Schools Consolidated.

The adjoining small schools depend on Bronte for high advantages. So far no definite plans have been worked out for handling the situation. The uncertainty of the number to expect, little revenue from those who do attend, lack of uniform advancement and grading in these small, unsupervised schools, poor attendance and short terms, all operate against system at Bronte. The present haphazard lack of business and professional methods resulting in unrepairable loss to all the children, not particularly those of the small schools. The plan is full of leaks in heavy money loss.

Consolidation and free transportation offer the only practical solution. Some of these little schools even attempt to teach high school subjects with one, or two, or three to the class. Others have but few pupils in all, no life, no spirit, no inspiration, no encouragement. There are from ten to twenty cars parked around the Bronte yard daily. This means heavy loss where a few school trucks could bring all the children together at one third the expense, deliver them to school and back home more safely, and dry and warm.

Consolidation would bring more pupils and money together. Additional and better prepared teachers, new subjects and courses, system and standard work put in operation. The sentiments surrounding the little school near by are well understood, and given due consideration. But the demand is growing every year for training which these schools cannot give. The Bronte work is suffering from the confusion of trying to provide for uncertain numbers and income out of reach. For the sake of the children this whole plan should be worked over before the opening of schools in the fall.

Bounty On Wolves.

Last Monday, at a regular monthly session of Commissioners' Court \$600 was appropriated for the purpose of paying a bounty on wolves killed in Sterling County.

The sum of two dollars will be paid on each wolf killed after January 11th until the \$500 is exhausted. Those claiming bounties on wolf scalps will present the scalp on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays in each month. Commissioner Z. L. Potts has agreed to audit claims and check up scalps on those days.

In order to get the bounty, the person presenting the claim must make affidavit that the wolf or wolves were killed by him in Sterling County since January 11th, 1926. — Sterling City News Record.

A Great Work.

The Ford Motor Company, in all its divisions, produced a total of 2,103,588 cars, trucks, tractors and airplanes during 1925, according to figures just given out at the general offices of the Ford Motor Company. Explosive of airplanes, which is a new industry with the company, this is an increase of 20,033 automotive units over 1924.

In the production of Ford cars and trucks during this year, domestic plants in the United States assembled 1,775,245. Foreign plants of the company produced 136,451 cars and trucks and the output of the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Ltd. totalled 79,289. Fordson tractors production was 104,168 and the Lincoln division of the company produced during the year a total of 8,415 Lincoln cars. In the newest division of the company, the airplane factory, the output was ten all metal planes since the factory was acquired by the Company on August 1, 1925.

The remarkable output of Ford cars and trucks was reached in spite of the fact that for a period of more than thirty days during August and September domestic production was almost negligible due to the introduction of the improved types. The same condition prevailed later on in the foreign assembly plants as the change to the improved cars were made in these places; some of which are just now getting into appreciable productions with the improved types.

Radio Sets Saves Money For Farmers

Radio is paying its way on farms of the southwest. In a radio survey just completed by Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, Dallas, among farm radio listeners of Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana, 163 of the 500 making reply stated that their radio saved them money each year, the average sum saved being estimated at \$149.64 per family. Keeping in touch with the markets through radio reports was named by farmers as the greatest advantage of radio in a financial way.

Intangible benefits which cannot be measured in dollars and cents such as home entertainment, farm and home information, and weather reports were the other main methods mentioned by which radio is proving profitable in farm homes. "It saves us at least \$50 per year in show tickets alone," wrote one farmer. "Our radio keeps the kids at home," said another, while several reports, "It saves gasoline." A few state that they purchased fewer magazines since their radio was installed.

"Farmers are using the more powerful receiving sets," states George C. Biggar, director of foundation programs at Dallas. "Seventy per cent of those reporting have loud speakers. There are five tube sets predominating 24 per cent having 8 tube receivers and 21 per cent 5 tube outfits.

Asked as to the type of music preferred on radio programs, the farm listeners showed a slight preference for old time music over popular, which was a close third while classical selections ranked exceedingly low. The survey showed that Hawaiian guitar combinations ranked first in popularity with male quartettes, string orchestras, old time fiddlers, bands, male duets and jazz orchestras ranking in order as next in preference. Vocal solos, especially "high-pitched sopranos whose words cannot be understood," are most unpopular among farm people.

Farmers are listening to farm information on radio, judging by replies to the foundation questionnaires, which shows 72 per cent listen regularly to talks on different agricultural subjects. The largest number of listeners expressed a preference for poultry talks. Farm questions and answers, cotton production talks, market news, home makers information and suggestions for country life, the farmstead ranked in popularity in the order named. Much interest was also evinced in corn growing, fruit raising, hog production, truck crops and cooperative marketing.

Good Schools

The children of Coke County ought to have the very best schools which we can provide for them with the money we now raise by taxation for the maintenance of the schools. That our present schools can be greatly improved is a fact which any school teacher of the County will readily admit. And I am persuaded that the average citizen of this county is intensely interested in any plan which promises to improve our schools.

To me it appears that the first step we ought to take in ameliorating our schools is towards school consolidation. Within a radius of twelve miles around Robert Lee there are about six schools which ought to be consolidated with the school at Robert Lee. Of course such a step would necessitate the enlarging of the building at Robert Lee, the providing of more teachers at Robert Lee, and the providing of trucks to bring in the children from the outlying districts.

This plan is not new, neither is it untried; it is an old plan and it has stood the test of experimentation. And I do not know of a single instance where once tried out, it has been discarded.

Briefly, the consolidation of schools results in better schools and in the saving of much expense. How these results are attained the writer will point out in later editions of this place.

Interscholastic Feature.

Last Friday afternoon the pupils and teachers of Wildcat School enjoyed a pleasant visit to Valley View school. In accordance with previous arrangements among the teachers seventeen of the best spellers from each school were lined up on opposite walls of the splendid school house for a match. Miss Myrtle Hurley, of Wildcat pronounced the words while Prof. Brown of Valley View and C. H. Jordan, of Wildcat kept scores and marked time. At the outset it was seen that the teams were evenly matched. First Valley View registered a score and Wildcat followed likewise. This continued until each team had a record of ten scores on the board, and it looked as if there would be a tie. However during the last ten minutes Wildcat took the lead and when time was called Valley View was still behind four points the score being fourteen to ten in favor of Wildcat. It would be hard to guess which team would have won, however if the time had been extended thirty minutes longer, for each team was just beginning to enter the spirit of the contest when the time expired. Both sides regretted that the time was so short, but there were other events to follow.

Next came the boys basket ball game. Unfortunately Valley View did not have a regular team and consequently was unable to match the regular team for Wildcat. In order to obviate this difficulty, a junior team from Wildcat was selected to match whatever team Valley View could organize. It seemed, however, that Valley View boys were reluctant to enter the contest owing to the lack of previous practice and soon as the game began it was seen that Wildcat team had much the advantage as to size of players. Nevertheless the courage and pluck of the former won the admiration of all notwithstanding they were unable to register a single score during the first half although the latter scored again and again. By making some changes in each team for the last half the players were more evenly matched but it was too late for the Valley View team to recover from the disadvantage of the first half and at the sound of the time-keeper's whistle the score was 26 to 2 in favor of Wildcat.

Exactly the reverse condition existed with reference to the girl's team and score was 10 to 0 in favor of Valley View. This game contained the best team for the afternoon and all went to their homes feeling that the time had been well spent.

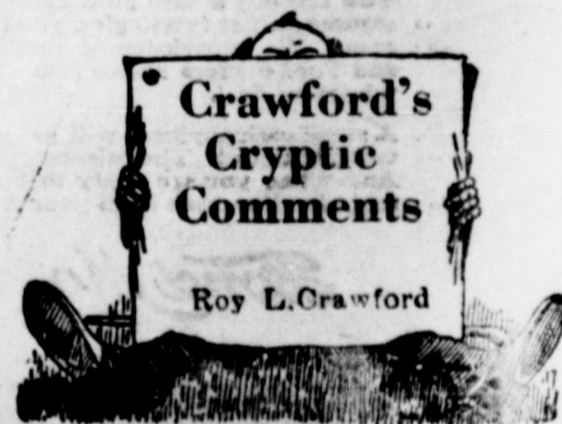
