### From Citizen to Soldier.

It is hard for one bred under civil law to see any practical good in martial regulation. What is it but empty ceremony to salute an officer or the flag or stand at attention while the national Air is played? Why can't a private follow his own wise way and let corporals and sergeants be hanged? Why should a charming soldier in his halo of romance patriotism have to stoop to coldblooded routine and discipline?

Farewell to their household innocence. Those men who are being made soldiers must part from that. Let this hearthstone makeup be defined. It sits in the countenance of a man or boy from it has not been extracted by life reverses or responsibility. It may be vacancy, it may be simplicity, it may be innocent pride or it may be a dainty virginity—but it is all times the tailings of the army mills.

Men are the ore or raw material; to make them soldiers they must be cut down. It is reckoned unpleasant to be trimmed but a man's greatest

trouble is over when he is dressed down to fit the machine he is a part of. Men who have been a good time in the army are always satisfied; the wounds of their apprenticeship are healed.

When we did arrive at Eagle Pass last June I saw in a Maryland regiment a fat boy washing dishes. His pink face was an exquisite map of misery. He stood back at arms length from the dishpan and reached for the rag tenderly into the water with thumb and finger. I watched him too, as he moved about the camp. He looked on every man with humble reverence and even seem to feel apologetic to the ground and air for using them.

I lost sight of him for perhaps two months, when out on a wholesale hike I saw him while we were camped for noon. There had been worked in him an impressive change. He had made a discovery in himself, he was now happy in the pride of a new power. He now walked among his fellows with the mien of a Napoleon; to every man he passed he shouted some com-

mand or correction. Nevertheless he seemed to be a general favorite.

The face of a boy bred always in tutelage of friends read like this: Molest me not, rub not against me. Perhaps you might dust my apparel, but approach me with extreme care else you may violate me. When he has been in the army three months the reading changes to "Be right into me, you'll find me pretty hard to ruffle. Knock me down if you care to take the responsibility.

A minister recently said of the boys in training at Fort Riley that they will not be again what they once were: This is what he means. That a man will lose not his individuality but its extravagances. If he is too fast, he will be made slower; if too slow faster. His confidence will be increased or diminished to match his ability. In a word he will be tempered and sobered.

What makes this change in a man? It is the effect of this being disciplined in harness with men from all sections and of his taking something from the aggregate of their personalities.

Now Americans object to discipline and to when they don't see its end. Americans as individuals. They are irrevocably jealous of their personal rights and dignity. They sway by the spirit of democracy. And they will have their own idea of how our new army ought to be run.

"Are we not all just arm bearing citizens and partners engaged in a common enterprise?" they will ask and therefore should not officers and men make it easy for each other."

This would be the ideal attitude for them to take but what is ideal is seldom practicable. True: officers should be solid now. They should not maltreat the men for diversion. Neither do they. Their commands are not given in an arrogant or rude manner nor yet in an apologetic tone of voice. Officers speak to men sharply but impersonally—in a military manner.

The officers are usually as big or bigger than their respective places; it seems fitting to admit here that noncommissioned officers more often fall down. There is sometimes a man who lets two chevrons on his sleeve get the best of him. When chevrons effect a man it is always in the head. The only way to cure the disease is to remove the chevrons. It is not unpleasant to observe that a man in the army as elsewhere must not be less than his job if he holds it.

But waiving all this the men must be guided by the military bit. They must respond to a command as powder does to the spark. It is the tedious monotonous preparation only which will make them efficient in the last stage of the game and men question mostly those phases of discipline that they don't see the use of.

We want you to hear:— That you may believe:— That you may call upon the name of Jesus Christ:— That you may be saved!

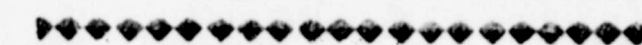

### Cattle Disease Watched Closely

Federal Cattle Inspector Fred Rodway of this city reports that the Jeffries' pasture located in the eastern part of Coke county between Bronte and Tennyson has been placed under quarantine. It is thought that a case of the foot and mouth disease exists there. The case is being closely watched for developments.

"I do not think there is more than the remotest possibility that there is anything to the report of foot and mouth disease in Coke county," said J. Willis Johnson, chairman of the state livestock sanitary commission, this morning. The disease does not break out in isolated places, such as the one where it is said to have appeared. There was, of course, some of it in the North some time back, but it occurred in the crowded centers and was traced to Scotland, having been brought over in a shipment of hides.

"Foot and mouth disease is a wet climate disease," Mr. Johnson added. "It is not one that there should be any danger of in this country, where the weather is normally dry and where it is now very much dryer than usual. Such reports can do no harm, though, in putting cattle raisers on their guard, for there can be no objection to being on the lookout all the time for such dangers."—San Angelo Standard.
