Surveying the Highway.

Mr. Davis Rosecoe, Civil Engineer for Hess & Skinner, who have the contract to do the survey work on our Highway are now on the line. This line is a section known as Highway No. 4, on the Del Rio Canadian Highway, which enters the county at Blackwell and goes out of it on the Robert Lee and San Angelo road 17 miles south of Robert Lee. Mr. Davis with assistants is now on the line between Bronte and Robert Lee, having completed the line from Blackwell to Bronte. As soon as the survey is completed, the grading will be begun and pushed to completion. The Commissioners have already made arrangements for the machinery to do the work. It is now settled that we have a National Highway through Coke county.

I have sometimes tried to compare a panorama of the history of one prayer. How poor human speech gains its end without a shock to the universe. Combined science, skill, and wealth were required to connect two continents by electric wires. But yonder is a child whose lisping tongue is every day doing more than that. In God's administration, that child's morning prayer is a weightier reality than that.

These are such trying and real times for much prayer. In the Revolutionary and Civil wars, our churches and school houses were centers of prayer nearly every night in the week. Our heralds always went there to hear the news of the battles. Shall we not in this great age be equal to this occasion? Did our forefathers believe in God more than we do? Shall we not have prayer meetings at least twice a week in each

school house and church throughout our loved Coke county, that has already sent its quota of soldiers?

It would be such a good time to pray for our boys, who are giving their fresh lives for us, who stay home and enjoy so many comforts that they will be denied. Then too, their mothers and loved ones could be remembered tenderly in these trials. We need to pray for Germany internally, that the Holy Spirit may teach them the Christian principles of democracy, for externally our war machines are doing their utmost. But the mightier force, prayer, would accomplish the work quicker and better. We as the people of Texas, the Star State in the galaxy of democracy, can pray with an experience for crushed German peasants, for we have been bathed and brought up and out from the shackles of tyranny.

Again God in his abundance, longs to give us the greatest revival of all ages to react the great carnage in Germany, that we may spell His grace and love unto her in the way that He is depending on us to do in His own great way.

Beside as the coming of the "King" draws nigh our Father longs to do his best for poor humanity, so He will freely give us the greatest revival now, that His love may be spelled out in a greater, better way if possible in these latter days, if we pray for it. If you study all past revivals, you will see their method was much agonizing prayer with fasting.

May there be numbers of men and women all over our county who will join us in praying for the greatest revival of all ages to sweep over our county, state, nation and reach to Germany and Russia.

Making the Little Farm Pay

Although dairying has long been recognized as one of the best of farm industries, there is plenty of evidence that it has not reached its full development and that profits are to be still higher in the future.

Not only have higher prices for milk and butter added to farm prosperity, but improvements have been made in handling these products until what was once a drudgery has become a pleasure as well as the source of a greater profit than the farmer once dared reckon on. We must believe it was the greater quantity of an inferior grade of butter that once held prices to such a low ebb and not the amount of really good butter that found its way to the grocer's counter.



A GOOD CREAM SEPARATOR

It is a fact that the farmer as a rule is putting up a far better grade of products than was the rule even a decade ago. This follows as a natural result of the improvement in the methods of handling the dairy products and the elimination of most of the old system of crocks and pans now made possible through the use of the cream separator.

A good cream separator will increase the efficiency of the average farm dairy at least 50 per cent. It eliminates about all the crocks and jars once necessary under the old methods of "raising" cream. It cleanses the milk of any little dirt particles that may have got into the vessels while milking and thus insures a better quality of butter than was possible under the old process. The separator under even ordinary management gets a lot more butter fat out of the milk than farmers ever dreamed was in it while practicing the old methods of separation, thus making another great gain. After you have figured up all this just consider the value of nice warm skimmilk fresh from the cow for the pigs and calves.

The labor of the housewife is greatly reduced by the cream separator, and at the same time the capacity for turning out first class butter is doubled. Gasoline power is the most economical way of running a cream separator. The proper care and attention to the handling of this machine are important items to be considered in the work. The parts should be thoroughly washed and sanded after each operation, especially during the summer months. It is a practice of some to merely run hot water through the machine and let it stand without disassembling the parts, but one cannot hope to produce top notch butter with such a practice. A certain amount of sediment and grease will remain in the working parts, and the machine cannot do the best work unless each part is kept scrupulously clean. The parts should be taken out, scalded thoroughly and then dried in the sunlight if possible. This destroys all bacteria that may be adhering to the parts and insures a clean separation for the next milking.

It pays to keep a close watch on all the little details as to cleanliness in regard to the separator, for upon this depends the value of the machine to the dairy. A dirty separator is a detriment to good buttermaking and consequently a loss to the farmer. No one can tell whether he is making money in the dairy business or not unless he keeps a record of each cow's milk, percentage of butter fat contained in this milk and the amount of feed it takes to produce this given amount. The whole dairy business is hinged upon these three little essentials, and it is a poor manager who tries to get along without them. Owners should also study up on balanced rations, so as to get the best possible returns from their cows.

The bull is the most important animal in the dairy herd. He is responsible in each offspring. The proper selection of a bull is therefore very important. In selecting a bull the production of his dam, granddam and more remote ancestors should be carefully ingested into, as a bull of high producing ancestors is more likely to be the sire of daughters that will be an improvement over the dams than is a bull which is purchased without any regard to the performance of his ancestors.

WORK OF UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS Y. M. C. A.

Employment for 107 deserving students in the University of Texas was secured by the University Y. M. C. A. employment bureau during last session. In addition to this 226 odd jobs were secured.

The total value of the work done by these students was \$11,938.40.

Although by far the majority of the jobs secured go through this bureau, these figures by no means represent the amount of money earned by students while attending the University. A large number of them are student assistants who secure their appointment after the first year by reason of excellence of the work done as students in the year previous. Then there are a great many who secure work out in the city of Austin who find out about them of themselves and never apply to the Y. M. C. A. The figures on the Employment Bureau are interesting in that they represent pretty fairly the amount of assistance received at the University of Texas by students who come without means and entirely without friends or information concerning the conditions.

"Waiting on table" heads the list of employments. From this source alone students earned \$6557 during last session. "Choremens" ranked second and "Clerks" third.

Under the head of odd jobs, "Yard Work" was the most remunerative, there being \$103.05 earned in this manner. "House work", "cutting and carrying wood", "putting up stoves" and "distributing circulars" are some of the other items listed in the report of the Y. M. C. A. secretary.

A Valuable Tooth.

There is an amusing story of the economy necessary in the early days of the Norwegian theater at Bergen. It was in 1849, when Ibsen and Bjornson were creating the national drama. A lady had been engaged for the part of "second old woman" when it was discovered that her elocutionary powers were impaired by the fact that she had lost one of her front teeth. Impoverished as she was, the management came to the rescue and bore the expense of the necessary dentistry. When she retired, however, after two seasons, she had to leave the tooth behind her, the example of the dentist's art being the property of the theater. The management was too poor to part with it.

She Was One of Them.

Once a high school principal was having a dispute with one of his teachers, a vivacious young lady. She claimed that the word "man" meant mankind as a whole, while "men" always signified the masculine gender.

The principal maintained that there were exceptions and triumphantly quoted, "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels."

But the young lady answered demurely, "That won't do, for, you see, both genders are mentioned there."—Ladies' Home Journal.

Golden Seed of Cost.

I often think of the wonderful advancement that has been made along agricultural lines since I was living on a farm in Old Virginia, where I was raised. Of course a successful man in any line of business is the man who combines progressive-ness with good sound business judgment (with possibly the exception of this year). This applies to farming, as well as to other lines of business.

I remember when we were told to select the best and fullest grains from the most select ears of corn for planting; and a little later were told to select little knobby, dwarfed potatoes, cut in as small pieces as possible for planting purposes; when as a matter of fact the potato plants had barley substance and vitality to reach the surface of the ground, and never had the strength and vigor they should have had, because they had not been properly nourished. I never understood why the distinction should be made between corn and potatoes; though I suppose our "great grandfathers" began this economical practice in order to save the useless small potatoes, and the practice was never questioned.

On this same farm referred to we used to harvest wheat in June and the land produced weeds the remainder of the summer. This year, however, the same land produced bumper crops of both wheat and corn. This was only accomplished through the use of seed that have resulted from scientific methods by experiment, study and intelligence.

Luther Burbank has produced 10,000 varieties of plants by careful study and selection of seeds. To think of the wonderful improvement in our live stock is only the natural result of many years of selection; that our magnificent rich colored beef herds have been produced from the old brindie longhorn.

In the face of the many startling facts that might be recited many of our honest, worthy farmers proceed to plant dwarfed seed which have often been produced under the most unfavorable conditions and many of which are both undersize and imperfect. I can not recall a successful farmer on a poor farm, driving a poor team, or planting cut seed.

Having had some experience in farming, I have always attached considerable importance to the use of carefully selected seed for planting. So with this seed in view, and feeling a direct interest in our farmer subscribers, and those dependent upon them for a portion of their support, through selfish or unselfish motives as the case may be, I have arranged for at least one ear of the well-known Mebane Triumph cotton seed. This seed will be distributed among our subscribers, upon strictly a cost basis and upon such terms as they can easily meet and will also be sold for much less than could be secured in smaller quantities and by local shipment.
