Prices for Finished Cattle.

It is expected that after January 1, the price of fed cattle will be higher than has been the case in years," said Ed Carver, formerly of Henrietta, but now engaged in the cattle commission business in Kansas City, who was in Fort Worth yesterday. "I base this belief on two facts. The first is that not over 60 per cent as many cattle are now being fed in the native states as has been the case in previous years, on account of the scarcity of feeding corn. The second is that there are not nearly as many cattle being fed in southern Texas as there were formerly."

"The shortage of feeding corn is due to the propitious fall season in the corn belt. All the corn finished hard and firm, and in excellent shape for export. Practically none of the corn finished soft. Heretofore all the cattle have been fed on corn that was not fit for export. The farmers have all learned that when corn is good enough to be exported it will bring them higher prices than they can obtain by turning such corn into fat cattle and selling the cattle. This is especially true this year when corn is bringing a good round price. The condition that prevails in the corn seed feeding states, is also one that indicates there will be a much greater demand than the supply will be able to care for, for fed cattle. The feeders of the South have played in hard luck for several years. They are afraid to go heavily into the business this season. At best today they are merely nibbling at it. When the fed cattle are placed on the market the packers will find their customary supply lacks a great deal of being up to the average, while there is nothing to

indicate that there will be any falling off in the demand. This will naturally force the packers to pay fancy prices to induce those who have fed cattle to rush them to market.

"I also wish to say that I believe that Kansas City is destined to outstrip Chicago as a cattle center. The immense packery of Nelson Morris now under construction there will be opened by Jan. 1, and this will increase the demand for stock of all kinds. Ruddy Brothers have also a contract to put a plant there. I further believe from talks I have had with packers that as soon as Texas produces hogs enough to justify the move, that additional packing houses will be erected here. The packing house people appear to think that it will be at least three years before this condition will prevail. I know that both Nelson Morris and the Schwarzebird and Sulzberger people are ready to come here as soon as hog supply is assured."

An Interesting Meeting.

Sanco, Nov. 19, 1904.

Meeting called for purpose of discussing means of securing a gin, and of improving the school and of discussing any other subject of importance to the community. Meeting was called to order by L. S. Bird. M. B. Ulmer was elected temporary chairman. S. I. Bird was elected secretary. Temporary chairman and secretary were made permanent. The subject of building a new school house was introduced by S. S. Craddock and an informal discussion was held.

Resolved: That the sense of this meeting is that Horse Mountain school, Meadow Mountain school and Sanco school should be consolidated. Adjourned at 12:40 p. m., to meet at 2:30 p. m.

At 2:30 p. m.—House came to order, Chairman, M. B. Ulmer in the chair.

Resolved: That we encourage the cotton raisers of this section to contribute \$1.50 per bale, above usual charges as a bonus during the first season to anyone putting in a sufficient and satisfactory gin plant in this community, with two or more gin stands, and with ample power to run same, same to be ready for ginning in time for ginning season of 1905.

Resolved: That chair be empowered to appoint two other committeemen, with himself as chairman, to carry out sense of foregoing resolution.

Pursuant to this resolution, S. S. Craddock and W. R. Preslar were appointed.

Meeting adjourned to meet Thursday before the third Sunday in each month, 9 a. m.

Election Aftermath.

The plurality of President Roosevelt, according to all returns, has exceeded 2,000,000, the greatest plurality ever given an American candidate. The nearest approach to this vote was in 1896 when McKinley received a plurality approximating 850,000, and in 1872 when Grant received 762,991 plurality.

Missouri has been carried from the solid south democratic column to the republican list as far as the presidential election is concerned, although, Hon. Joseph W. Folk, the Democratic nominee, was elected governor.

Colorado, which went for Bryan in 1900, had gone republican in the presidential race, but elected Hon. Alva Adams, democrat, for governor.

Maryland went republican also. Twelve states, with 133 electoral votes, are carried by Parker, while Roosevelt carried all the other states and swept the northern states, his plurality in Pennsylvania reaching 485,000, and his total electoral vote amounting to 343.

Judge Parker carried Greater New York by 41,000 votes.

President Roosevelt's plurality in New York State amounts to 174,000. He carried Esopus township, home of Judge Parker, and in many localities he ran ahead of his ticket, notably in Massachusetts where he secured a plurality of 86,000 votes while the republican candidate for governor was defeated by 35,000. The legislature will be republican in that state and the entire republican ticket, with the exception of governor, was elected. In Missouri similar conditions obtained.

In Nebraska the legislature will be republican, but at the time this is written, the governor-

ship is in doubt, although it is probable the democratic nominee may be elected.

There is a curious situation in Minnesota, Roosevelt secured 125,000 plurality, but the democratic governor and republican lieutenant governor were elected.

Chairman Babcock, of the republican committee, has been returned to congress, but Chairman Cowherd, of the democratic congressional committee was defeated.

Chairman Evans, of the democratic state committee, concedes the election of eight republican congressmen in Missouri.

The republic of Panama was greatly pleased over the election of Roosevelt. The democratic party, it is said, will re-organize. The leaders are not downcast, but will formulate plans whereby the grand democracy of the country will go on, and, not disheartened or discouraged by this set back, will grow in power and sweep on to victory four years hence.

The court met November 15th, to regular session. Present: G. W. Peryman, County Judge; Commissioners W. R. Pruitt, B. A. Taylor, A. J. Adkins, Clerk J. W. Barnett; Sheriff W. B. Green.

The court canvassed the recent election and declared the result.

In the canvass of the vote for Constable of precinct No. 1 it was ordered that another election be held on Saturday December 10 to elect a Constable for precinct No. 1.

The quarterly report of C. L. Hughes County treasurer for receipts and expenditures from August 8, 1904 to November 14, 1904 was received and approved.

Ordered that the bid of Sam Cooper for erecting a bridge across West Live Oak on Robert Lee and Mount Marguerite road for sum of \$75 be accepted and B. A. Taylor be appointed to superintend the work of same, material to be furnished by Coke county.

Ordered by the court that the taxes heretofore levied on the L. L. Standiver survey for the reason of error of land Commissioner in abstracting same while the land belonged to the state.

Ordered that the official bond of J. D. Jowers as county Judge be set at \$1,000; as County Commissioner \$3,000; and as Ex-Officio County Superintendent \$1,000.

Ordered that bond of W. T. Hazlewood be set at state bond \$700, County \$500 and \$12,000, as \$3,000.

Ordered that the official bond of J. W. Vessell as Hide and Animal Inspector be set at \$1,000.

Ordered that the official bond of W. F. Robinson as County Attorney be set at \$2,500.

Ordered that the official bond of J. W. Vessell as Hide and Animal Inspector be set at \$1,000.

Ordered that the official bond of each of the elected Justices of the Peace be set at \$1,000 each.

Ordered that the official bond of each Constable be placed at \$500 each.

Ordered that the following named officers be allowed the amounts set opposite their names for attendance at court: J. D. Jowers, two days \$6; W. R. Pruitt, six days \$18; B. A. Taylor, six days \$18; T. J. Goss, two days \$6.

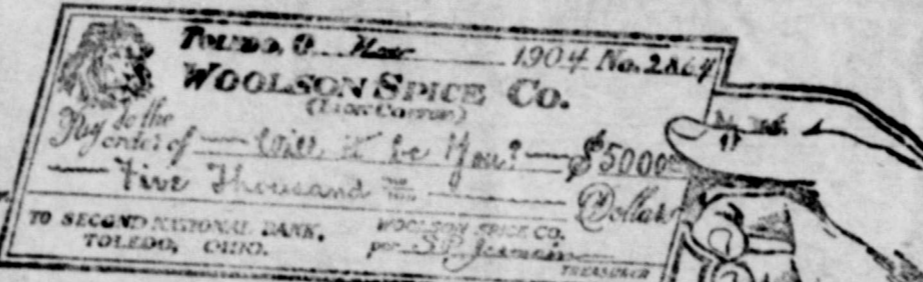
