Spoke Here.



LYNCH DAVIDSON

An expressed contempt of what has come to be known as Fergusonism, charges that Dan Moody has become the innocent tool of the oil and whisky interests of Texas, and declarations for more business in the handling of the Texas highway situation, the prison system and all State departments characterized the address of Lynch Davidson Thursday morning to a crowd of about 300 persons in the courthouse. Mr. Davidson declared that a little business in the State House would be reflected in lesser taxes and in profits that would accrue to the State. He mentioned briefly service he had rendered the Orient Railroad, declaring that the greatfulness felt in those cities now being served along the 467 miles of the route in Texas would be expressed when the votes were tallied on July 24th. Rev. N. K. Simpson introduced the speaker.

Mr. Davidson's speech here was unscheduled having been induced to speak here by H. C. Allen and Bruce Clift the night before. Mr. Davidson's visit to Robert Lee will be long remembered and appreciated by the citizens of this section of the country. He went from here to Bronte and spoke over there then to Sweetwater.

School Transfer Notice.

By order of the school board, tuition for transfer pupils for the coming session is to be \$23.00 for the grades and \$30.00 for high school pupils. At the end of the time for which state and county money transferred will pay, any wages not paid, or arranged for, will be required to stop school. Any who attend the Bronte school from outside the district not legally transferred will be required to pay full tuition. The superintendent is charged with the responsibility of carrying out these orders. Tuition agreements may be signed up with the secretary of the school board by any who wish to transfer to the Bronte school. This will adjust the entire matter and get it out of the way. Transfers must be made by August 1st.

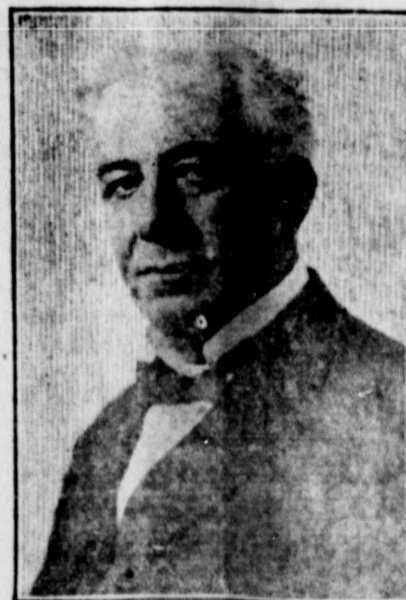

An Open Letter.

Dear Editor and Readers of the Home paper.

I have been intending to write for some time and tell you people how we are liking our new home. We have been here now almost ten and one half months. I will try and tell you something of the country in which we live and something of the surroundings.

We live almost one and one-half miles from a little town of near three thousand inhabitants. The Sante Fe Railroad has two passenger trains a day that passes about three fourths of a mile from our house.

There are six churches in our town. The Baptist people are erecting one of the finest churches to be found any where in town the size of this one. The building will be three stories high and is made of red brick. It will have all the modern equipments of any large church.

We have three school buildings that are made of brick and have all of the modern equipment to make a building comfortable for the school children in the winter time. There were thirty-three teachers in the three schools this year. There were seventy-four in the grammar school that received their certificates of graduating or promotion to high school. In the high school there were nineteen graduates. Several scholarships were awarded the best students in the class. The out-of-town students are transferred to and from school in trucks. Each truck carries from fifteen to thirty-five children and there about twenty three trucks this year.

As our school is out we must think about our years work ahead of us. Early in the spring we had an abundance of rain and caused our crops to be later than they would otherwise have been. Cotton and feed are growing nicely now. Our corn will be tasseling in a short time and the sudan will soon be ready to cut. Our prospects for fine crops are good.

I cannot pass without mentioning our garden. We have had garden stuff ever since March. We have had lettuce, onions, radishes, beats, turnips, and greens, Irish potatoes, english peas and beans. We have cabbage, tomatoes and melons that will come on later in the season. We have been marketing vegetables for more than a month to our local merchants in town.

I am wondering what kind of a summer you are having in Coke. We enjoy the cool mornings and nights very much and it is very seldom that we do not have a cool breeze blowing all during the day.

Yes, it is very true that we miss our friends whom we left when we moved to our new home. We are hoping that it will be our great pleasure to visit with our friends in our old home country and enjoy them pleasant faces for a few days this summer.

We wish to extend this invitation to our friends, "If you wish to enjoy the freshness of a higher atmosphere we ask you to come and visit us on the plains.

Dan spoke about forty minutes to a crowded courtroom. He charged that the present administration was that of graft and pledged himself if elected to the office of Governor that he would put a stop to such practices.

Proposed Amendment To The Constitution.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 and Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit officers of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States to hold public office in Texas.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States; except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States."

SECTION 2. That Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of

the United States, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer, or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States.

SECTION 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November A. D. 1926, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

SECTION 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9

A Joint Resolution relating to the amending of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Article 16, Section 58 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the Prison System under the supervision, management and control of such trained and experienced officer, or officers, as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

SECTION 2. The above Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held November 3, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "For the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." and all those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "Against the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

SECTION 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

SECTION 4. The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, and not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Proposed Amendment To The Constitution.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO 9

A resolution proposing an amendment to Art. 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing section 3, eliminating the provision authorizing the Legislature to create special districts and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the state of Texas:

SECTION 1. That section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution be so changed as to read as follows: (creating new Section.)

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the state Occupation taxes and poll tax of one dollar on every inhabitant of the state, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem state tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the state Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this state; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the state and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general laws; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one (1.00) dollar on the hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by general or special law."

SEC. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment

PROPOSED AMENEMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution providing for taxation of school lands owned by counties.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 6 thereof 6a, which shall read as follows:

Section 6a. All agriculture or grazing school land mentioned in Section 6 of this Article owned by any county shall be subject to taxation except for State purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned.

SECTION 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D., 1926, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon

"For the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county, to the same extent as land privately owned" and "Against the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county to the same extent as land privately owned."

SECTION 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.
