## Oil News

The Mexia Equitable Oil company with headquarters in Fort Worth, is reported to have leased 20,000 acres in Coke county and will ship a standard rig to Bronte for a deep test to be made on Dr. Rogers place, two miles northwest of that town near the Colorado river. This will mean a revival of operations in Coke, the Transcontinental Oil company's test on the John Saul ranch and the Allen & Chappin's well on the Arledge tract having been plugged several months ago.

In Runnels county the Russell Production company is still cleaning out its 1,815 foot well on the R. R. Russell ranch eighteen miles southeast of Ballinger, following its shooting ten days ago with sixty quarts of nitro from 1,791 to the bottom of the hole. The well bridged. Several weeks ago the gas pressure accumulating under clog tubing blew out some of the pipe and sprayed oil on the derrick.

Gas from the first three wells drilled by the Gulf production company in a campaign ending early in 1919 still supplies gas for fuel for the latest project. On Will Allens farm on Los Arroyo three miles west of Ballinger, O. Wilson of Breckenridge was drilling for F. W. Hunter around 2,560 feet in the well started and abandoned by the Nafty First Oil and Gas company. The Johnson Oil company of Fort Worth on the Lee Seals tract near Winters, in the northern part of Runnels county, was drilling at 2,400 feet and preparing to underream.

For a couple of years, Tom Green County has had only one operating well. This is the test of the former San Angelo Oil and Gas Company on John W. Harris' place, five miles north of the city. Follick & Runyon early in the week had landed six and five-eighths inch casing to within a few feet of bottom which is 2,585 feet.

The Chicago Texas Oil and Gas Syndicate on the D. C. Durham farm in Sterling County, one and one-half miles south west of Sterling City, had drilled to 340 feet and was laying a water line to a tank, filled by the recent heavy rains. J. S. Meriwether, trustee for the Co-operative Lease and Development Company, has about completed arrangements to resume work at the McCarley Oil Association's abandoned well on the Parramore Douthitt ranch, twenty-two miles northwest of Sterling City. The depth is 1,668 feet.

## Cattle Are Dying

Sweetwater, April 19.—A strange disease is killing the cattle through out the range country and so far nearly forty head have been reported killed in this country. The 18 ranch managed by Sid Bryant is the heaviest loser, reporting thirty dead. T. O. Sorelle has, however, lost eight and Big Gainor one.

According to the veterinarians, the disease is a species of blood poisoning which cattle have picked up around water holes. Agents for the State Live Stock Sanitary Commission have labeled the disease "hemorrhagic septacemia."

Old timers in the cattle industry, however, say that the deaths are caused by cattle eating young cockle burr shoots. The following item from the Big Spring Herald, tells of losses there.

Noble Read suffered a very heavy loss last week when fifteen of his registered Hereford bulls out of his total number of seventeen died as a result of eating young cockle burr plants. These plants began to appear following the rains, and hungry for green food, it is thought that the live stock ate them with the result noted. The fifteen head died the same night.

These bulls were valued at \$200 each.

Other cattle losses have been reported in our country and it supposed that eating young cockle burr plants was responsible for same.

## Dam Creek to Make Mash

Alba, Tex., Apr. 17.—County Officers McGhee Alston and Estes, aided by City Officer McColum and Federal Prohibition Officer McKenzie, made a raid on a corn whiskey incubator in the extreme southwestern part of Wood County Sunday noon. They found several large barrels which had been emptied and only part of the furnace and other fixtures of the still later they found a small creek near by. It had been dammed up, making a pool of about fifty yards long. The stream was being used for the making of mash. It was running from knee to waist deep in pure corn mash.

This is the first finding of this nature ever on record in this part of the country, as most moonshiners use barrels in which to make mash. These moonshiners evidently couldn't make enough at a time, and took the creek for bigger resources.

### Burros Used to Warn Distillers

Washington, April 18.—In Texas they have burros that "point" United States, prohibition agents, according to Prohibition Commissioner Haynes, who also is authority for the story that his men have been led to illicit stills by the strange conduct of intoxicated pigs and dogs of light and frivolous behavior.

The burro is a tiny donkey, all activity and voice. He can out-bray the best Missouri mule, of whose size and weight he represents only a fraction. Haynes says the Texans who want and will have their liquor first feed the the herds of wild burros on sugar, thus winning their confidence. Then a stranger approaches and feeds the burros something to make them sick.

As a burro uses his head to think with, the burros learn to distrust strangers. Thus when dry agents approach a place where burros are on guard, a noise like an overtime sawmill in the grip of a cyclone is heard and the burros stampede. This gives time to hide the moon shine equipment.

### Superintendent Quits

San Angelo, Texas, April 19.—J. H. Armstrong, Tom Green County Superintendent of Education, this afternoon resigned effective immediately, following a gathering of about 300 citizen, mostly from the rural districts, who said that the move was "for the best interest of the county and it's schools."

Armstrong sent word that he would resign provided the gathering dispersed. This was agreed to and a committee of six, with C. E. Clark of the Bismark school district as spokesman, was sent to confer with Armstrong at his hotel.

Confronted with no specific accusations, Professor Armstrong maintained his "innocence of any offense" reiterating what he had said Monday when he refused to resign upon the request of sixty men.

The committee declared "Armstrong knew the cause of action"

Professor Armstrong intimated to the committee that he will seek re-election in July, "in which event there will be no opposition to your service," he was advised.

He has been successfully serving his first term, having previously been thacher in the schools for several years.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held on the 13th day of May, 1922, at the school house in common school district No. 27 of this county as established by order of the Commissioners court of date May, 10, 1910 which is of record in book designated, "Minutes of Commissioners court," on page 241, book 3 to determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property tax paying voters of that district desire to tax themselves for the purpose of supplementing the state school funds apportioned to said district and to determine whether the commissioners court of this county shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually a tax of and at the rate not exceeding fifty cents on the \$100 valuation of the taxable property in said district for said purposes.

J. F. Richardson has been appointed presiding officer for said election and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding same, and he will within five days after said election has been held make due returns thereof to the commissioners court of this county as is required by law for holding a general election.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this state and county and who are resident property tax payers in said district shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters who favor taxation for school purposes shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"For School Tax"

And those opposed to such taxation shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"Against School Tax."

Said election was ordered by the county judge of this county by order made on the 12th day of April, 1922, and this notice is given in pursuance of said order.
