Commissioners' Court.

Resolutions of Respect.
The Honorable Commissioners' Court met Monday June 14, 1915. Present S. B. Kemp, County Judge; W. H. Campbell, Precinct 1; J. L. Scott, Precinct 2; D. I. Field, Precinct 3; W. R. Brock, Precinct 4; Commissioners.

The following change was made in Robert Lee School District No. 20. The property occupied by Willis Camp, Roth Havens, F. M. Prichard was cut from the Robert Lee District No. 20, and placed in the Wild Cat District No. 21 and the land occupied by F. C. Sorrell was placed in the Robert Lee District.

In the matter of the special election held at Mineral Springs school house in District No. 3 on May 14th for the purpose of levying a tax of 25 cents on the \$100 valuation the following result was declared: For the tax 7 votes; against the tax no votes.

In the matter of canvassing the returns of an election held at the court house in common school district 20 at Robert Lee June 10th for the purpose of levying a tax not to exceed 50¢ on the \$100 valuation to supplement the general school fund the following result was declared: For the tax 70 votes; against the tax 32 votes.

Ordered that the report of Tax Collector for May 1915 be, and the same hereby is approved.

A petition signed by the required number of qualified voters was presented to the court to change the Robert Lee, Edith and Sterling road from a third class road to a first. Jury of view was appointed to assess damage in making change.

Additional territory was added to school districts no. 8, 27, 24, 5, and 6.

W. H. Campbell was allowed \$12.00 for four days supervising public roads.

J. L. Scott was allowed \$3 for one day supervising public roads.

W. R. Brock was allowed \$3 for one day supervising public road.

D. I. Fields was allowed \$0.00 for three days supervising public roads.

The Court were allowed \$0.00 each for three days attendance on this court.



Oceans differ as to the age of the falls some placing it at 500,000 years, others as low as 20,000 years.—New York American.

A CHILD'S DIET.

A SAMPLE menu is given here for a child from three to five years old, approved by the board of health of New York city.

BREAKFAST.

Stewed Prunes.

Baked Ham, Cream and Sugar.

Soft Boiled Egg, Toast, Cocoa.

The more rigorously the diet for the child from three to six years is governed the more freedom there will be from the usual childish disorders. The porridge should be stewed absolutely soft, and but a very small amount of sugar added to them. The ham must be well cooked and salted and only a small amount of sugar and thin cream used over it.

The egg, soft boiled, and the toast, carefully made and lightly buttered with fresh butter or pulled bread if the child is tired of toast, must be served immediately that they are ready. The cocoa may be made with half milk and water if the child is inclined to be of a bilious temperament. Otherwise all milk and as little sugar as will content the child's sweet taste should be used.

DINNER.

Beef Stew, Toast Fingers.

Lamb Chops, Broiled, Baked Potatoes, String Beans.

Fresh Lettuce, Rice Pudding.

No condiments of any sort should be used for a child of this age. Remember the taste is not sufficiently cultivated to miss it, and the little stomach will be much better off without these things.

The rice pudding should be made creamy and soft, and there is no objection to having a few large seeded raisins in it. It may be served hot or cold, as the child likes it best. If possible, do not offer anything to drink with this meal, but if it is demanded use a little cool, but not冰, spring water.

SUPPER.

Milk Toast.

Stewed Fruit, Custard.

Glass of Milk.

Cut the crusts off, toast the bread slices evenly and lay them in the dish. Heat a pint of fresh milk, add a pinch of salt and sugar and a small lump of butter. Thicken slightly with a little cornstarch, if the child prefers. Turn it over the toast and serve immediately.

TESTING TEXAS ROAD MATERIALS, UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS BUREAU OF ECONOMIC GEOLOGY

Millions of dollars per year are voted for road building in Texas, and increasing millions will be voted as the state becomes wealthier and more populous. The proper spending of this money is an enormous problem. The University of Texas is contributing to the solution by training young men in engineering and the installation of a first-class roads material testing laboratory, where over a thousand samples of Texas roads material have been tested in the last few months and recommendations made concerning each sample.



Above is a scene in the roads testing laboratory, at the University of Texas, in Austin, where the Bureau of Economic Geology is testing various stones and gravels which are found in Texas, with a view to determining their suitability for road construction. The United States Office of Public Roads maintains such a laboratory in Washington, but the University laboratory is as complete an establishment of its kind as can be found in the country. The director of this laboratory hopes to be able to test, analyze, catalogue every material of use in road-building in the state, and publish results of all such investigations for free distribution. County road engineers, commissioners, owners of gravel pits or limestone quarries, or indeed, any one interested in having tests made of available road material can secure a report upon the same by sending samples to the University Bureau of Economic Geology.

THE BATTLE OF THE TIRES

Agricultural and Commercial Press Service
It is interesting to watch the forces of civilization battling for supremacy. The struggle now going on between the rubber and the iron tire promises to be the liveliest contest of the Twentieth Century.

The struggle is a silent one and there are no war correspondents to write vivid descriptions of the conflict but the results are more far-reaching to present and future generations than the war of Europe.

The rubber tire has been maneuvering for point of attack for several years and has captured a few unimportant positions in traffic, but it has now pitched a decisive battle with its iron competitor by hurling a million "tires" at the street railways and the battle is raging from ocean to ocean. Upon the result of the struggle depends the future of the rubber tire. If it is compelled to retreat, its doom is sealed, but if it wins the battle it will revolutionize the transportation methods of this nation.

If the rubber tire conquers the street traffic its next struggle is with the railroads of the country, and then the greatest battle between economic forces ever fought out on the face of this earth is on, for iron is the undisputed master in transportation, and is fortified behind billions of dollars, and millions of men.

Stephenson applied the steel tire to an iron rail in 1814 but it was 1869 before the golden spike was driven at Promontory Point, which bound the country together with bands of steel. It took the iron tire fifty-five years to creep from ocean to ocean, but the rubber tire while worn from the creative mind of the inventive genius sped across the continent like an arrow shot from the bow of Ulysses. The roadbed was already prepared and therein lies the power of the rubber tire over that of iron, for government builds and maintains the public highway.

But iron is a stubborn metal and it has mastered every wheel that turns; has fought battles with every element above and beneath the earth and has never tasted the wormwood of defeat, and when rubber hurls its full force against this monarch of the Mineral Kingdom, it may rebound to the factory stunned beyond recovery.

The rubber tire first made its appearance on the bicycle, but it proved a frivolous servant and was dismissed for incompetency. It has always been too much inclined to revel in luxury to be taken seriously as a utility machine and its reputation is not one to inspire confidence in heavy traffic performance.

But to those who care to waltz into dreamland, it is enchanting to note that there will be a marvelous difference between a rubber and an iron age. The rubber tire will scatter the cities throughout the valleys for with transportation at every man's door, why a city? It will traverse the continent with a net work of Macadam highways as beautiful as the boulevard built by Napoleon. It will paralyze the law making bodies of this nation for how could the legislatures run without the railroads to operate?

Any comprehensive scheme for rural school improvement in Texas must include a provision for the training of teachers to teach them. Herein is a great service of the University which institution alone above 400 well trained to the common State.
