

House Joint Resolution No. 1.

A joint resolution proposing an amend ment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Tex in a precinct other than the precinc of his residence under certain condi-tions, and making an appropriation therefor.

State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 2, of Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:
Section 2. Every male person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State. who shall have resided in this State qualifications, who shall have become a citizen of the United States in accordance with the Federal naturalization laws, and shall have resided in this State one year next preceding such election and the last six months in the county in which he offers to vote, shall also be deemed a qualified elector; and all electors shall vote in the election. who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall officer authorized to administer oath that such tax receipt has been lost Such affidavit shall be made in writ ing and left with the judge of the elec paying a poll tax, he shall be permitted to vote in the county in which he may be on election day on any proposition office to be falled by the voters of the entire State; also for members of eith er branch of the Legislature and Con gress and judicial officials; provided no voter shall vote for members of either branch of the Legislature, Con-gress, or judicial officials outside of the legislature, congressional or ju-dicial district of such voter's residence and nothing herein shall permit a voter to vote at any place other than his residence, if he be within the county of his residence on election day. Any person offering to vote in any county other than the county of his residence shall deliver to the election managers his poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, who shall retain same until the following day, and then mail same to

the person depositing same to any address he may name; and in addition to depositing the poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, such person so of fering to vote shall make an affidavit. and it will be impossible for him to re turn to the precinct of his residence is time to vote: (2) that he has not vote time to vote, (2) that he has not voted at any other election precinct on that day, and will not offer to vote at any other precinct in this State. (3) that he personally paid his poil tax within the time provided by law, or personally secured the certificate of his exemption from the payment of a poil tax.

Section 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. Those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:
