Texas Industrial Congress The fourth annual convention ual convention will be held in Dallas in the auditoriun of the Chamber of Commerce, Thursday, December 12, 1912. The principal feature will be the awarding of the $\$ 10$, 000 in gold prizes offered by the Congress for best yields of corn cotton, caffir corn and milo maize produced in the state this year.
The prizes offered are divided
into four classes. $\$ 5,000$ in
cash are to be given to the twenty nine contestants in class A who produce the largent com bined yields of cowpeas, kaffir corn or milo maize, cotton and corn on ten acres. The firs prize in this class is $\$ 1,000$, second, $\$ 750$, third, 8500 , fourth $\$ 250$, and twenty five of $\$ 100$ each.
In class B $\$ 1.500$ is offered to the boys and girls of the state who make the best yields from one acre of corn. The prize money is divided as follows: $\$ 250$ to the first; $\$ 125$ to the sec ond; $\$ 75$ to the third; $\$ 50$ to the fourth and $\$ 25$ each to the nex forty winning contestants, \$1, 500 will also be awarded to the boys and girls in class C who
