More Progres.

The first of the fleet of 19 ships purchased by Henry Ford from the United States Ship. ping Board to be scrapped for the manufacture of Ford products, reached the River Roage plant of the Ford Motor Co., Thursday, December 17th. Hitched to a snorting tug, the big steel freighter slowly breasted the choppy water of the Detroit River and finally drop ped in the Rouge slip, its last voyage completed.

The ship Lake Fordulac barely escaped the grip of winter all the way along the route to Detroit. In the St. Lawrence it was necessary to plow lanes a through ice fields already for med and the ship with its tug passed through the Wolland Canal on December 15th the of day before the canal was closed cotton another year, it will be for the winter. 
