

Commissioner's Court.

The Honorable Commissioners Court met May 11th. All Commissioners were present, and the following business was disposed of:

Ordered that B. W. Bilbo, J. P. Breedlove, I. A. Bird and Lewis Tucker be allowed \$4 each for two days reviewing out Sand Springs public road and W. F. Scarborough be allowed \$2 for viewing out said road.

Ordered that M. H. Havens, J. J. Yarbrough and J. J. Casey be allowed \$8 each for viewing out public road.

Ordered that the quarterly report of Mrs. Annie Parker, Treasurer of Coke county, for receipts and expenditures from July 9th to May 11th, 1914, be approved.

Ordered by the Court that Common School District No. 28, be abolished.

Ordered by the Court that Common School District No. 26, be abolished.

Ordered that a change in School District No. 17, be made as follows: Beginning in the boundary line of said District at Northeast corner, section 32, thence west, with south line of section 16, thence north with west line of said section to its northwest corner, thence west with north line to said line south of southwest corner of section 307.

Ordered that boundary line of School District No. 9, be changed in accordance with field notes now of record in minutes of Court.

Application of road of the third class made, to run from T. J. Rankin place, thence north, between said Rankin and W. J. Varnadore to said Rankin's northwest corner, thence west to east line of W. L. Clawson's place, thence north with said Clawson's east line to south line of section 411, thence west to southwest corner of section 412, thence northwest to southeast corner of Claud Landers place and northeast corner of J. B. Robertson place, thence west to west bank of Yellow Wolf Creek. The following Jury of View was appointed: J. B. Robertson, A. F. Daffern, Hickey Stone and D. C. Landers.

Ordered that boundary line of Sanco, Common School District No. 5, be changed in accordance with field notes now on record in the minutes of the Court.

Ordered that an election to be held in Sanco School District No. 5, on the 24th day of June, to determine whether the special school tax of 20 cents on the \$100.00 valuation, now being levied and collected, be increased to 40 cents on the \$100.00 valuation.

The report of J. B. McCutchen as Road Supervisor, of precinct No. 2, was received and approved.

The report of D. I. Fields as road supervisor, of precinct No. 3, was received and approved.

The report of Sam Sayner, as road supervisor of precinct No. 4, was received and approved.

Ordered that the report of Will Hickman, Sheriff, for fines and moneys, collected for the county, be approved.

Ordered that the quarterly report of G. S. Arnold, County Judge, for moneys received since filing last report, be approved.

Ordered that the quarterly report of R. E. Douglas, County Clerk, for fines and moneys collected for the county, be approved.

Ordered that the report of J. E. Greer, County Attorney, for fines and moneys collected, be approved.

The Jury of View, B. W. Bilbo, J. P. Breedlove, I. A. Bird, L. G. Tucker, and W. F. Scarborough appointed to view out a public road in the Sanco and Silver section, reported the total cost of damages to be \$310.00. In the matter of the above, it was ordered that the same be passed over until the next term of Court.

GOOD RAINS OVER COUNTY

Good Season, Crop Growing Nicely. Plenty of Grass and Cattle Rolling Fat—Prosperity Reigns Supreme Over Coke.

Coke county is just now bathed in mud and is wetter than it has been for years at this time. On a good, deep season, numerous rains have been added. It has been cloudy and drizzling throughout the week. Saturday morning, a little less than an inch and a half fell. Some parts of the county even got more.

Crops are all up and growing with a whoop. It looks now like this will be a banner year. A good crop can be made on very little rainfall the balance of the year, owing to the great amount of moisture in the ground.

To the above was added over three inches of rain, which fell throughout the day, Wednesday, and all night Wednesday night. Never was there a time that the ground was wet deeper than at this time. Our farmers will be enabled to make a bumper crop with a very limited amount of rain for the balance of the year. Every one is confident the biggest crop in our history will be harvested this year. We are told by our farmers that a good crop of maize and cane will be harvested without any more rain.

My Dear Sir:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your favor of May 14th, and in reply, beg to advise that there are between 3200 and 3800 licensed retail liquor dealers in Texas, and the amount of revenue derived from these liquor joints is approximately One Million dollars.

The amount which it would be necessary to assess in ad valorem taxes to make up this deficiency in revenue would be about 3c on the \$100 valuation. The most conservative statistics available say that 75 per cent of the crime committed throughout the country, is caused either directly or indirectly from the use of whiskey.

It is a conservative estimate to state that the cost in the prosecution of crimes committed through the use of liquor is about \$10.00 to every \$1.00 of revenue paid into the treasury. There is no shadow of doubt but what the Comptroller's office will show to any unprejudiced, fair minded man, that the adoption of State Wide prohibition and the abolishing of the liquor traffic in Texas would be the best investment that the people of Texas could make from a financial standpoint.

clans invariably undertake to perform legislative miracles such as casting out witches with the flame of a torch, suborning conscience with shackles and enforcing opinions with the guillotine.

Laymen Plead for a Consecrated Ministry.

A preacher who graduates from the pulpit into politics becomes a menace to good government and likewise a politician who occupies the pulpit debauches the church and becomes a menace to religion. These occupations will not blend. No free government can long exist if the church perform its missions to society when preachers and politicians temporarily exchange callings and a civilization that will countenance such conduct will soon decay. Such a traffic in occupations is as unsound in principle as the white slave trade is immoral in practice.

The hand that passes the sacrament should not collect slush funds for political purposes. The gentle voice that comforts us in sorrow and pronounces the last sad rite upon our departed loved ones should not rave and rant on the hustings. We do not believe that a preacher can manipulate political machinery and be righteous any more than he could become a burglar and be honest. It is no more wicked for a priest to sell penance than for a preacher to grow rich selling political newspapers. We think it is as immoral for a preacher to seek to lobby while he preaches as it would be for him to gamble while he preaches.

There never was a time when preachers and politicians formed an unholy alliance that civilization did not shriek out and christianity cry aloud.

We appeal to the laymen of Texas to demand that political preachers give their congregations more old-time religion and less political clap-trap; that they display a more earnest effort to reach the hearts of men and play less to the gal-

have said "Get thee behind me Satan" a few have fallen with a crash that has shaken every pulpit in Texas.

The ministry, unsophisticated and confiding, is no match for the politician versed in artful persuasion and skilled in deceit and it is the duty of the laymen to protect the ministry against the onslaught of these wolves in sheep's clothing and drive the politicians from the pulpit with the lash of public scorn. It is the laymen's problem to keep the ministry free from unholy alliance for it is said on divine authority that we are our brother's keeper.

There is a political machine in this state that would put Tammany to shame and make Thurlow Weed turn over in his grave with envy, and the pulpit politician is one of the component parts of its mechanism. In our next article we will discuss this political machine.

that they more often hold fellowship with the members and fewer caucuses with the politicians. Certainly the laymen cannot perform their full duty to the church by singing songs, paying church dues and voting tickets handed down from the pulpit by political evangelists. The laymen should become a dominating factor in the policies of the church. Let all the brethren unite in lifting fallen ministers from the sloughs of politics back into the pulpit.

The Laymen's Problem.

It is as important that the politicians be driven out of the pulpit as that the preachers be forced back to the pulpit. We think it sacrilegious for anyone to get his call to the pulpit from campaign managers, to get his inspiration from the cesspool of politics or to get his articles of faith from political conventions. It pollutes the church, mocks christianity and is a heinous crime against society.

We can conceive of no more diabolical hypocrisy than a politician in the pulpit shouting for votes and can imagine nothing more damaging to public conscience than a preacher saying "Amen" to his deceitful antics.

Political leaders may live wet and vote dry and the low standard of statecraft is not offended but when the church turns over the pulpit to office-seekers and their henchmen, true christianity has received a crushing blow and hypocrisy runs rampant in the altar for it is written "Ye cannot serve two masters."

Since the beginning of government politicians have sought to decoy the ministry into the meshes of politics and make them carry banners in political processions. They have taken the ministry to the mountain top of power and offered to make them monarch of all they surveyed and while most of them

HELPS TO AGRICULTURE.

Many Animals and Birds Are Good Friends of the Farmer.

Predaceous animals and birds have an important function to perform in their capacity as nature's enemies to crop destroying insects and pests, according to the biological survey of the department of agriculture. The annual damage to crops by insect and mammal pests in the United States now amounts to many millions of dollars, which is the result largely of the encroachment of new insect enemies and rodent pests and the destruction by man of the natural enemies of these crop destroying pests.

If meadow mice were always present the red tailed hawk would rarely touch other food. It is when their normal food is scarce that predatory birds and animals are from necessity forced to take what they can find and thus become trespassers on man's property.

The coyote and great horned owl in rabbit infested regions and in vineyards, orchards, meadows and gardens overrun by field mice are among the best friends of man, but on the other hand in thickly settled regions comparatively free from rabbits and mice both have to be summarily dealt with, as does the coyote in sections where sheep raising is an important industry.

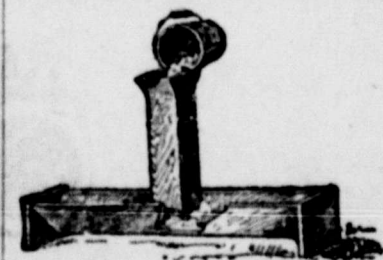
The mink is indefatigable in its search for meadow mice and other marsh loving rodents. The weasel, while individually it has acquired the poultry habit, is one of nature's most efficient checks upon the horde of meadow mice, prairie dogs, gophers and other burrowing animals, and farmers should bear in mind that hawks and owls feed largely on noxious rodents and the larger insects, such as grasshoppers, crickets and May beetles. There are two kinds of hawks that should be kept in check--namely, the sharp shinned and Cooper variety, which feed almost entirely on wild birds and poultry.
