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TOUCHSTONE TERMS KLAN PUBLIC MENACE

**Says Election of Ferguson to Senate
Will Sound Its Political Death
Knell.**

O. O. Touchstone, who managed Cullen F. Thomas' campaign for the Democratic nomination for United States Senator, says his choice for that office is now James E. Ferguson. He is against Mr. Mayfield because of the klan issue.

Mr. Touchstone said Saturday: "I had not intended to give public expression as to my preference in the run-off primary for United States Senator, but inasmuch as I managed the Hon. Cullen F. Thomas campaign, and inasmuch as he has seen fit to give to the press a statement to the effect that he would support Mr. Mayfield, in order that my position may not be misunderstood I feel compelled to say that I will not follow Mr. Thomas as into the Mayfield camp.

"Mr. Mayfield is the official candidate of the Ku Klux Klan, an organization incorporated under a foreign State, which is directed and controlled by an invisible emperor.

"I would be opposed to any of the great fraternal orders, such as the Masons, Odd Fellows or Woodmen meeting behind closed doors and selecting a candidate for any public office. How much more should I be opposed to an organization whose membership is unknown, which holds secret and guarded meetings in the woods and pastures at night, selecting a candidate to fill the most important public office within the gift of the people of Texas.

"The dark lantern methods used by this organization brought about Mr. Thomas' defeat. It gave Mr. Mayfield a place in the run-off that would no doubt have been occupied by Mr. Thomas. In my judgment

it opposed Mr. Thomas for no other reason than that he would not submit to its dictation nor bow to its decree, and I now regret exceedingly to see him kiss the hand that smote him.

We have reached a crisis in the political affairs of this State. We must either defeat the official standard bearer of this organization selected in the dark by men wearing masks, or permit the entire State to be dominated by it in the future. It has succeeded, by voting its membership as a unit, in putting Mr. Mayfield in the run-off, and I, for one, am not willing to now join hands with it in attempting to finish its unholy job.

"With me this issue becomes paramount to all other questions in the campaign, and with the issue so presented I do not hesitate to declare my choice in favor of James E. Ferguson for the Senate.

"His election to the Senate will sound the deathknell of the Ku Klux Klan in the politics of our State, a consummation most devoutly to be wished.

"The klan having selected as its standard bearer a wet pro, and having defeated the only true tried and tested friend of prohibition in the race, I refuse the invitation made by it and embraced by Mr. Thomas to assist it in attempting to control the election of the United States Senator.

"I think the sovereign voters of this State should select their public officers upon merits and qualifications, principles which are completely lost sight of by this organization in its effort to dominate the politics of this State."

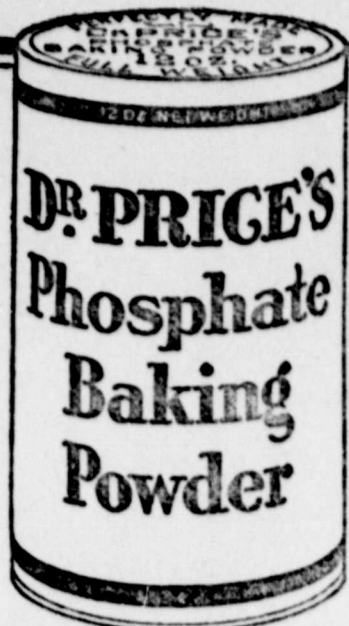

PARISIAN HAS RAREST STAMP

Issued by British Guiana in Emergency, It Has Long Been Sought by Collectors.

The rarest stamp in the world, according to philatelists, is the one-cent British Guiana of 1856, recently put up for sale in Paris by the French government for liquidation of sequestrated property. Wealthy stamp lovers of many nationalities vied with each other for possession of the unique specimen.

It was produced in the colony to meet an emergency demand brought about by the nonarrival of an expected consignment of the regular series from England. It is composed of ordinary printer's type with the figure of a sailing ship in the center. Above and below this device is set in type the motto of British Guiana: "Damsus Petimusque Vicissim." The whole is enclosed in a rectangular frame with the inscription, "British Guiana Postage," and the value in words on the outside. For better security each stamp was personally initialed by the postmaster, and was printed on surface colored paper.

Not until 17 years later was this present solitary specimen brought to light by a London collector and he failed to appreciate its importance so much that he sold it for a few shillings. Eventually it reached the famous collection of Baron van Ferrary, its last owner.

IS EARTH'S OLDEST HIGHWAY

Grand Trunk Road of India Has Been in Existence for Many Thousands of Years.

It is contended that the Grand Trunk road of India is the most romantic highway in the world. A stately avenue of three roads in one—the center of hard metal, the roads on each side ankle-deep in silvery dust, fringed by a double row of trees—runs for 1,400 miles through the vast southern plain that skirts the Himalayas, from Calcutta to far Peshawar, which keeps sentinel at the gate of Afghanistan.

From horizon to horizon it stretches like a broad white ribbon, as straight as if traced by a gigantic ruler. And dotted along the entire length are hundreds of serais—wayside rest houses—each with its arched and turreted gateway, its spacious inclosure, where humans share shelter with oxen, camels and goats, and its central well of sparkling water.

For three thousand years the Himalayas have looked down on this road and have seen it as they see it today. It has witnessed a hundred generations of men come and go; a score of dynasties rise and fall. And yet today it is to the eye exactly the same as in the long-gone time when Nineveh was a proud city.

SENATORS NOW IN SECLUSION

Good Story That Explains the Substitution of Opaque Glass for Transparent in Lobby.

The secret of the substitution of opaque for transparent glass at either end of the lobby abutting the senate chamber is said to rest in the embarrassing experience of one senator with a well-meaning visitor. According to custom, the visitor, a constituent of the senator, sent in his card from the door just off the lobby.

The senator, so the story goes, returned the card with instructions to the page to tell his visitor he was not there. It so happened, however, that the visitor lingered a while and, peering through the then transparent windows by the door of the lobby, caught sight of the senator resting comfortably on a sofa. Senators now smoke and chat in calm security, free always to be "not in" to troublesome constituents.—Washington Dispatch in the Philadelphia Public Ledger.

Mexican Butler Had His Own Idea of Peculiar Ceremony Which Preceded Household Meals.

VETERAN SOVEREIGNS

The king of Spain is the world's senior monarch, despite his youth. He has now completed 36 years as a sovereign, for nominally King Alfonso ascended to the throne on the day of his birth, six months after the death of his father. It is surprising to note how few of the principal rulers of today are survivors of the Nineteenth century. Besides King Alfonso, the only "veterans" are the queen of the Netherlands, who ascended the throne in 1890, at the age of ten, and the octogenarian prince of Liechtenstein, head of his little state since 1858.

ANOTHER GREAT WAR

English Preacher Deduces From the Scriptures That Armageddon Is Yet to Be Fought.

"All devout students of prophecy agree that there must be another war," says Rev. E. L. Langston, English preacher and historian.

"The 1914-18 war," he states, "changed the whole face of Europe and the Near East and has altered the politics of the world. That war, if prophecy is read aright, is only a preparation for tremendous developments."

"The Scriptures state that there are likely to be two Leagues of Nations, and the situation is more thrilling because of the contents between Russia and Germany at Genoa."

"The one certain fact in the future is that the Jews are to play a very great part in the politics of the world. Throughout the whole of Christendom we see Jews coming to the front as never before—in law, politics, arts, science, newspapers, banking, diplomacy—wherever intellect is demanded there the Jew excels."

"The Jewish question, right to the second advent of Christ, will be at the bottom of all world unrest and will eventually lead to the last great war—Armageddon!"

FEW STREET-CAR FATALITIES

According to the national safety council, street railway transportation in the largest cities of the United States has come to rank with the safest forms of traffic. The council finds that street car fatalities are gradually decreasing while automobile, truck and bus accidents are on a serious upgrade. In 1915 the council report states, the number of people who lost their lives by street car accidents in 35 American cities with a population of 17,500,000, was 559; in 1916, 688; 1917, 785; 1918, 787; 1919, 576, and 1920, 525. The sudden drop in the last two years is credited to safety education and development of traffic control. Automobile fatalities, meanwhile, present these totals: 1915, 1,274; 1916, 1,565; 1917, 2,057; 1918, 2,330; 1919, 2,478; 1920, 2,670.

LIVE STEAM NEAR SURFACE

Borings into Kilauea volcano, island of Hawaii, recently started under the auspices of the Hawaiian Volcano Research association, have resulted in the finding of live steam registering a temperature of 90 degrees centigrade at depths of only about ten feet below the surface of the lava.

It is planned to extend the boring operations to cover the entire volcanic area in the vicinity of Kilauea volcano. Those places showing the greatest possibilities of power development will be selected for deeper and more extensive borings.

HUMANIZING THE POSTAL SERVICE

"There is no unimportant person or part of our service. It is a total of human units and their co-operation is the key to its success. In its last analysis, postal duties are accommodations performed for our neighbors and friends and should be so regarded, rather than as a hired service performed for an absentee employer."—Postmaster General Hubert Work.

"BAD MEN" NEVER REGULAR

Product of Early Days of the West, They Antagonized Section's Sense of Fair Play.

The actual "bad man" of the West was a feature of the towns rather than of the range, for he preyed mostly upon the gold and silver that, starting from the mines, had been intrusted to a lumbering stage, or to an express car upon the railway, explains Philip Ashton Rollins, the New York lawyer who has written a history of the cowboy.

But, all in all, there were very few of the actual "bad men." The West did not like them. They ran counter to the actuating western motive, which was fair play or justice, as the West conceived it. Consequently, each "bad man" sooner or later would "go out of the territory for his health or to hell on a shutter." If he "passed out," it would be either on the end of a rope or before a bullet. His demise was sometimes referred to as his "smuffing out," "bucking out," "croaking," "cashing in," or "passing in his checks."

From Bishop Ainsworth

"Permit me to express my whole-hearted indorsement of your editorial, 'Bad sheets in the Meeting House,' in the News of March 2. We have indeed fallen upon days of degeneracy, if the Christian ministry has allied itself with the Ku Klux Klan and debased the pulpit by defense of its methods. What truth there is in the report that half of the ministers of the state are members of the Klan I have no means of knowing, but I have been informed by men who claim to know that a great many ministers of Texas have sworn allegiance to the invisible empire. It would also appear that many who disclaim membership are indorsers of the Klan. That many of these members, perhaps all, are actuated by pure purposes and the highest ideals of patriotism I do not doubt; but sincerity of purpose will not avert the distressful consequences of their alliance with the organization or bring back to them their lost leadership as good ministers of Jesus Christ after their misguided influence has done its work.

Many of the principles of the Ku Klux Klan may be patriotic and worthy, but there can be no doubt of the fact that it assumes to be a sort of masked monitor of society, and as such it has threatened, pursued, castigated and run men out of the communities where they lived, without

reference to their rights in law and the procedure of civilization. The victims of their violence may have been so vicious as to merit any sort of punishment, but this will not be always true.

It is the history of every secret organization of regulators that has sprung up to redress the most aggravated wrongs that they have soon acted upon hearsay, whim, caprice or prejudice, and wrecked their vengeance upon innocent people again and again. And against such mistakes there is no redress. This evil inheres in every disguised, unsworn and illegal attempt to mete out justice, and no profession of high principles can purge such organization of this peril.

The penalties of this invisible and awe inspiring tribunal are inflicted, we will assume either on presumption or proof of guilt. It is unthinkable that civilized men should punish one upon mere presumption in a land where the primary principles of law have decreed otherwise. But if punishment is administered after proof is obtained to establish guilt, then those self appointed administrators of justice have no excuse for their failure to present the evidence before a competent court, that the guilt of the accused may solemnly be established in an open forum. Failure to do so in most instances is due to cowardice. Any masked and sheeted and secret court is a travesty upon justice and has no place in a civilized land.

It is quite possible for exact justice to be so meted out as to destroy the fundamental pillars upon which justice rests. Civilization rests on law and it cannot long be maintained where its orderly processes are set

aside, and guilt is determined and penalties are administered by unauthorized bands of men. If admitted in any instance, the short and summary process will be resorted to again and at length law will be uniformly set aside.

It is at least fatal to law for the administration of justice to be snatched from its hands, and when law is no longer respected justice has no support in the land.

The man who advocates this process is sowing dragons teeth in a country whose anarchy and homicide and mob violence already threaten our overthrow.

It is particularly a serious thing for any minister of Jesus Christ to lend his influence and prostitute his pulpit to the promotion of such dangerous propaganda.

How far this thing will go before the people wake to see its peril no man can foresee, but already the Klan has become so emboldened in its presumptuous purpose to be monitor of all its surveys that its hooded minions have suddenly appeared in the church of God and interrupted divine worship to present their criticism or condemnation. Even the solemn funeral rites of the church have been desecrated by their presumptuous interference.

If this is permitted to go unchecked and preachers, churches and charities continue to receive the klans anonymous aid, it will not be long before masked men will assume to dictate to the pulpit what it shall preach and threaten to run men from their pulpits who refuse to do their way.

Let the Klan uncover and pursue its patriotic purposes in the open or puit business.

And in all these things may the ministry of the church be above suspicion and without reproach.
