Recommends Court to Settle Injuries.

Dallas, Texas, November.—Tom Finty, Jr., staff correspondent of the Dallas News and one of the most competent citizens in Texas, has rendered a report to the Texas Welfare Commission on Compensation to Employes for Casualties Occurring in Course of Employment, in which he directs attention to the waste resulting from our present system of settling personal injury cases. Mr. Finty quotes from a statement by the committee of the Wisconsin Legislature, which investigated the subject and drafted the workmen's compensation law of that state. It says that "under the old system (similar to the one now in use in Texas) in order for an employer to pay about \$18 to an injured employe for or on account of injury, it required \$82 to carry the \$18 to him." The damage suit lawyer, who suffers no injury whatever, usually gets half the award, and court costs and other items make up the remainder of the expense.

Mr. Finty recommends the establishment of an industrial court of competent jurisdiction, similar to that now employed by the state of Wisconsin, to settle personal injury claims and eliminate as far as possible the waste resulting from our present system and give all injured workmen reasonable and prompt compensation.

PROGRAM OF THE TEACHERS INSTITUTE

To be Held at Robert Lee, Texas
Monday December 16th to 20th
Inclusive - A Session of
Five Days.

The Coke County Teachers' Institute will be held in Robert Lee, Texas, December 16th to 20th inclusive.

The Institute is one of the means provided by law, whereby the teachers may prepare themselves to do more efficient work in the school room, and to this end the state pays full salary for bona fide attendance and has the right to demand faithful work.

All teachers are expected to study the program and come prepared to take part in the discussions. Every teacher should bring a copy of some book on Education, Methods and Management, or Professional Culture.

Two texts have been selected as the basis of our studies this year viz: Sutton & Horn's School Room Essentials, cash price \$1.25, may be ordered from C. A. Bryant & Co., Dallas, Texas; Ritchie's Primer of Sanitation, price 50 cents from the World Book Co., Yonkers, New York. These books have been used in many institutes throughout the state this year with good success, and to obtain the best results it will be necessary that you own at least one of these books and make arrangements to have access to the other.

All teachers who have made either verbal or written contracts to teach in the schools of Coke county are required by law to attend the full time and the County Superintendent has no authority to suspend the law or excuse the teacher from such attendance.

All teachers whether teaching in Independent Districts or not should file their certificates with me for registration according to law. Some have not done so, and I request that this be done immediately.

Trustees and other friends of education are cordially invited to attend the institute and take an active part in the discussions.

The program is to a certain extent advisory, and it may become necessary to revise the same in order to place some teachers on the same where they have been inadvertently left off.

Let everybody assist in making the Institute the best ever held in the county.
