to the hilt with wheat. There is none on the ground, but we are full. The wheat will have no effect on the fall crops because we are still full from last year's crops," he said.

At Star Grain, the storage problem is a little more serious.

"We had to put some of it in the good Lord's storage. It is out on the ground," Lynn Ehly said. "We are moving it out as quick as we can."

Star Grain's top yield was 126 bushels per acre, Ehly said. LeRoy Pohl-

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Elevator operators rate '83 harvest 'best ever'

By KARI FLUEGEL The fields are cut. The trucks are unloaded, and the area farmers and elevator operators are saying that the 1983 wheat harvest will long be remembered as the "best harvest ever."

Fred Bruegel Jr., of Bruegel and Sons, said that the wheat harvests of 1941, 1947 and 1949 were remembered as good years for wheat.

"But this year the harvest is quite a bit better than those were," Bruegel said.

This year farmers reporting 100 bushels per acre were common, Bruegel said. Jackie Clark reported 99.7 bushels per acre. Dry-land wheat top yields were around 60 bushels per acre.

"We are in super shape for storage," he said. "We came out just right."

Max Marble, using Hawk certified seed, got 123 bushels per acre on a 30-acre patch of irrigated wheat, Truelock said. Farmers often reported 90 to 100 bushels per acre.

Dimmitt Agri Industries reported the highest yield being 112 bushels per acre, according to Bill Clark.

"This has been a very good harvest. It is one of the best we have ever seen, both production-wise and quality-wise."

Clark said that storage was "nip and tuck for a while, but we finally found room for it all." Storage for the fall crops at Dimmitt Agri will cause a problem, unless something happens between now and the time harvest begins.

Sunnyside Grain has plenty of storage, Roy Byers said.

"The wheat harvest was above average, with farmers reporting between 70 and 80 bushels per acre," he added.

Ivan Block has the highest yield reported by Eddie Matthews at Easter Grain with 111 bushels per acre of irrigated wheat. Dry-land wheat averaged 60 bushels to the acre.

While taxpayers may be facing a rise in school taxes, Dimmitt High School students will be facing a shorter day for the coming year.

The Dimmitt school board at its Monday night meeting, discussed the schedule needed to prepare the 1983-84 budget on time.

Superintendent Robert Ryan told the board that the budget will be prepared for adoption at the next regular meeting, set for Aug. 8. Ryan said that various public hearings must be scheduled within a certain time period if the budget calls for more than a 3 percent increase in taxes.

"With the 4 percent salary increase mandated by the state legislature, we will have to raise the tax rate by at least 3 percent and possibly more," Ryan said.

If the increase is more than 3 percent, a public hearing will be held on Aug. 30. The tax rate would be set and the amended budget adopted at the following regular meeting of the board on Sept. 12. Time is allowed in between for publication of notice of the various hearings and meetings.

For the coming school year, high school students will not have to report to classes until 9 a.m., according to a new schedule set up to accommodate a new elective class — computer science.

Ryan told the board that 33 students had signed up for the new class, but only six could fit it into their regular schedules. The decision was made to include the computer class as a zero-hour course — or one that is held outside of regular class hours.

Ryan said that the course would begin at 8 a.m. each morning, and last for 50 minutes.

In addition, Ryan said that a new activity period will be scheduled for 8:30 a.m. or thereafter, with regular classes beginning at 9 a.m.

"The activity period would be used for club meetings, class meetings,

and any other activities that normally disrupt the regular class schedule, as far as possible. Things like school pictures would still have to be done throughout the day," Ryan explained.

The 30-minute activity period was gained by taking five minutes off of each of the six class periods, leaving four periods of 55 minutes and two periods of 60 minutes.

The board members voted to accept the school insurance program offered by Equities International Life Insurance Company of Fort Worth. The school system will pay a \$9 football premium for all high school varsity and junior varsity football players, which is based on a \$100 deductible. The board also agreed to cover the deductible on any claims.

Board members felt that the schools could come out ahead in comparison to paying the \$31.50 premium for coverage with no deductible.

The at-school coverage plan for students in kindergarten through grade six would cost \$10 per student, while for grades seven through 12 it would cost \$16. Twenty-four hour coverage for all grades would cost \$39. Maximum benefits for all three plans would be \$15,000 per accident.

Also, the board agreed to pay a \$1 per student premium for all students involved in any UIL activities to insure against catastrophic injuries (lifetime disability and with medical expenses exceeding \$10,000). Ryan said he was informed about this policy by the University Interscholastic League.

The plan is handled by Doug Ruedlinger Incorporated of Topeka, Ks.

Other plans from Texas Association of Community Schools and National Federations Student Protection Trust were also viewed, but the premiums were higher than the plan the board accepted.

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Expo deposit to go up to \$500

County Commissioners voted to raise the usage deposit of the County Expo building from \$100 to \$500 at their regular meeting Monday.

The issue came to light when Ruby Wood, expo building supervisor, reported the recent misuse of the building by a renter.

At a birthday party held at the building, the people using the facilities broke a toilet and tore a paper towel dispenser off the wall in the men's bathroom, destroyed the heater, left beer cans both inside and outside the building and put the chairs in the storage area in a disorganized fashion.

The \$100 deposit put up by the renters was kept by the county, but commissioners feel that the deposit will not adequately

cover the cleaning and repair expenses.

Other suggestions discussed by commissioners included closing the building to all birthday parties and wedding receptions.

As of Monday, people wishing to rent the building must pay a \$500 deposit and a \$100 rental fee. If the building is left in good condition (clean and in good repair) the deposit will be refunded. If the building is misused, the deposit will be kept to pay for repairs.

Also during the meeting, commissioners approved the re-appointment of county precinct voting judges and alternates.

Judges are listed first, followed by alternates, by voting precinct. They are:

Also, board members are planning to attend a special meeting in Hereford on Tuesday at 10 a.m. to discuss airport needs in the area.

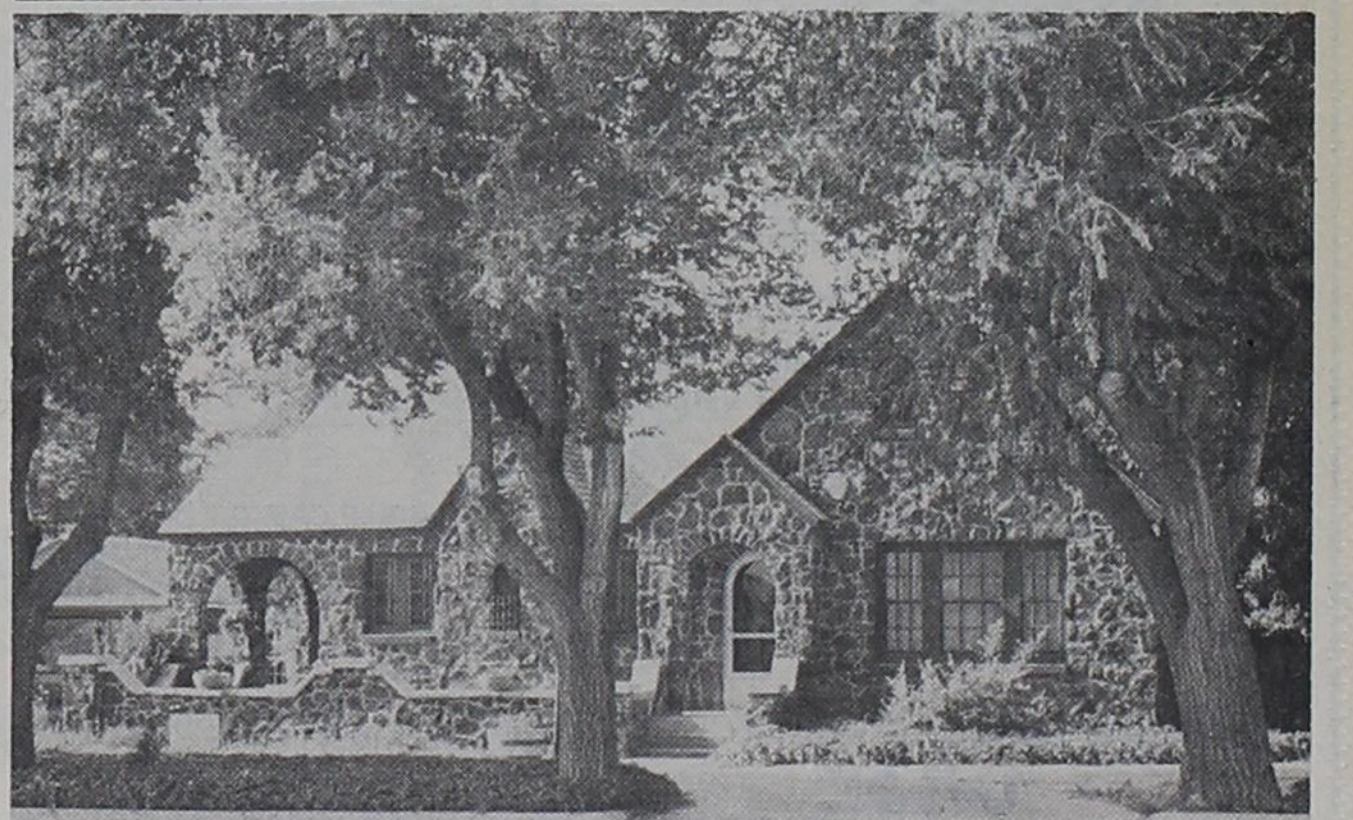

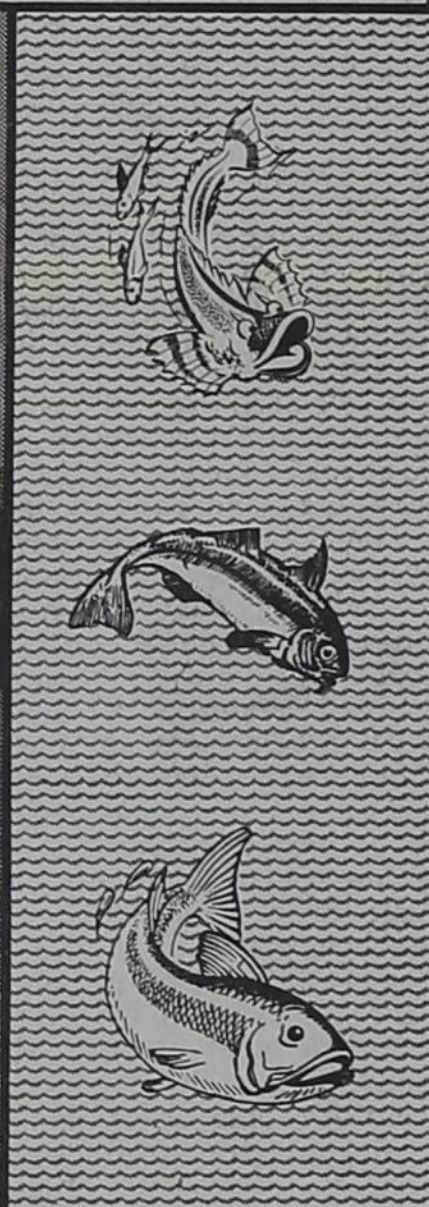

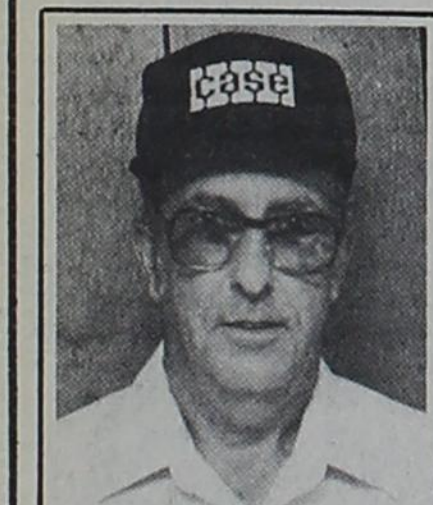

Hearing Tests Set For Dimmitt

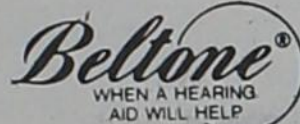
Electronic hearing tests will be given at the Senior Citizens Center on Tuesday, July 19 from 10 a.m. to 12 noon.

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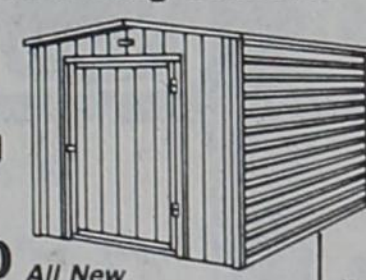
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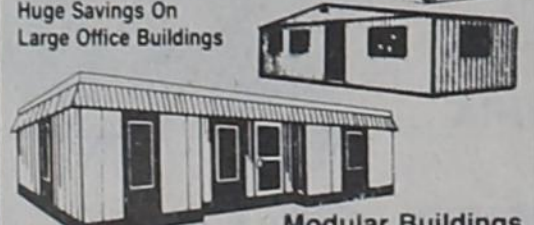

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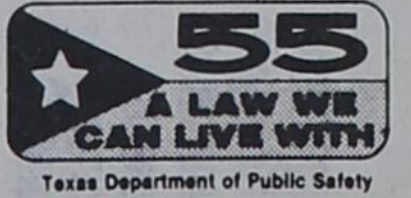
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Sorghum producers to elect four to board

Grain sorghum farmers in a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains will elect four members to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board on Sept. 15. Terms of four current board members expire at that time. They are Paul Cobb of Plains, Lee Hill of Dalhart, C. C. Reed of Kress and Olan "Jack" Crowl of Morse. All incumbents are eligible for re-election to the six-year, non-salaried position as long as they are bona fide grain sorghum producers. Any person in the TGSPB area who produces grain sorghum and is subject to the board assessment is eligible to vote, including owners of farms, and their tenants and sharecroppers. Any person eligible to vote is also eligible to make nominations for director. Qualified persons wishing to have their names placed in nomination for membership on the Board may do so by application to the organization, signed by himself and 10 others who are eligible to vote. All nominations must be filed by Aug. 15 at the TGSPB office, Box R, Abernathy, 79311 to allow time for adding their names to the ballot. Forms are available at that office. Ballots will be mailed to voters and must be returned to the TGSPB office by September 15. Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot by September 1, may obtain one at his County Agent's office. Counties involved are Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dallam, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Gaines, Hale, Hansford, Hartley, Hockley, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Moore, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Sherman, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum.

faster than the plant could process them and they would "rot in the bags." Concerning charges that they don't pay minimum wage, McClure replied, "We pay the minimum wage and have records that show it." McClure said that the company has not used other contractors at the harvest in the past. "We're not doing a thing differently than when we first started six years ago."

At the march last Thursday, several of the workers complained about ill treatment from Lopez and charged her with cheating the workers by making them use illegal six-gallon buckets and only paying them for five gallons. Moya, saying that the picture looks bleak for farm workers statewide, added that "We do not question Dimco's right to hire whatever workers they want to, we only feel it would be just to hire the local workers."

Final autopsy report given

The final autopsy report of Dimmitt police officer Vaughn Maddox disclosed a high level of alcohol was present in Maddox's blood at the time of his death.

Maddox killed himself June 20 shortly after he steered his car into the path of an oncoming car driven by Robert G. Young Jr. of Midland.

Maddox, who went on duty at 11 p.m., was driving on the wrong side of the road without lights when the accident happened shortly after midnight.

After he lived through the crash, Maddox shot himself in the heart with his .38 caliber service revolver.

The autopsy, done by Forensic Pathologist Ralph R. Erdmann of Childress, found .17 percent of ethyl alcohol present in Maddox's blood. No other harmful drugs were found.

An alcohol level of .10 percent is the legal intoxication level.

A level of .17 percent alcohol "denotes confusion, disturbance of sensation, decreased pain sense, a staggering gait and slurred speech," the report stated.

The actual cause of death was a gunshot wound to the chest. Maddox's death was ruled a suicide by Justice of the Peace Marshall Young.

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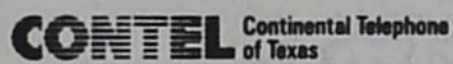

USDA announces new guidelines

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block recently announced general guidelines concerning the provisions of the 1984 wheat program. The program provisions are tentative but will likely fall within these guidelines:

-An acreage reduction requirement of between 20 and 30 percent.

-An additional land diversion of between 20 and 25 percent with a payment-in-kind compensation for farmers who divert additional land.

-An in-kind compensation of between 70 and 80 percent of program yield. "These points should provide wheat farmers general guidance for planning purposes," Block said. "We had hoped to announce the 1984 wheat program in more detail, but it is impossible to finalize the provisions until Congress completes its consideration of target price freeze legislation that has been requested by the Administration since January. Without a target price freeze, the tentative program provisions I announced today would be subject to change."

The Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry approved the target price freeze legislation on June 21. The House Committee on Agriculture met on May 25 to consider the legislation, but postponed further consideration.

"Many farmers have already begun to prepare

seedbeds and apply fertilizer for the upcoming crop," Block said. "With these financial commitments being made, it is only reasonable that the Congress act judiciously so that we can announce all of the specific program provisions as soon as possible."

The TAFP is an expansion and update of the Texas Airport System Plan developed for Texas and the Federal Aviation Administration by the Texas Aeronautics Commission. The Plan was first published in 1974. The latest Plan revision was published in January 1979.

Completion of this TAFP revision is scheduled for mid-1984.

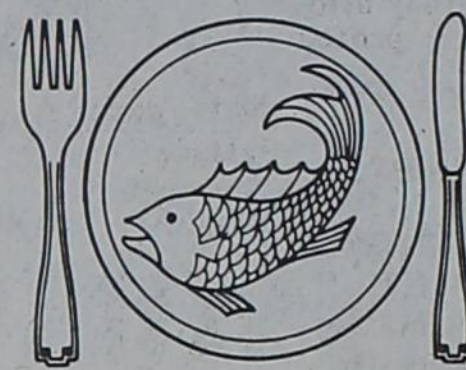

accept the annual report on the school district's progress in implementing the 1980 five-year priorities plan. The plan had included strategies for improving student scores on the reading subtest of the Stanford Achievement Test.

"The plan called for 65 percent of all students to be reading at a level within one year of their grade-level or better by 1983. However, this year 70 percent of the students were achieving that goal. The long range goal is for 75 percent of students to score within a year of grade level," Ryan told the board.

The greatest gain in reading level was shown in grades two, three, four and five. Second graders tested in the spring of 1983 showed 92 percent able to read within one year of grade level or better. In other words, they were at least able to read first grade level material or better.

In third grade, 88 percent of the students were able to read at least second grade level materials; 77 percent of fourth graders were able to read third grade level or better; and 73 percent of fifth graders were able to read fourth grade level or better.

To aid in implementation of the plan for the coming school year, a developmental reading course will be given for high school students in grades 11 and 12. Also, a speed reading course will be added in high school.

Ryan noted that plans will begin within a year for establishing the next five-year plan.

The board approved the second reading of the policy concerning revision of the local sick leave bank that had its first reading at the May meeting.

Approval was given to policy changes recommended by the Texas Association of School Boards. Most of the changes were a result of

rewording an existing policy, adding a policy to support recent legislation, or because of an opinion handed down by the attorney general.

The board voted in executive session to accept the resignations of assistant band director Dwayne Bishop and Richardson Elementary reading resource teacher Miki Bishop, who are moving to Dalhart. Kim Smiley was hired as high school homemaker teacher in place of Pat Bagley, who resigned.

meier had 29 bushels per acre on his dry-land wheat and Ehly had heard rumors about some reporting 40 bushels per acre on dry land.

"The harvest has been great, really good. We have gotten as much this year as we have ever gotten," she said.

Don Gregory of Castro County Grain agrees with Ehly.

"It was a very good harvest. The overall yields are the best I have ever heard of," Gregory said.

One farmer reported getting 113 bushels per acre off of 42 acres of irrigated land. Dry-land wheat acreage was not as high, but 30 and 40 bushels per acre was reported.

Castro County Grain made it through the harvest, but is now full. Arrangements are being made to ship some grain out before the fall harvest.

"Hopefully we will have some wheat moved by fall so we will have room for the fall crops," Gregory said.
