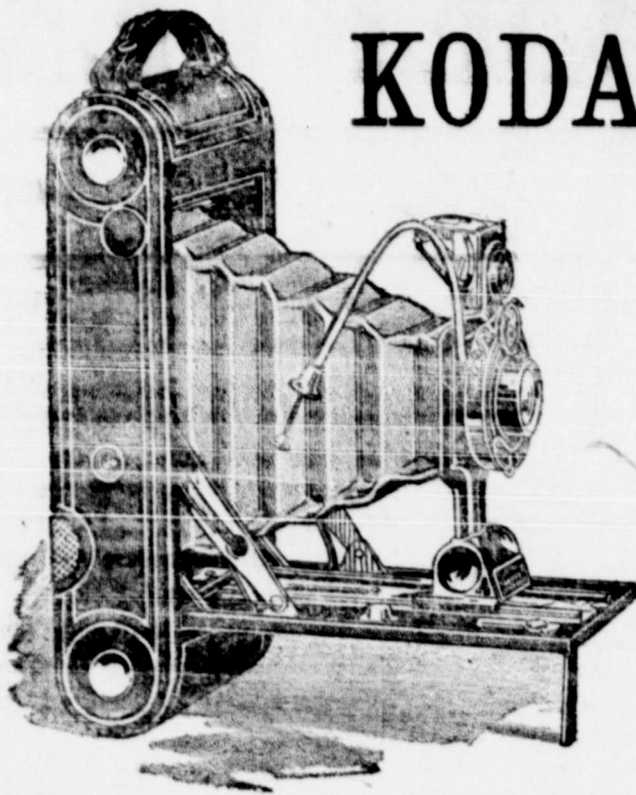

College of Industrial Arts

Word from Denton, Texas, where the State College of Industrial Arts is located, is that work on Lowry Hall and the second new dormitory being erected on the campus of the College is progressing with unusual rapidity, the expectation being that both dormitories will be completed and furnished in time for the fall session.

Both new dormitories are being built at a cost of some \$140,000 each, and when finished will accommodate something like 400 Texas girls. The present dormitory facilities, it is said, including the new Brackebridge Hall recently completed, Stoddard Hall, Oakland Annex and the Methodist dormitory, accommodate all together about 500 girls, while it is expected that next year some 300 girls will room and board in the supervised boarding homes near the campus. These boarding homes are occupied in general by the older girls among the students. The faculty supervisors favoring dormitory homes for the younger girls.

The new state dormitories will have every modern convenience it is said, the girls' rooms being built and furnished after the most expertly considered plans. Members of the C. I. A. faculty consider that her residence and life in the dormitory is one of the greatest contributing factors to the successful education of every girl.

LIVE STOCK HUSBANDRY

WINTERING CATTLE.

Beef Animals Need Sufficient Feed and Care to Keep Them Growing.

In the western part of our state there is little full feeding of cattle. The stock being carried through the winter consists almost entirely of calves, yearlings and the breeding cows, says the Kansas Farmer. Scarcely it is advisable to winter two-year-old steers. The feed will be more economically used and result in greater profit when fed to younger cattle.

It is common to speak of "roughing" cattle through the winter, the thought being that they are simply maintained as cheaply as possible. While getting stock through cheaply is a good policy, there should be different degrees of roughing for the different cattle. It seldom pays to carry calves through the winter on mere maintenance rations. The calf that comes out in the spring no heavier than when it went into the winter has lost money. Mature cows carrying calves cannot profitably be allowed to run down during the winter season. They should make some gain during this period. They can stand a little more exposure than

the calves, and in some instances where there are natural windbreaks or shelter they may not even require sheds.

At the Hays experiment station young cows have been very successfully wintered out in a pasture. They had the shelter of a timbered creek and were given alfalfa hay and kafir stover. They were wintered at an average feed cost of 4 1/2 cents a day.

It is always important to begin the feeding of cattle early in the season. Heavy feeding during the last month of the winter period cannot make up for meager feeding in November or December. While it is economy to let the stock run on pasture as late as possible, the supplemental feeding of rough feeds should begin as soon as the pasture fails to supply enough to keep the stock growing. In some seasons wheat pasture is a great source of feed for wintering stock cattle. In pasturing wheat provision should always be made to feed the cattle in the yard when the wheat fields would be injured by the tramping. This is a simple matter where feed is stored in a silo, for stock can be changed from green pasture to silage and back again to pasture with little difficulty. The change to dry feed is less easily made.

The most important point in wintering stock is to give them such care and feed as will bring them through to the pasture season worth more money than when they went into the winter. Unless this is done the feed and labor put into them have been largely wasted.

IDAHO IS A BIG STATE.

Larger Than All New England With Maryland Added.

To those of us who remember Idaho in our school geographies as a small pink block, shaped like an easy chair facing east, it may be of interest that this state, which in 1890 added the forty-fifth star to the constellation of the flag, is nearly as large as Pennsylvania and Ohio combined and larger than the six New England states with Maryland included for good measure. It is divided into thirty-three counties, the smallest of which is half as large as the state of Rhode Island and the largest greater than the combined area of Massachusetts and Delaware.

Idaho covers an area of 83,888 square miles, divided principally between the Rocky mountain region and the Columbia plateau, only a small part in the southeast corner of the state lying in the great basin. In elevation above sea level the state ranges from 735 feet, at Lewiston, to 12,078 feet at the summit of Hyndman peak. It is drained mainly to the Columbia through the Snake river and its tributaries and has an annual rainfall of about seventeen inches, the range in a single year at different places being from six to thirty-eight inches.

The industries of the state are chiefly agriculture, stock raising and mining. Hay, wheat, oats and potatoes are the principal crops. A large area is cultivated by irrigation. The mineral production includes gold, silver, copper, lead and zinc.—Geological Survey Bulletin.

Col. Sheb Williams Gives his Views

That the real issue in the university muddle is whether the state shall run the university or the university run the state, is the declaration of J. Sheb Williams of Paris in a signed statement given to the press.

The statement follows:

"To say the very least of it, the conditions at this time surrounding the State University are deplorable. Very many of our best citizens have for many years regarded our State University as little else than a combined political hospital and political incubator, in the management and operation of which Socialism and partizan politics have always played the high card.

"This condition has at last brought us face to face with the bald proposition: 'Shall the state of Texas control and operate the university, or shall the university control and operate the state?' Every citizen of the state knows, as a fact, that the fathers of Texas never intended, nor would have consented, that Socialism or partizan politics, or religious creed, or class distinction should be either taught or tolerated in either the university or any other of our educational institutions, high or low.

"Such instruction having been introduced into our State University, as every candid man knows, it is not perfectly right and proper that this, designed

to be the greatest of our educational agencies, should be purged of these evils? Is it not time that the clamor of the people of Texas, who built the university, paid for it and maintain it, for a thorough housecleaning be heeded—even if the process requires a big stick? And if this is so, who should wield that big stick; whose duty is it?

"I do not share the expressed views of those who hold that the fraternities are composed of 'snobs,' boarding with the best families and paying aristocratic prices for their entertainment. The 'frats' embrace not only the sons of rich fathers, but as well the rank and file of the student body, who, it may be, mostly from the stools of the mess hall.

There are 'snobs' among them, of course, but the term will not apply to the mass. "I cannot say that I blame these young men for parading before the governor and regents in special session; with their band and flaunting mottoes in his face, striving, plainly, to humiliate him. As I say, I do not blame them, as they were but putting into execution the teachings of their preceptors and the act in itself warrants the reforms the people have so long clamored for. They have never yet been taught that a majority of the citizens of this state, in expressing their preference at the ballot box, declared James E. Ferguson governor of Texas.

"Now, the regents know, and the faculty itself knows, the objectionables among the latter even as they know their respective castes in the drama, and those objectionables, necessarily knowing their usefulness to Texas destroyed, should resign. In default the regents should put them out.—Star Telegram.
