## Commissioners Court

The Honorable Commissioners court met in regular monthly session April 10th. Present: County Judge E. J. Stockton; W. J. Varnador; W. R. Pruett, F. M. Priehard, B. A. Taylor commissioners.

Ordered that S. C. Wilkens plaster the dipping vat at Fort Chadbourne so that it will not leak.

Ordered that the county pay for the dipping vat at Hayrick.

The report of A. J. Taylor justice of precinct No. 1 was approved.

Ordered that the county treasurer pay off one court house bond of \$1000 and one jail bond of \$1000 and accrued interest.

Ordered that a new plank fence be built around the court house and G. R. Alsup was given the contract at \$39.00 all material furnished.

Ordered that the rooms and halls in court house be scoured, walls calcimined wood work painted and floors oiled.

Ordered that T. S. Knox be allowed further time on payment of interest on labores of school land in Cochren county.

The returns of election of County school trustees at large were canvassed and the following named candidates elected: Precinct 1 B. B. Overall;

Precinct 3 W. E. McDorman;

Precinct 4 M. H. Havens

The result of the election in precinct No. 16 to increase the maintenance tax resulted in a tie.

J. A. Waldrip was elected trustee of precinct No. 2.

Robert Kenerium was elected county trustee at large.

The election to issue \$18,000 school bonds to run 40 years for the purpose of building a school building carried by a vote of 108 to 10 votes in precinct 20.

Ordered that a bounty of 3c be paid on all jack rabbit ears brought in by Tuesday night April 11.

County judge E. J. Stockton was authorized to advertize the Highway bonds for sale provided aid is promised from the state highway commission, bids to be received at next regular session of this court.

The November report of A. J. Taylor as Justice of precinct 1 was approved.

The commissioners were each allowed \$12 for three days attendance at court.

## Flye Dead in Wind Storm

Rowena, April 8.—Five known dead, three probably fatally injured and three others less seriously hurt was the human toll exacted by a cyclone which early Saturday morning swept a path a mile wide and four miles long through a prosperous Bohemian farming community northwest of Rowena, Runnels county. The storm also struck Valley Creek, Hatchell and Crews inflicting property damage estimated at \$75,000. The known dead are: Rosa Kvapil, 18 years old, and her 10 year old sister, daughters of Frank Kvapil, a daughter of Joe Kohutek, the infant son of Ben Frenzil and Jessie Johnson a negro. One report late Saturday listed a daughter of Paul Strum among the dead but this was unconfirmed.

Mrs. Strum sustained a broken arm and internal injuries, which it was feared will prove fatal. A sister of the Strum girl reported killed was also injured. Joe Kohutek was in a Ballinger sanitarium unconscious and fatally hurt. Other victims less seriously injured who were removed to Ballinger, included; Frank Kvapil, his wife and three children. When John Kvapil's house was destroyed his mother-in-law was perhaps fatally injured, being almost scalped by a flying timber.

Ten families northwest of Rowena were rendered homeless and were being cared for Saturday night by neighbors and in Rowena, whose citizens believed they would be able to handle the situation without further outside assistance, unless financial. Vived lightning and a torrential rain accompanied the twister which swooped down at the Cross Roads school house, two and one half miles due west of Rowena. Homer Wade and family occupying the house of Charlie Ferguson, took refuge in a storm cellar. When they came out only kindling marked the spot. Their's was the first house leveled. Others demolished were those of Paul Strum, John Scherz, two owned by Charlie Manske of Hamilton county, one occupied by Ranggun Bros., Joe Seidel, occupied by Ed Kunkel; Ben Geistman, occupied by a man named Stacy; Joe Zeryenka, occupied by Joe Kohutek; Frank Kvapil and E. J. Kuhn, occupied by the Johnson negro.

The Kristof school house, marking the end of the stricken area, was razed. Ben Frenzil told G. Schuhmann of Rowena that his house skidded along on the ground for several yards before going to pieces. He was hurried into water up to his waist and had difficulty in finding his wife, from whose arms an infant son had been torn by the wind. The baby's dead body was found at daybreak in a tank near where the home had stood. Henry Beimer's newly completed farm home was wrecked and of 400 chickens only two dozen survived. Barns owned by O

Klaus, C. A. Doose of Ballinger and E. J. Barron of Rowena were destroyed. Ed Kunkel, John Scherz, Ranggun Bros., and others escaped with minor damage.

Almost four hours elapsed after the tornador had left death and destruction in its wake before Rowena heard the news. It came in a call to Rowena's only physician, Dr. J. J. Shiller, who worked untiringly and almost alone for several hours until Dr. W. B. Halley of Ballinger and other physicians from near by towns arrived. 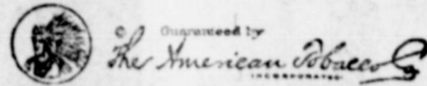

#### Inquiry in Blanton Case

Washington, April 7.—Members of the House have under consideration, it was learned today, the introduction of a resolution of inquiry, which would be conducted by a select committee, touching the speeches made by Representative Thomas L. Blanton in Texas recently.

The speeches and what Blanton is alleged to have told his Texas audiences, became the basis of that portion of the House session yesterday, when Blanton was denounced in a speech delivered by Representative Garner, also of the Texas delegation.

The resolution, as discussed today, would call for appointment of a select committee

which would go to Texas and take evidence of persons who sat in Blanton's audiences at Denison, Austin and Houston, and the committee make a report to the House with its findings as to what Blanton said. The interest of the House of Representatives arises, members said today, in the fact that press reports of the Texas speeches made references to "petty graft", associated with members of Congress.

There was no aftermath in the house of Representatives today to the heated portion of yesterday's session. Mr. Blanton occupied his usual seat on the second row on the Democratic side near the center aisle, and was active throughout the day in making points of order to certain portions of an appropriation bill the house had under consideration.

A large number of telegrams were received by Mr. Blanton, the contents were not made public.

In talking to newspaper correspondents today Mr. Blanton declared that facts could not be destroyed by personal abuse, and that he intended to make speeches all over Texas in which he would "show up" those who attacked him.

Blanton denies that he had a son on the government payroll. When asked if he would be a candidate for the Senate, Blanton replied that he was making no statement on that point.

#### Aid Storm Victims

Ballinger, April 11.—Over \$2,500 has been raised here for the victims of Saturday's tornado in the vicinity of Rowena.

The relief committee also announced today that large quantities of bedding, clothing and other necessities have been contributed for the storm sufferers, numbering seventy six.

Bedding worth between \$300 and \$400 was sent by freight over the Santa Fe Tuesday morning by citizens of San Angelo to Rowena for use by those rendered homeless in Saturday's cyclone. The Santa Fe handled the consignment free of charge as its contribution.

The shipment consisted of twenty-two mattresses, twenty quilts, twenty pairs of blankets, sixty sheets, eight pillow cases and forty pillows. All are new. Most of the bedding was purchased with the funds raised Monday afternoon in the business district, but some articles were contributed instead of cash.

#### Redesignate Road

Highway No. 4 north of San Angelo, commonly known as the Robert Lee road, which was recently designated by way of Bronte, has been changed back to Robert Lee, according to a communication received from J. D. Fauntleroy, state highway engineer. This action was made official in the March meeting of the State Highway Commission.

Mr. Fauntleroy outlines the official routing of the designated highway as follows: Beginning at San Angelo, thence north to Robert Lee, thence east to Bronte, thence north to Sweetwater.

Gibb Gilchrist, engineer in charge of highway work in this county, advises that \$30,000 is available to be spent on the road to the Coke county line. A grade will be made and concrete bridges will be completed on the permanent route.

Recently the announced change of the route by way of Bronte brought a protest from Robert Lee citizens, who met with the county commissioners here seeking to have the route changed back to the old location. No indication, however, as to the reason of the change is given in Mr. Fauntleroy's letter.—San Angelo Standard.

**Gives \$100 to Storm Fund**

Ballinger, April 11.—A letter containing \$100 with direction that the money be turned over to the storm relief committee was found on the desk of the editor of a local paper early this morning. The letter bore the signature of the Ku Klux Klan.
