War Resolution.

The text of the war resolution adopted by the senate follows: Whereas, the Imperial German Government has committed repeated acts of war against the Government and the people of the United States of America; therefore be it Resolved, by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America, in congress assembled, that the state of war between the United States and the Imperial German Government, which thus has been thrust upon the United States is hereby formally declared, and that the President be and he is hereby authorized and directed to employ the entire naval and military forces of the United States and the resources of the government to carry on war against the Imperial German government; and to bring the conflict to a successful termination all of the resources of the country are hereby pledged by the congress of the United States."

Conscript Law is Advocated.

To The News:

Atlanta, Texas, April 10—I have read several articles opposing conscription. Some of the writers were Confederate soldiers. I am an old Confederate and saw much service. The South suffered most because of the volunteer system. From experience as well as observation, I must take issue with these gentlemen. All who have historical or personal knowledge, know that at the first bugle's blast the manhood of the South responded, those who had the red blood of patriotism and love of home, liberty and country. A year and a half swept the South of all of this class, leaving at home the pale blooded, indifferent, cowardly—fit material for anarchists—who lay in the woods to avoid being forced into the army. And as soon as they found that they had a free hand, they began to rob, steal and plunder from the helpless women and children, even burning and murdering.

They had a code of signals to warn against the presence of troops. The authorities had to make details from the regular army to put down this lawlessness as much as possible, thereby weakening the front. With all that, only those who have

seen and know can imagine the terror. Under a conscript law, this could have been avoided by taking all of certain ages, thereby leaving the same proportion of good citizens at home to hold down the bad, and putting the same proportion of bad men on the battle line, thinning their ranks at home. Hence our industries and homes would be protected, without having to weaken the front line.

For the foregoing reasons, since we have so many aliens and enemies in our midst, the conscript law is especially applicable; not to force good men to the front, but to force the bad ones to go with them, as well as to do away with class soldiery. We have an objection on slackers in England. Our country is worse handicapped than any other on the face of the globe, because of our cosmopolitan citizenship and the many races and interests.

I am unalterably opposed to volunteer service. I know the volunteer makes the best soldier, but we have other interests to conserve.

The Food of the Cod.

The cod has the reputation of being as omnivorous as the goat, whose appetite for posters and old tin cans is the subject of frequent jests. The varied nature of what the cod swallows is not more remarkable than the enormous quantity. According to a writer in the Scotsman, such articles as silver brooches, rasp knives, books and rubber balls have been found in its stomach.
