## IMMENSE RAINS COVER COKE

Eight Inches of Rain This Month—  
Four Inches This Week—Robert  
Lee-Edith and Robert  
Lee-San Angelo River  
Bridges Out.

Four inches of rain fell over  
Coke county from Saturday  
night to Wednesday afternoon  
about 3 o'clock. This is said to  
be the best rain fall this season  
of the year in 20 years for Coke  
county. The rain has been  
worth thousands of dollars to  
this county. The prospects for  
abundant crops this year were  
never better, and grass and  
weeds are coming with leaps.  
Mountain Creek was higher  
Wednesday night than it has  
been since July 1907, the water  
lied two feet coming to the  
flooring.

The Colorado river has passed  
all previous high water marks.  
There was about a 25 foot raise

which reached its highest stage  
about 12 o'clock Thursday. It  
washed out about 50 feet of the  
south approach of the bridge on  
the Robert Lee-San Angelo road  
which is estimated to be a loss  
of about \$500.

The steel bridge across the  
Colorado on the Robert Lee-Edith  
road went out about 4 o'clock  
Thursday morning which is  
probably a complete loss. The  
water ran over the flooring and  
the drift caused the structure to  
topple over. This bridge cost  
when built, some four or five  
years ago \$4,500 and will cost  
considerable more to replace it.

All day Thursday the banks  
of the river at the bridge was  
lined with Robert Lee citizens  
watching the flood go by.

The government gauge here re-  
cords a total of 8 in. of rain this  
month.

The Colorado river passed all  
former flood records in the  
memory of our oldest citizens,  
some of whom have been here  
40 years.

#### Inquire About Irrigation

Stamford, April 24—The  
West Texas Chamber of Com-  
merce had addressed a com-  
munication to Claud Hudspeth,  
member of Congress of the  
El Paso district, asking him to  
what extent West Texas will  
be affected by the creation of a  
proposed revolving fund of  
\$350,000,000 for the purpose of  
assisting irrigation projects.  
It is reported from Washington  
that President Harding favors  
such a project. There seems to  
be some apprehension on the  
part of Texans as to whether  
or not Texas projects might  
participate in the benefits of  
such a creation. This apprehen-  
sion is brought about be-  
cause the reclamation Depart-  
ment at Washington has in the  
past been very reticent about  
favoring federal irrigation aid  
in Texas project claiming that  
because there is no Federal  
land in Texas that the Federal  
government is morally prohib-  
ited from spending Federal irri-  
gation money in this state Fed-  
eral aid however given in the  
Elephant Butte project repre-  
sented a breaking down of such  
policy. A considerable portion  
of the lands irrigated by the  
Elephant Butte projects are  
located in Texas. It is the view  
of the West Texas Chamber of  
Commerce that Texas like  
every other state is entitled to  
the fullest participation in all  
Federal irrigation aid plans.

#### Harding Approves Irrigation Bill

Washington, April 19.—Pres-  
ident Harding has approved the  
McNary bill, according to a  
message from the president to  
the congressional delegation to-  
day.

The McNary bill provides for  
the creation of a \$350,000,000  
revolving fund for the develop-  
ment of Western and Southern  
irrigation and drainage projects  
the fund to be used in buying  
irrigation and drainage bonds,  
where the land owners create  
irrigation and drainage districts  
and vote bonds for building  
dams and otherwise reclaiming  
lands for agricultural purposes.

#### Sweetwater Building Tourist Camp

Sweetwater, April 24.—When  
present plans are worked out  
Sweetwater will have one of  
the best tourist camps in the  
state. A park of some fifty  
acres surrounding City Lake  
is being cleared of underbrush  
and leveled. Over one hundred  
trees planted last year are  
growing nicely and another  
hundred elm trees set out this  
spring are coming along nicely.  
City water has been piped to  
the grounds and every possible  
comfort for tourists will be ar-  
ranged for. Bath houses for  
men and women are now ready  
together with a spring board.  
In a short time the main high-  
ways for many miles in each  
direction will be posted with  
signs calling attention to the  
"Free Tourist Camp at Sweet-  
water.

The letters were signed "K. K. K."

Early in the week it was reported that the Klan had organized in Colorado. Since that

time feeling has been running high as a number of the leading citizens have expressed themselves openly on the streets as being against any organization that hides behind a mask.

A reward has been offered for the identity of the person sending threatening letters.

ference of executives. Employment of 5,000 to 10,000 more men is planned.

The schedule means a new car will be made every six and one-half seconds for the twenty-seven eight-hour work days.

The highest previous production of last August, when 40,000 employment turned out 105,000 cars.

She has made no statement and no arrest was made on account of the lady's health.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held on the 13th day of May, 1922, at the school house in common school district No. 27 of this county as established by order of the Commissioners court of date May, 10, 1910 which is of record in book designated, "Minutes of Commissioners court," on page 241, book 3 to determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property tax paying voters of that district desire to tax themselves for the purpose of supplementing the state school funds apportioned to said district and to determine whether the commissioners court of this county shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually a tax of and at the rate not exceeding fifty cents on the \$100 valuation of the taxable property in said district for said purposes.

J. F. Richardson has been appointed presiding officer for said election and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding same, and he will within five days after said election has been held make due returns thereof to the commissioners court of this county as is required by law for holding a general election.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this state and county and who are resident property tax payers in said district shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters who favor taxation for school purposes shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"For School Tax"

And those opposed to such taxation shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"Against School Tax"

### Starts Tests in Mitchell Field

Colorado Texas, April 22.—Texas & Pacific No. 2, the first of several wells to be drilled by the Underwriters' Producing and Refining company west of Colorado, was started Thursday. The well will be drilled with double tower.

The first well to be drilled by the Western Petroleum company on the Etta Brennan tract will be spudded Tuesday or Wednesday of next week. The derrick is nearing completion and tools and casing are in Westbrook.

The Morrison No. 2 is pumping 300 barrels per day through two inch tubing. At Iatan Foster No. 1 of the Colorado-Texas company was put on pump Tuesday after it had been cleaned from the bottom and production is gauging 175 barrels. The discovery well continues to pump twenty barrels per day.

Production from these wells are being run by pipe line to Westbrook and Iatan by the Rio Grande Oil company for shipment to a refinery at El Paso. The company will replace the pipe line from Westbrook to the field with four-inch line, it was learned Thursday. At present both of the pipe lines are two inch.

Smith No. 1 was drilling at 1,975 feet late Thursday.

Six inch casing is being set at 1,650 feet at Zipha Morrison No. 1 by the Reno-Tex company and drilling is to be resumed there next week. At Conoway

No. 1 the Reno-Tex company was delayed several days during the week for repairs to the bullwheel and a change of engines. A depth of 3,150 feet has been reached and the log shows that the grey lime, drilled through for 200 feet, continues.

The derrick is up at Etta Brennan No. 1 and tools are being strung preparatory to spudding. Rig materials are on the ground at Murphy No. 1 and the camphouse for the crew was completed Thursday. Tools and casing for this well are in Westbrook and will be hauled to the location next week. This is to be the first of several wells to be drilled in the Mitchell county field by Henry Riley, independent operator of Breckenridge.

Rig materials, tools and casing for Le Sure No. 1 are enroute from Ranger. This well will be drilled by Chas Daniel one mile south from T. & P. No. 1 and one and one half miles southwest from the Morrison.

The Colorado-Tex company resumed drilling at Foster No. 2 Thursday morning at 800 feet. George A. Reese, president of the company, and other officials of Trinidad Colorado were in Colorado Saturday to plan for development of their extensive holdings on the Foster ranch near Iatan. Reese left Colorado Tuesday night for New Orleans.

### Eleven Drowned, 1500 Homeless

Fort Worth, April 25.—Eleven were drowned, at least 1,500 persons were rendered homeless public utilities were endangered, property damage in the sum of \$600,000 was inflicted, interurban traffic was suspended and street car service crippled as a result of a storm Monday night and Tuesday morning—the most severe that ever visited Fort Worth and vicinity.

Nine inches of rain fell in twenty-four hours. All ambulances and a score of automobiles were pressed into service to rescue stricken families.

The danger of fire added to the horrors of the flood. A lumber yard burned, high water preventing the firemen from reaching the yards. Although the waters receding, relief is promised from the flood stage.

Heavy damage is reported in the vicinity of Terrell. Passengers were taken from a Katy train on trestles swung from a viaduct at Waxahachie early today when the train was stopped by high water. The damage is expected to be heavy in Ellis county.

Hundreds were driven from their homes by the flood in the Trinity river. Two women who had taken refuge in a tree at the foot of Florence street were drowned when the tree toppled. Other refugees in nearby trees and housetops saw them fall, but were unable to reach them.

A boat loaded with men, women and children, who had been taken off houses in the Trinity bottoms, captized this morning.

The right field grandstand at Panther Park is half submerged. A number of houses were struck by lightning in the night, resulting in fire alarms. Preparations are being made to add to the police patrol forces tonight in the event power plant not being able to furnish light. The water was reported receding at noon, a six inch fall being recorded at 7th and Main streets.

### A 22-Foot Rise

A rise estimated at 22-feet swept down the South Concho past Ben Ficklin dam and Lake Concho Monday afternoon and night reaching its crest about 10 o'clock Monday night. The rise was augmented by the flood waters of Mertzson, estimated there to be the highest in twenty years, which swept over the irrigation ditches there and into the river. Another cofferdam was washed away for Water, Light & Power company and some lumber, the damage being placed at near \$1,000.

The rise at Paint Rock on the Main Concho was said today to

be around nineteen feet.

The damage on the work at the dam brings the second bill of a similar size for the water works, the flood of about two weeks ago, washing out the cofferdams and doing considerable other damage.

Several hundred persons visited the scene at Lake Concho Monday afternoon. The rise is said to be the greatest there since 1906.
