

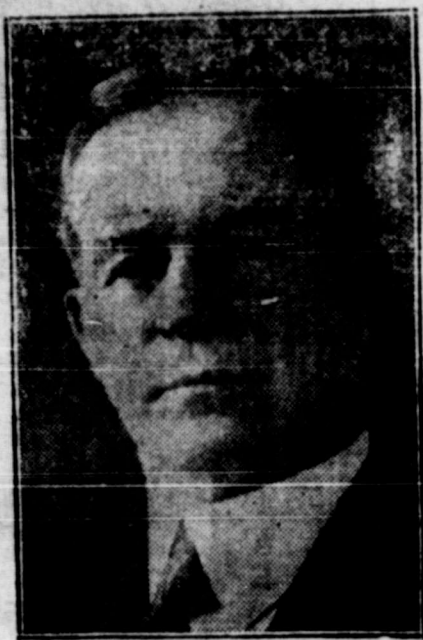

### Spoke For LYNCH.

On Friday night Hon. T. L. Tyson of Waco spoke on the street of Robert Lee in behalf of the candidacy of Lynch Davidson for Governor. Hon. Tyson was introduced by F. C. Dickey, prominent attorney of Ballinger, and a Robert Lee man. In his introductory remarks Mr. Dickey called upon the voters of Texas to forget personalities and vote for a good business man for governor.

Mr. Tyson is an old school mate of Luther Hamilton, County Attorney; and Mr. Tyson accused Hamilton of having fed him so much Dan Moody ham for supper that he could not speak quiet as well as usual. Mr. Hamilton, interviewed after the speaking, said that any difficulty the speaker may have experienced was surely caused by the poor subject he spoke upon.

Mr. Tyson spoke for little over an hour to a large and attentive crowd. He said that Davidson's campaign was upon his qualifications for office and not upon the demerits of the other candidates. "Dan's platform", "is Jim Ferguson, and Jim's platform is Dan Moody." "And in my opinion both platforms are poor ones, altho I do believe that Dan's is a little better" said the speaker. Mr. Tyson repeatedly called upon his audience to get Texas out of the mire of partisan politics and give Texas an administration business like and harmonious. "If either Dan or Jim is elected, said Mr. Tyson, "the opposition will fight him as long as he remains in office; so a vote for either is a vote for the continuation of the present partisan fight for which Texas has already had too much." ### West Texas Utilities Company

#### Highline Builds To Robert Lee.

The West Texas Utility Co. is going to build into Robert Lee and will be here, it is thought by the first of September and ready to wire the houses and business places of the town.

A petition was circulated Tuesday morning by a committee composed of H. C. Allen, J. S. Craddock, Paul J. Brown and Dr. C. E. Eaton to raise the fifteen hundred dollar bonus, asked by the West Texas Utility Company to build into Robert Lee, the money was raised before night. The company also asked us to pay half the right-of-way between Robert Lee and Bronte, should there be any charges made, but we don't believe any land owners between here and Bronte will charge anything for crossing their places, already several have told the committee that they would cross their places gratis.

This is the greatest help to Robert Lee that has happened since "Heck was a pup".

## Bee Keeping.

A writer some three or four thousand years ago, noted the fact that the fool had said in his heart, "There is no God" This interests us, for it shows us how some people were thinking ages ago before the advent of locomotives, fords, flying machines, radio, telephones and newspapers, crowded with crimes and casualties. But there appears to be some today who are thinking in their hearts as the fool did ages ago, and trying just as hard to convince themselves that they are right.

I am glad to say that there is probably not one beekeeper among them, their business brings them constantly in contact with nature, and they can see on ever hand evidences of the wisdom and goodness of the creator. The bee-keeper if he keeps his eyes open, surely lives in a wonderful world. He sees the out doors, the air laden with the fragrance of flowers, all lit up with the song of the birds and hum of the bees. He sees the harmony of life about him. He sees endless methods of producing results. For instance plants for their welfare, require cross fertilization and produce pollen for this purpose, which some plants depend entirely on insects to carry this pollen from flower to flower and peaches and plums are among this number, while corn and maze have a nature that depend upon the wind to spread its pollen from flower to flower and in order to attract the bee, those plants that don't use the wind and depends on the insect always furnishes nectar to induce the bee to visit its blossoms and has this sweet nectar that the bee makes honey out of, so placed in the blossom that a bee can't get it without getting some of the pollen on his hairy legs and when it visits the next blossom the pollen is mixed and fertilization takes place. Plants can either think, or some one has done some thinking for them. I wonder who put the hairs on the bees legs for that purpose anyway? The ability of the bees to produce wax, exactly adopted to their need in comb building, will always secure the admiration of a keeper of bees.

In order to fix them so they could protect their treasure from other less industrious insects, the creator provided every worker bee and queen with a stinger and they know how to use it, and I don't mean maby.

How do the young bees, just emerged from their cells know how to prepare food and feed the larvae, when to stop feeding it and when to seal over their cells, or how to rear a queen? Who told them that a queens larva required more food than a worker larva? who told them to load up with honey just before they swarm? Most all this information has come to us in the last century.

A man seventy five years of age now, has been an eye witness to more constructive progress than all the rest of the world put together since the days of Adam.

Indeed the most blessed time of all times to live in, is right now. And yet we find a few among us, that view the world as getting worse, it is because we get the news of the world daily, where just a short time ago we didnt know what was going on fifty miles from us. If we could cut in back yonder three thousand years ago and get a daily paper of all the happenings of the world, I judge we would have a thousand times worse looking front page than we have today, a careful study of the Old Testament will reveal this. Education assisted by other things has done it, the world is indeed getting BETTER.

I am glad and thankful that I am not on a fast speeding rail way train without conductor or engineer, or on a planet floating around out here in the universe like a feather without one to guide the development of its life and direct its affairs although we may not be able to understand all the mysteries with which we are surrounded.

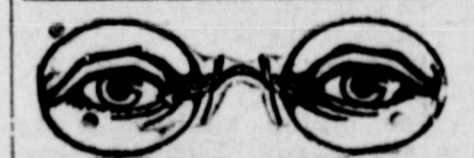

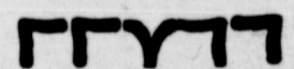
