WHY ROBERT LEE NEEDS AN AFFILIATED SCHOOL

If Robert Lee ever expects to amount to anything, she now faces her last opportunity to get busy in the effort or forever step down off the map and stay off. As citizens, what is your choice?

If we get our highways built, an independent school district voted and an affiliated school, Robert Lee will double in size the first year. Many progressive farmers would come here and buy farms that they might be near such a school. As a result, farm land would go up so high that all the tillable land in the Robert Lee trade territory would be sold simply because it would be too high to

run cattle or sheep on. Thus the population of Robert Lee and trade territory would be increased at least one-third. The question is, "Would the benefits equal the cost?" Our candid opinion is the benefits derived would be worth more than ten times as much as the amount of money, labor and time expended in getting them. The more people we get, the more money we'll have; the more building we get, the more money will be turned loose here, the higher our property goes in value, the better off we are. There would be some three times as much spent in this little town every year as there is now.

Robert Lee has actually shrunk in size from what it was twenty years ago, all for the lack of progress. We have overlooked the very things most essential to the growth of our community; namely, good roads and good schools. Without these two factors, a community cannot develop. We have no excuse to offer save that of downright negligence. Let's get up and snap out of it. We have as good country here as anywhere in the state and if we will only do our duty we can gain a place in the sun.

Stille Still in Use

at Galician Harvest

A Galician peasant girl frames her bronzed face with a russet-colored handkerchief. She wears a blouse of blue percale with sleeves of checked gingham, and a gray woolen skirt. The white and blue striped apron is crumpled by the sheaf of yellow wheat clasped in her smooth brown arms.

In Galicia many of the men emigrate to find employment, and the women carry on the work of the four seasons. The fields are small; the farming methods are the methods of the Homeric age. The red earth is turned in shallow furrows with wooden plows drawn by biscuit-colored oxen.

The seed is scattered by hand, and the soil is cultivated with wooden harrows. In June the grain is ripe, and the peasant girl goes into the field with her sickle.

The harvester bends low; in the left arm she gathers a cluster of grain stalks; with the sickle in her right hand she cuts a swift stroke near the roots. Catching the severed grain in the curve of the sickle, she raises it above her head and waves it in a circular movement; then, pivoting on her hips, she lays the sheaf on the ground behind her. In tireless rhythm she moves across the rows of grain.

A boy follows in the field, tying the sheaves with straw.—Exchange.

Liked Old Costumes,

but Stuck to Modern

Looking at some pictures of Ireland, old and new, a friend remarked the other day that men on the streets of Dublin looked like men on the streets of New Bedford, and pointed regretfully to the posed picture of the typical Irish countryman of an older day, with his breeches and his characteristic hat and stick.

"What a pity they haven't stuck to the old costumes." "Well," I said, "they haven't; but if you are stuck on that rig there is nothing on earth to prevent you wearing one like it." He said that was different. "Doubtless," I went on, "you admire the Hungarian women in their quaint old-style dress." He said he did. "Do you want your wife to dress that way?" But he said that, too, was different.

Tides of the Earth

Because it is by no means rigid, our earth's crust rises and falls like the ocean's tide under the gravitational attraction of the moon and sun. There is no doubt that this occurs, says Dr. Walter D. Lambert of the United States coast and geodetic survey, though difficulties have so far prevented exact measurement.

Another thing that makes the crust of the earth heave and fall, says Doctor Lambert, is the pressure exerted upon it in spots by the rising tide of the ocean. Atlantic tides have caused an observed earth bulge at Williams Bay, Wis., 800 miles away, and it is thought probable that this influence strikes the earth.

He invited priests, newspaper men and friends to the ceremony and read a funeral scroll, asking the pardon of the flies. Plaintiff further alleges that he and those under whom he holds title, claiming to have a good and perfect right and title to said land, has had and held peaceable and adverse possession of the same, cultivating, using and enjoying the same under fence and enclosure, without any adverse claim having been made thereto, and have been in the actual possession thereof continuously for more than ten years next preceding his ejection therefrom by said defendants, by reason of which he has acquired a good and sufficient title to said land under the limitation statute of ten years, such possession and holding meeting all the requirements of the Texas Statutes for the acquisition of title by limitation of ten years.

Wherefore plaintiff prays that defendants be cited by publication to appear and answer this petition, and that on hearing hereof he have judgment for the title and possession of said land, that writ of restitution issue, and for his damages, costs of suit, and for such other and further relief, special and general, in law and in equity, that he may be entitled to receive, and for which, in duty bound, he will ever pray.

Herein fail not, and have you before said court, at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

Registration of Births and Deaths Urged

Austin, Texas, Mar. 5, 1929.—The United States Census and Children's Bureau are cooperating with the State Department of Health in a drive to better birth and death registration in Texas. Great strides have been made along this line during the past six months. There has been a large increase in the number of births and deaths registered, but the state is still below the required standard of 90%.

It is felt that if the parents realized the importance of a birth certificate to their children, they would insist that the doctor or midwife in attendance promptly file one.

A concerted drive is also being made through the Retail Casket Dealers in an effort to build up the death registration to the required standard.

Parents are urged to call upon the local registrars in their community and ascertain if their children's births have been recorded. If not, get in touch with the physician or midwife in attendance, and urge upon them the necessity of the promptly filing a birth certificate.

Americans in Ranks of Canadian Legion

In the earlier years of the World War many thousands of Americans joined the Canadian expeditionary forces. Such an incident as here follows was of daily occurrence in Canadian recruiting depots.

The place, say, is Calgary. There walks in a strapping, travel-stained man. "You're British, of course?" says the recruiting officer, carelessly. "I've come in from Spokane." "Um. Sorry, but we can't take you. Only British, you know," says the recruiting officer, but he gives the man a queer sort of look, which is lost upon him for the moment.

The man moves off, crestfallen. A Canadian corporal sidles up. "Say, you've come here to enlist? Well, take half an hour's walk around the city, and just recall that you were raised in Medicine Hat, or Port Arthur, or anywhere you can think of this side of the line." The hint is grasped, and the only possible further trouble is with the medical officer.

In this way Americans to a total strength of five battalions joined the Canadian forces. For a time these soldiers wore a distinguishing badge, but for diplomatic and other reasons the badge was subsequently modified. The five battalions were known as the American Legion. They were the most unruly lot of an unruly but heroic army, the Canadian expeditionary force.—Chicago Journal.

Nothing Suffices to Break Punning Habit

In the kingdom of Rougaria a law against punning has been passed. Citizens in that country may play upon horses, roulette, keeo, pianos or even saxophones, but they must not play upon words.

River Under Ground

Lost River is a name given to a deep gorge where the water of the Moosilauke Branch brook disappears from sight, and at times from sound, for a considerable distance under massive bowlders. It is the third great natural wonder in the Franconia mountains, standing next after the Profile and the Flume, far surpassing the latter in its surprises, its massive rock architecture, and unique in its dark, gloomy caverns. The gorge itself is about one-half mile long, 20-30 rods wide and 40-75 feet deep to the brook bed. It was discovered in 1888 by B. C. Jackman of North Woodbury.
