Conspiracy Cases Set

Abilene, Texas, Sept. 5.—The trial of fifty four men charged with anti-draft conspiracy begins at Abilene Tuesday, September 11. The men will be arraigned before Federal Judge Jack. Federal court convenes on Monday at which time the grand jury will begin to grind, but the cases will not be called until Tuesday.

The defendants were arrested during the spring and just before registration-day when anti-draft propaganda was developed in a number of counties in this section of the state, including Runnels, Coke, Taylor, Jones and Nolan counties.—San Angelo Standard.

Major General Visits Ft. Chadbourne.

Major General E. Swift spent a few hours here Saturday evening after returning from a visit to Fort Chadbourne. A reporter for this paper called on General Swift at his room at the Grogan, and while he was averse to giving out anything in connection with his work as a United States officer he talked freely of his experiences in an early day in this section.

He claims the honor of being the first white child born in this section. His parents came to Ft. Chadbourne in the early 50's immediately after their marriage. They came from San Antonio and his father had charge of the military post for three years during which time he was born.

He had not been at the old Fort since the family moved away, though he had often wanted to visit it again.

He said about a year ago he was talking to a man in California who told him something about the country and invited him to visit him at his home near the old military post and he decided as he was passing through he would stop off, hire a car and make the trip. He spent some time at the ruins of the old Fort, visited the old grave yard and called upon some of the old settlers, but found none who could recall an experience of sixty year and more in that section.

General Swift said that he could hardly realize that the country could have changed so completely as it had. Then there scarcely no residents except Comanche Indians and they were vicious and unfriendly.

He said the day he with his parents left the fort a fight with the Indians ensued and an Indian was killed in the house that had been occupied by the family. They had traveled about twenty miles that day and camped and the Indians followed and attacked their camp during the night, but were driven away.

In relating his early experiences, he said a pretty fair illustration about the changes that had come about could be illustrated in the method of travel. Then travel was done by wagon and often very slowly and his visit from here to the Fort was made Saturday in about two hours.—Reporter.

Didn't Know America was at War.

He didn't know that the United States was involved in war with Germany. Therefore he didn't register for military service on June 5.

This was the statement that Tom Whitt, Coke county sheepherder is said to have made to officers, after his arrest near Robert Lee Wednesday afternoon upon information to the effect that he had failed to register. Sheriff L. J. Cowart took the man into custody and Thursday brought him to San Angelo, where a formal complaint was filed before United States Commissioner Jesse Couch in the federal district court.

Whitt was granted bond in the sum of \$500, which he readily made. His guarantors were W. G. Jameson of Sanco and W. R. Walker of Silver.

He was accompanied to San Angelo by his wife and seemed willing to appear in court when told of the seriousness of the charge against him.

Whitt, it appears, has been herding sheep and goats in the hills of Coke county for several years, seldom going into Robert Lee, Bronte or other towns.

With war preparations being made throughout the union, it seems almost impossible that a man however secluded, would not learn of such an event.

Officers, however, are inclined to believe that this is possible and that Whitt's claim may hold water.—San Angelo Standard.

Country's Eyes on the National Army

Washington, Sept. 4.—Soldiers of the national army were welcomed into the nation's service yesterday by President Wilson with a message of affectionate kindness and a prayer to God to keep and guide them. Every thing these young men do, the president told them, would be watched with deepest solicitude and the eyes of the world would be upon them because they are in some special sense the soldiers of freedom.

The first soldiers for the army raised under the draft law depart from their homes for training cantonments Wednesday. The president asks them as brothers and comrades in the great war to keep straight and fit by a standard so high that living to it will add a new laurel to the crown of America.

TEXT OF ADDRESS

"The White House Washington.

"To the soldiers of the national army:

You are undertaking a great duty. The heart of the whole country is with you. Everything that you do will be watched with the deepest interest and with the deepest solicitude not only by those who are near and dear to you, but by the whole world besides. For this great war drafts us all together, makes us all comrades and brothers as all true Americans felt themselves to be when we first gained our national independence. The eyes of all the world will be upon you for you are in some special sense the soldiers of freedom. Let it be your pride, therefore, to show men everywhere not only what good soldiers, but what good men you are, holding yourselves fit and straight in everything and pure and clean through and through. Let us set for ourselves a standard so high that it will be glory to live up to it, and then let us live up to it and add a new laurel to the crown of America. Let affectionate confidence go with you in every battle and every test. God keep and guide you.

UNIVERSITY HAS A REMARKABLE RECORD

The work of the University of Texas has begun to tell, and as it came home to the people their anxiety to have their children educated at it grew astonishing. Looking over the figures, the calculation is that there have been in attendance at this great school 287 girls and boys since its doors have been thrown open. There may have been a few more or less, but that is the round number. During that time there has never been but one scandal connected with the conduct of the children toward each other, and even to this day there is doubt as to its occurrence at the University.

Almost Unbelievable

With these thousands of youths of both sexes brought in social contact every day, the record is almost unbelievable, and yet there it is, true and clean. The University was sending out each year young men and women to take part in the world's affairs. Here and there some limped. But the most of them were strong and equipped. They became proof of equipment, they became evidence of the character-building of the University and they carried with them loyalty to the institution which had done so well by them. And for these reasons the attendance yearly grew.

The complaint is made continually that the institution is not properly sustained by the State. That is true, but the fact that this is so is apt to conceal the reasons why it is so. The great growth of the attendance forces the great growth of instructors; new discoveries or the developments along the old industrial lines have increased classes and forced new courses. To these must be added new instructors and new equipments, and, in fact, additional cost.

Public Not Alive to Situation

If a man will have an automobile he cannot expect it to cost no more cost to him than when he had a buggy. The whole truth of the matter is that the great school, like other schools in the State, has gone forward, as all other things, and the public is not appreciating this fact. Twenty years ago, if there were any, there were not more than one high school in our largest towns. Now each one has two or three. And education thereby costs the public much more than it did.

The high schools in these largest towns are kept to the top notch of efficiency. New courses of study are constantly adopted in them and their cost, becomes greater every year. I know of no city where any protest is made against these steps toward a greater efficiency. There is not in any of these cities any element that cries out, no rich taxpayer who would keep these greater opportunities from the poor.

University and A. & M.

The University and its branch, the Agricultural and Mechanical College, stand in the same relation to the State that the high school stands to the town. In the big towns, twenty-five years ago, property in

the business sections, say around "the square," was worth from \$10 to \$50 a front foot. That same property today is worth \$1,000 a front foot. In the country, twenty-five years ago, say in the black land belt, land was worth \$25 an acre. It is now worth \$100 to \$150 an acre. It is unnecessary to go into the increased value of cattle and other property.

The State is a thousand times richer today than it was a quarter of a century ago, and the people who own this wealth ought to be willing, and are willing, if they knew, to spend their money in the ratio of their increase in wealth for the best education they can give their children.

Domestic Economy

There is another course at the University of Texas which is not sufficiently appreciated by the people. I am not criticizing the people, but mean to convey the idea that I, being one of them—one of the ordinary unclassified kind—have not been sufficiently appreciative of the work being done by this great school. The course spoken of is that of domestic economy. Perhaps it would be better understood if it were called instruction in housekeeping and home life. It is teaching our girls not only the great lessons of how to make their homes comfortable and happy, but it is teaching girls to teach others these valuable secrets, never to be obtained by so many women by mere experience at home. The accomplished Miss Mary Gearing is at the head of this department and I have to become somewhat personal in order to emphasize the care under which teachers are selected. She is a graduate of Columbia University and has spent many of her vacations traveling in this country and Europe to obtain information and ideas for the dissemination in her life work, in which she is so greatly interested. The keynote to this work is in what she told me.

Women's Work.

"Three things are necessary for mankind—food, shelter and clothes. And it is woman's work to look after the preparation and care of them all. Therefore, why should it not be the most important thing in the world that she should know well the details of the three?"

The pupils have in their department miniature homes to arrange and change. They have a kitchen with every implement necessary for cooking and they have a laboratory in which the character of foods are determined, and they keep house, and they cook and they work in the laboratory. More than this, they are taught to understand clothing fabrics and everything pertaining to clothing. This class is throwing up breastworks against home waste and against home doctor's bills and against divorces.

Think of Benefits

Stop and think of the benefits to the world when the thousands of children yearly perishing for need of proper food are saved and the home is made a heaven to the head of it. And in this department the work is not confined to the lines or course mentioned. I ate candy made from cactus and bread made from peas by the girls. And both were fine.—Col. W. G. Sterett, in Great Southern Life Magazine.

LEGUME COVER CROPS.
 One of the advantages of legume cover crops, or rich nitrogenous manure, in the soil loam is that they supply organic nitrogen for the nitrifying bacteria. It has been shown that these bacteria manufacture the important fertilizer of phosphorus from the raw or otherwise combined rock phosphate of the soil. Indeed, the nitrogen fixing bacteria of the soil are the great workers in the natural fertilizer factory under every farmer's feet.

FORCING RHUBARB.

Method of Securing the Plant For Winter Use.

Rhubarb plants will be benefited by replanting the roots every three or four years, dividing the clumps and setting them in new, rich ground.

For best results loosen up the soil fully thirty inches deep, being careful to leave the subsoil below, working in manure down about sixteen inches below the surface, using an abundance of manure. Autumn is a good time to do this work.

During the growing season keep the soil loose and mellow and water during dry weather, giving occasional applications of manure water.

In gathering the crop do not cut but pull the leaf stalks and be careful not to strip the plants entirely. As soon as the leaves have faded mulch the plants with manure, which should be dug in around the plants in the spring.

Rhubarb is easily forced for winter use. Plant strong roots in light, rich soil in a box, water moderately, cover with straw and place in a dark, moderately warm cellar or under the greenhouse benches, hanging a curtain down in front of the bench to shade the plants from the light. By planting several boxes, keeping them in a dark cool place, placing only a box or two at a time in moderately warm temperature, rhubarb may be had from Christmas until late in March.

In the garden the roots may be forced by covering them with boxes and covering these with leaves or manure.

Sugar Beets For Dairy Cows.

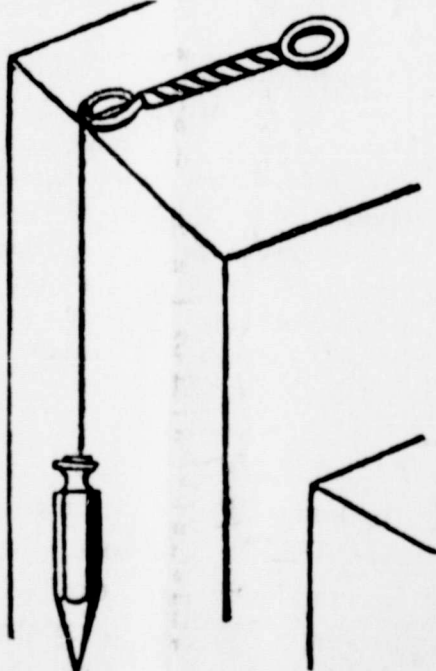
Sugar beets and mangels tend to increase milk production when fed to dairy cows, but experiments conducted at the Ohio experiment station show that corn silage is far more economical to feed. Because of this fact these dairy experts do not advise the feeding of beets except for high records where cost is a minor consideration or where the number of cows is too small to permit the use of a silo.

Cows fed beets had keen appetites and ate more food because of the stimulating effects of this root crop. After ten years' work the Ohio station has found that two pounds of dry matter can be produced in the form of silage at less cost than one pound in the form of beets. Convenience in feeding is in favor of silage.

Self Fastening Plumb.

When the workman makes use of a plumb bob he must arrange to obtain a means of securing the line to some suitable anchorage from which it passes over the edge of the surface upon which the men are at work.

A self fastening has been designed by which the necessity of this secur-



ing it is obviated. The device consists of a holder of wire, about which the surplus cord is wound, with looplike coils on each end.

The length of cord is secured around this, and after a sufficient portion has been left free for use the cord is passed between the loops of one end or the other. This holder may be laid on the edge of the work and will there support the plumb bob without the necessity of any stay to hold it.

Gone to the Army

Messrs Cossie Gartman, of Sanco and C. T. Rawlings, of Bronte left Wednesday for Camp Travis, San Antonio to enter the American army. These young gentlemen are Coke county's five per cent selection of the first quota and they volunteered as the first to go. The next selection will be for forty per cent and will be made on September 19th. The third selection of forty per cent will be made on October 3rd and the last of fifteen per cent as early thereafter as practicable which will complete Coke county's quota of forty.

The two young gentlemen who volunteered as the first to answer their country's call under the selective draft law are members of two of our oldest and most splendid families. They are chips from the old block and are every inch high toned Christian gentlemen and the people of this country who have watched them grow to manhood have no fear but that they will be the same in Uncle Sam's army in France as well as America—loyal Americans of the highest morals who will do their duty in every case and never disobey the mandates of civilized warfare, for which the American soldier is noted in all parts of the globe.

The Baptist Association

The Baptist District Association met in this city Friday at the Robert Lee Baptist church and continued daily until Sunday. Friday the visiting delegates and visitors were feasted by the ladies of the church at the old Day building. Dr. Baton, of Brownwood preached Friday at 11 o'clock and Rev. W. H. Rosser preached at night and Saturday. The Pastor Rev. Weston filled the pulpit at the other services.

Seed wheat at cost will be supplied to the farmers of Texas if the plans prevail as outlined at a recent conference representing several state organizations, according to Mr. H. B. Dorsey, Secretary of the Texas Grain Dealers' Association.

"Not with standing the fact that Texas has sufficient land suitable for producing enough wheat to supply the nation," said Mr. Dorsey, "we have never produced enough for our own needs. Texas requires annually about thirty million bushels at present for seed and for making the flour used in the state, but it has never grown more than twenty five million bushels and that yield has been produced but once in our history, the crop usually grown varying from eight million to eighteen million bushels, depending upon the weather conditions."

"The grain crops of the country for the past two years have been much below normal, millions of bushels have been sunk at sea and a serious shortage now exists throughout the world. Aside from the successful prosecution of the war, I regard the production of an adequate supply of grain as the most important matter now confronting the people of Texas. I believe our citizens, especially the farmers, are anxious to do their part in helping Texas feed itself, and reducing the steadily advancing cost of living, and if we can increase the acreage and yield of our wheat and other grain crops, we shall not only render a loyal service to the country, but we shall be serving our individual interest as well. —Texas Industrial Congress.

Called for Service in the Army.

The local army board this week certified to the names of M. E. Pruitt, S. C. Gartman, Elzie Parson and E. A. Bell and they are called for service in the army. This makes the full quota to be furnished by Coke county.
