Oil News

The drill at the Deeprock Hymen well on Section 88, Block 29 W & N. W. Ry. Co., four miles west of Hymen, in the southeast part of Howard County, encountered an oil sand Wednesday around 1300 feet. Bailing yesterday indicated that the well was producing about 20 barrels of oil and about 8 barrels of water. The sand, which is an excellent loose, coarse oil sand, was penetrated only two feet.

Ben Case drilling contractor on the Hymen well, stated that casing would be set today to shut off the water, which above the oil sand, and then the well would be deepened and given a thorough test. Operatives believe it to be a good well.

Paul S. Odward returned a few days ago for Oklahoma where he had been negotiating with parties with a view to developing the Durham oil field. He led us to believe that within a short time several more shallow wells would be drilled in the vicinity of Durham Nos. 1 and 2.

The Hull well is fishing past 3000 feet. The drillers are hopeful of clearing the hole without delay. Considerable gas showing was encountered in this well a few days ago, and it was reported that the material was very encouraging for oil.

Waightsman's Fester No. 1, 13 miles southwest of here, is drilling past 1600 feet, and an average of about 40 feet of hole per day is being made. The log of this well shows that it is about 100 feet higher up on the structure than the Hull well, which is located a few miles to the southwest.

After skidding the rig, White Eagle's Mills No. 1, on Section 33, in Block No. 22, H. & T. C. Ry. Co., 11 miles southwest of here is drilling past 400 feet.

Cark well No. 2 on Section 10 T. C. Ry. Co., 11 miles southeast of here, was spudded in the latter part of last week, and the drill is going steady. This is the beginning of four shallow tests to be made on the Cark lands in the near future.

J. S. Meriwether is here arranging for the resumption of drilling at the Douthitt well 18 miles northwest of here. Mr. Meriwether stated that drilling would begin today and continue until the well was completed.

A little later on, a standard rig will replace the present rotary outfit.

D. A. Hoover reports that drilling at the Cedar Hill well, 13 miles northeast of here, will be resumed today.

W. F. Cushing, who lives up the river valley and just over the line of Sterling and Glasscock counties, reports great activity in leasing in his vicinity. He says preparations are being made to put down a well in Black 29, W. & N. W. Ry. Co., a few miles north of his ranch. Sterling City Record.

Bronte School Starts.

The Bronte school opened Monday with two hundred twenty five enrolling. There will be many more to enter as the cotton picking rush is over. The main auditorium well filled with patrons, who added much to the interest of the opening.

One teacher has been added to the regular faculty, and one to the music department, making thirteen teachers in all, ten in the regular work and three in the music department which includes both piano and voice, to which orchestra and band practice will possibly be added later.

Bronte has an unusually strong music department for a town of its size, both as to qualifications and number of instructors, and also as to the numbers taking advantage of this work. The school has equipped for this session another room for music and placed another piano in it.

The high school started off with an enrollment nearly equal to the total enrollment for last year with others to enter. There are several pupils in this grade from adjoining smaller districts. It is the plan and hope of the Bronte school to fill the high school demand for this entire territory.

The school is making a few changes calculated to strengthen the work. One of these is the placing of the seventh grade in the high school departmental work. The auditorium is to be used as a study hall. The reference library is being placed in the auditorium.

County Singing

Convention

Last Sunday the third meeting of the Coke County Singing Convention was held at Union, a rural school community four miles north of Bronte. Although the weather was threatening and some communities failed to send representatives although a very large crowd assembled. By noon about sixty cars carrying some three hundred people were parked near the little church where the convention was held, and before the afternoon session was over almost the entire grounds around the school house and church was covered with cars and people. There must have been some five or six hundred persons representing various parts of the county, including Robert Lee, Bronte, Hayrick Valley View, and Ft. Chisagoirne and some other places in this country not to mention the throng of splendid singers from such places in Runnels county as Winters, Wingate, Maverick, Wilmore and Oak Creek.

The fore-noon was spent in the rendition of miscellaneous selections lead by various leaders which includes some of the best singers from both counties represented. Following this the crowd was invited to an unsurpassed dinner-spread along a ninety foot table improvised from two rows of benches. As to this phase of the affair the writer wishes to assure those who didn't attend that they missed a real treat. But the treat did not end with the dinner. Before the table was entirely cleared away sweet strains of music with a voluptuous swell penetrated the walls of the little church, and in a short time the house was packed, the standing room and the windows and doors were soon lined, every one trying to catch the beautiful and elegant strains of harmonious music as quartet after quartet intermingled with duets, solos and choruses followed each other in continuous succession.

Again and again the quartets composed of Messers. Clyde Koper, Barney and Horace Hardy Oscar Robbins, J. R. Jennings and Prof. Seymour, Mesdames. Hardy and Robbins were called to the stage while the great crowd of people listened spell-bound to singing that no one had heard surpassed.

At the little business session in the afternoon the convention most enthusiastically accepted the cordial invitation to hold its next session at Bronte the second Sunday in October. This organization welcomes every lover of good singing at every meeting and if you fail to attend you certainly will be the loser.

COKE COUNTY Was organized on the 13th day of April, 1889, by an act of the Legislature, and named in honor of Richard Coke, ex governor of Texas. This county is situated near the 31st degree of north latitude, longitude 101 west. The

Colorado River

One of the most important streams of the State, flows through the center of the county from northwest to southwest. The valley of this river, which is from 15 to 18 miles in width, is undulating traversed by numerous streams, affording more or less good water. The valleys are covered by a scattering growth of mesquite. The streams are skirted by a growth of hackberry, wild china, pecan, live oak and red oak. The

Soils of This

Country are a rich, red sandy loam, varying to a dark sandy, with an underlying strata of red clay impervious to water and from one to four feet from the top of the soil. The soil of this country is of easy tillage, the depth of the soil varying from one to four feet. A test of the various soils proves that they are rich in phosphates and peculiarly adapted to the successful culture, in dry years, of johnson grass, millet, sorghum cane, native grass, vegetables, melons and fruits, and in seasons years, when the ground is thoroughly wet from fall rains (it seldom snows,) corn, wheat, oats, barley, cotton, alfalfa, vegetables, melons and fruits of all kinds and in boundless profusion can be produced with less labor than in almost any other portion of the State. The character of our soil is adapted to the culture of peaches, pears, plums, grapes, apricots and some variety of apples. This is a fine bee country it has for its chief honey plants catsclaw, live oak, white brush, sumac, some of which make honey in dry seasons and some in the wet seasons, therefore you are almost sure of a honey crop we have flowers of all descriptions

Water Supply

Of this country is good. The depth to water varies from 10 to 100 feet, owing to the elevation or depression of the country, though water can be produced at the heads of the valleys, near mountains, as shallow as it can be found in the river valley proper. The

Cheap Land

In this country are a great inducement to homeseekers. The price of land ranges from \$5 00 to \$30 00 per acre, and on terms that will enable all to secure homes. There are several large pastures in this county that can be bought in small tracts

Robert Lee

Is the County Seat of Coke county, is situated in one of the many valleys on the Colorado River, and within four miles of the center of the county. The city was located by a vote of the people on the 6th day of January, 1891. At that time not a single house dotted the spot designated for the town; There are about twenty business houses in Robert Lee as follows: Three dry good stores, four grocery stores, one hotel, one drug store, three blacksmith shops, two hardware stores, one furniture house, one bank, two garages, one filling station, two meat markets, two law offices, one printing office, two barber shops, one ice plant and two first class gins. There is a good opening here for several first class mercantile houses.

Robert Lee has a beautiful two story brick high school building, recently completed at a cost of \$20,000, six churches, and a fine steel bridge 160 feet long spans the Colorado at Robert Lee.

Robert Lee has as fine set of business men as can be found anywhere in the West.

Bronte

The enterprising little city in the east end of the county has a population of about 600 surrounded by a rich farming country and several rural schools with one and two teachers. It has four gins, a ten teacher school and about twenty business places, filled with progressive business men, two ice plants and a railroad. The school building at Bronte cost over \$20 000. Homeseekers will do well to come to Coke county before buying elsewhere, there are plenty of farmers all over the county gathering enough cotton this year alone to pay for their farms and have money left, provided they get 20 cents and up for their cotton this season, and we believe they will

Yield of Lint is Best Factor in a Cotton Variety

Yield of lint per acre is much more important than percentage of lint or gin turn out, according to conclusions reached in Bulletin 321 of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, which discusses variety tests at the Main Station, College Station, Texas with about 150 varieties or strains of upland cotton during the eleven years from 1912 to 1922. Length of lint is not as important as yield of lint but it is more important than percentage of lint provided the staple is longer than 7 8 inch, and the farmer selecting a variety to plant should consider first its productive power as regards pounds of lint per acre; second, length of staple; third, quality of lint; and fourth, percentage of lint.

The bulletin presents a table showing the yield in pounds of lint per acre of each variety for each year for all varieties grown in the test during the period from 1912 to 1922. An average for the eleven years shows Lone Star, Mebane, and Rowden leading in the order named. A seven year average shows Lone Star, Durango, Mebane leading in the order named. A six year average shows Lone Star, Rowden, Mebane, Durango, and Snowflake leading in the order named. Another group of six years shows Acala, Lone Star, Rowden, Durango, Mebane, and Kesch leading in the order name. A four year average from 1919 to 1922 inclusive shows Belton, Truitt, Acala, Lone Star, Rowden, Durango,

Kasch, Mebane, and Bennett leading in the order named.

A group of tables is presented showing the yield and rank of the ten high varieties each year of the test.

The Messengers Report.

Rev. D. M. West has shown me the brief article in your last issue, under the heading, "The Messengers Report", and signed "Messengers from the Robert Lee Baptist church," with reference to the recent session of the Runnels County Baptist Association.

In the article, the author, or authors, take occasion to say that the meeting was "harmonious with the exception of a few minutes when Mr. Jennings of Miles and Mr. West of Bronte challenged the right of the Bronte church in having a part in the Association, but they were sat upon in the old fashion way."

Knowing the rule of news paper men to be absolutely fair when differences arise on questions I ask kindly for a brief space for a reply to the above.

In the first place, I do not know who the messengers from the Robert Lee church were, as I do not recall having met any of the brethren from the Robert Lee church.

In the second place, I think it unfortunate that the brethren use the language they do as follows: "They were sat upon in the old fashioned way."

If we were disposed to "slap back" we could say with even more truth that the Lord Christ was "sat upon in the old fashioned way", when church leaders crucified Him. Majorities are not always right, and the voice of the people is not always the voice of God.

But when a matter as far reaching as the one involved and that is of such vast importance with reference to the fidelity of Baptist to their fundamentals, of which all real, genuine Baptist are proud it is no time for "slapping back" besides that spirit is altogether out of harmony with the great laws of the Master regarding such matters.

So far as I am involved in the unfortunate controversy at Bronte, I am absolutely without bias or prejudice. And so far as the act of the Association involving Bro. West, he was not a member of the body and was allowed no vote. But, I think it much in Bro. West's favor that the only ones present at the voting for the challenge were the only ones, far as I know, who ever made any investigation with reference to the matter. The challenge asserts that the Bronte church has forfeited its right to be called a Baptist church of the New Testament order. It seems to me that had I been a member of the Bronte church, and present, would have insisted that the parliament

tary technicalities behind which they hid the real issues as to whether or not the challenge were true be swept aside and a fair and impartial committee of brethren be appointed to hear the challenge, the charge and the church's defense, and suffer the consequences on the real merits of the case.

I am absolutely non-partisan, and am only seeking to keep a stain and shadow off of the great principal Baptists have always taught and proudly boasted with reference to Baptist church government, which stain, as I see it and I believe any other unbiased or unprejudiced Baptist will admit when he knows the facts as I know them, due to the passion and prejudice of leaders on one side of a factional church right, who were willing to sacrifice that which every real Baptist holds almost sacredly dear, simply to their light, and humiliate one who was a member with them, and which by every law of God and man, if he is guilty of wrong, should be charged with the wrong and given a hearing according to Baptist procedure. If under those conditions Bro. West is found guilty then, at least all who might still think him innocent would have to submit, as they would have no further recourse.

No brethren, The Messengers of the Robert Lee Church, We have no feeling whatever in the matter, so far as bias or prejudice is concerned. We made our investigations in that frame of mind and are still that way. And in the same spirit we have issued the challenge against the church. The statements of some of the leaders of the faction against Bro. West are all the evidence we needed in the matter of knowing that he had been dealt with according to the New Testament Scripture and Baptist procedure. But until one knows the facts, secured as I secured them by getting statements from leaders on both sides of the controversy, he ought not to sit in judgment. All I want and all Bro. West wants, is that the controversy be settled in the light of the law and spirit of the New Testament and regular according to the Baptist church polity.

Hence, Bro. Messenger from Robert Lee, the wrongs whoever have committee them may be righted and the misunderstandings may be adjusted, for behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity. Then, our Baptist Zion can look all men squarely in the face and say that we have wronged no man willfully.

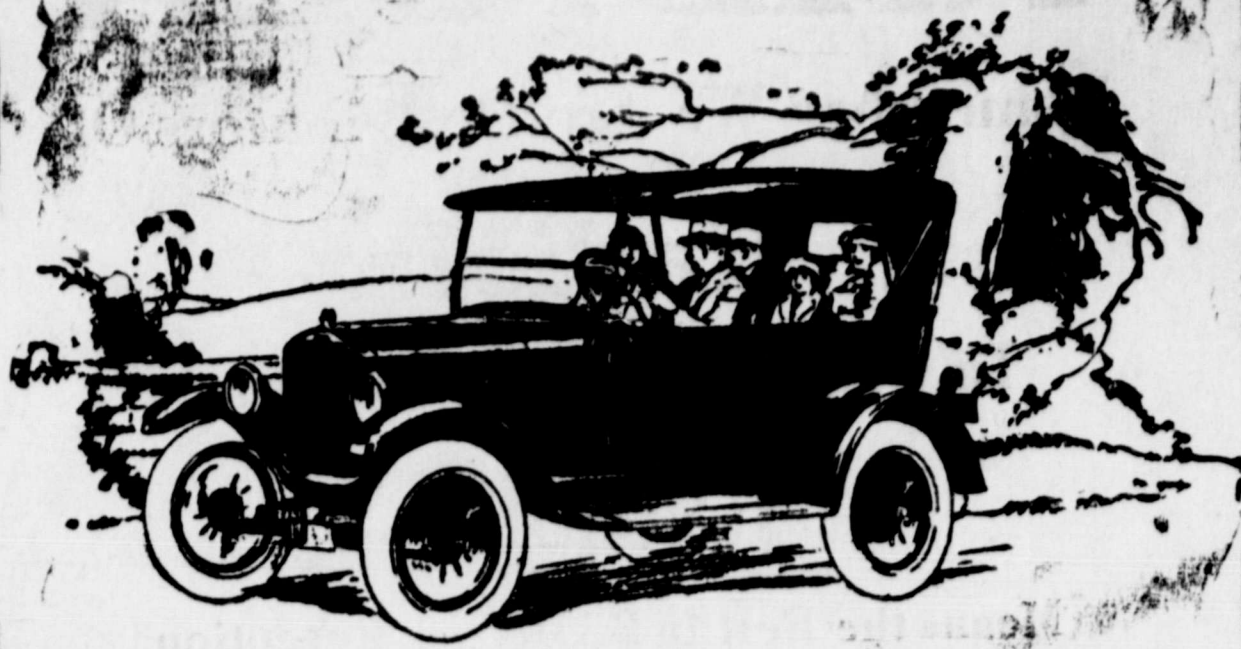

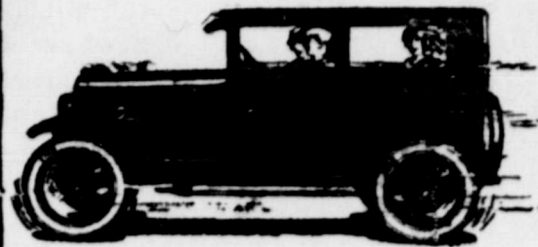

Many Eastern mills that are now losing money are anxious to sell their old machinery to Texas people. Some of these have modern equipment and are submitting good propositions, but there is reason to suspect that some are trying to unload machinery that should be junked. With modern machinery well bought and honest and capable management, textile manufacturing in Texas has at least 20 per cent advantage over the Eastern mills.

Students Save in Junior College.
The extension department of the University of Texas will give freshman and sophomore courses carrying full university credit at Main Avenue Senior School, San Antonio, beginning with the fall term. The authorities expect an enrollment of 300 students. Dean N. K. Dupre, of the Junior College, announces that the expense to resident students taking their freshman and sophomore courses in San Antonio will be \$177.00 each, which will, he says, represent an average saving of \$618.00 per student.

The figures presented by Dean Dupre are the best argument yet presented for educating young people as far as it can possibly be done in their home cities. The dean further points out: "Over a period of 10 years, when our college will have grown from 500 to 1,000 students, San Antonio merchants will have profited by more than \$3,180,000, and San Antonio parents by \$2,270,000."

Showing the Farmer How.
The Palestine Business League plans to plant and cultivate 20 acres in tomatoes next year to boost along the tomato industry in Anderson county. A Tyler bank is operating a 35-acre experimental farm adjoining the city to prove to farmers the advantages of intensive farming and rotation of crops.

Business men are learning that the farmers' interests and their own are mutual and that they can afford to assist the farmers by experiments which the farmers are likely to consider as too risky for them to undertake.

The towns that are making the best growth are those that have about wiped out the division lines between the town and the country. It is not at all improbable that before many years the county town and the county will be operated under one incorporation for the good of all.

Creaked Highways in Texas.
Enough money is being spent in building unnecessary crooks in the public roads of Texas to pay for the maintenance of the roads if straightened. It is stated that at least ten miles could be saved in building a fairly straight highway between Austin and San Antonio without any ex-

The Press and Its Critics.



Everyone feels free to criticize a newspaper. There are many reasons for this, but the two main reasons are that the newspaper is in a way a public institution and as such open to criticism, and that every one thinks he knows how to run a paper. There is a feeling that we are "born writers"

Just as we are born talkers. But if most of us can not write any better than we talk, we would certainly make a mess of writing for the press. Only this morning I overheard two men talking about the mistakes of a certain newspaper, and the words in which their criticisms were made were about the poorest English ever heard on the streets. There are very few newspaper critics who could improve the papers about whose mistakes they talk so much.

Improvement in Texas Newspapers.

I have been a reader of Texas newspapers for many years and have watched their steady improvement. They have certainly kept up with the progress of the state in other lines. The most noticeable advance in Texas papers has been made, however, since the world war. At the close of the war most of them were nearly bankrupt, because they had not advanced their subscription and advertising rates and the cost of everything else had more than doubled. When they saw bankruptcy facing them, they increased their charges. Some of them

do not charge enough yet, and very few charge enough for subscriptions. Subscription rates were advanced by most only 50 per cent, when they should have been double.

If you are making less than twice the amount you made before 1914, you are earning too little, and if you are getting your newspaper or are advertising in it at less than twice what the former cost would have been, you are paying too little.

The Danger in the Cotton Mill Boom.

Those who invest in enterprises about which they know nothing always assume extra hazards. I do not wish to throw cold water on the cotton mill industry, which is just now getting a good hold in Texas, but good common sense should be used in investing even in cotton mills. Before putting money into any enterprise be sure that there is to be honest and capable management and that the business is not going to be mismanaged just to freeze out the small stockholders when they become discouraged, after which those who hold on to their stock will reorganize and go to
