The Amendments

There is still the far, far biggest class of voters to whom the amendments do not mean a thing. It does not make any difference to them whether 'school keeps' or not, and they do not bother themselves with things that require thought to figure right from wrong. Then there is always the negative class of voters, the ones who are agin' everything, whether they understand its principles or not. It is to this class, largely, that is owed the 10,000 or so votes against the state amendments.

Many people actually believe the Governor has been paid enough because "he makes as much as I do", but that is a rule that will not apply, and also a fallacy in fact when spoken by most people. For it has been proved impossible for the most frugal household to come out of the governor's mansion out of debt, or at least, living within the limits of the salary paid. The governor and family are in an exacting position, one that few laymen understand, and one that requires more money than is ordinarily the case, whether they are "highfalutin'" or not. The salary of \$4,000 would not justify a capable man for forsaking a business to enter the office nor would not reimburse a worthy one, though poor, for the time spent at it, unless he plundered. It is a queer paradox that those voters who do not want to pay him more expect him to graft, and by wishing to withhold a living from him, force him to do just that. Yet he could be impeached for doing what they expect to force him to do. Texas has had governors who are not grafters and crooks. It is false that "they all do it", in spite of the hue and cry from the disgruntled voters. Pay an honest man an honest salary and he will remain honest.

We're glad he gets a rise.

The benefits from the court will be apparent at once. The shame of the state, that of the slowness of the processes of justice and continual appeal and reversals will be almost entirely done away with, except insofar as these avenues may be used to guarantee and preserve individual rights. No longer can they be the tools of crooked lawyers to defeat justice. And the cost will be only very small part of that now paid out in the cost to the people of the Appeals Commission and the prolonged business of lower courts, necessitated by the delay incident to the system at present in use. If these who voted against the court amendment had realized both these features, we do not believe there would have been a thousand votes against it in the whole state.

Robert Lee School Accredited

When the report from the State Department of Education came in last week, it showed that Robert Lee School had been granted 5 1-2 units of affiliation. In a way this was a disappointment, and in a way not. Some subjects we felt sure would go over were turned down like Ancient History and Biology and others that we thought would fall went over best, like Book-keeping. I was especially disappointed that the Biology failed. I thought, and think yet, that the class in Biology did a fair grade of work and should have received credit for that subject. However we must except what the examiner says whether we agree or not. Some nice things were said about most of the work, and a good many criticisms, which we of course expected. There were some surprises in the report, we teachers were inclined during the year to lay all the poor work on the Ninth Grade, but the report says specifically that Ninth Spanish was good and credit refused on Spanish because of tenth grade work. The Eighth Grade secured credit in English and General science, Ninth Grade on English, Tenth Grade on Geometry and Half of American History, and Eleventh Grade on Bookkeeping. A total of 5 1-2 units.

We believe we can put over 8 1-2 more units next year. Let's forget our disappointment over this report and begin now to get ready for that 8 1-2 points next year. That will make 14 units and lack but two units of full affiliation, English Four and Physics. These two are very hard to get.

Mr. Gramling is making good use of the three months between school terms. He is remodeling the interior of the school house to quiet an advantage. He has built an apparatus case 12 feet long and 7 feet high which is divided in two sections so it can be moved around very easily, and it is a dandy piece of work, and will be used in the science Laboratory. Then, he has made a nice little new room on the north side of the auditorium that seats 40 pupils, the walls are put up in three sections that can be removed in five minutes time and the room converted back into the auditorium.

The Robert Lee school has already been classified a four year, first class High school, and a litter recently received from the State Department of Education grants Robert Lee 5 1-2 Units of affiliation toward becoming a fully affiliated school, which requires 16 units.

But friends everywhere I have found.

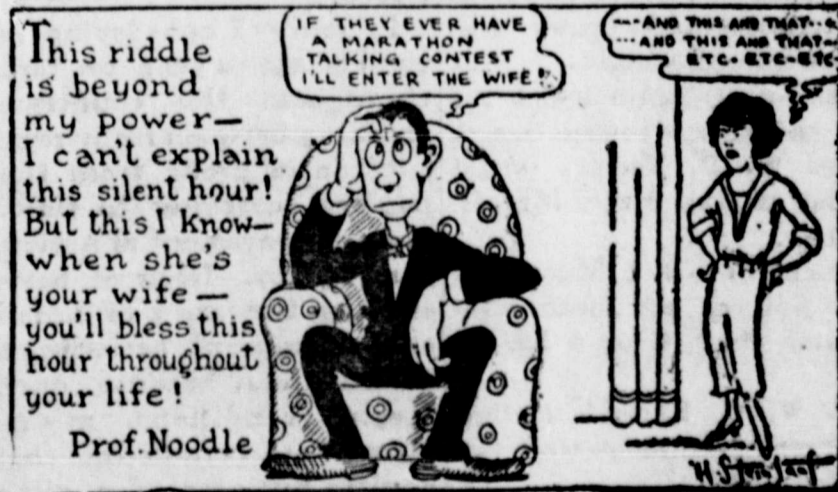
The faces and places I've known here so long

And I hope to again see your face.

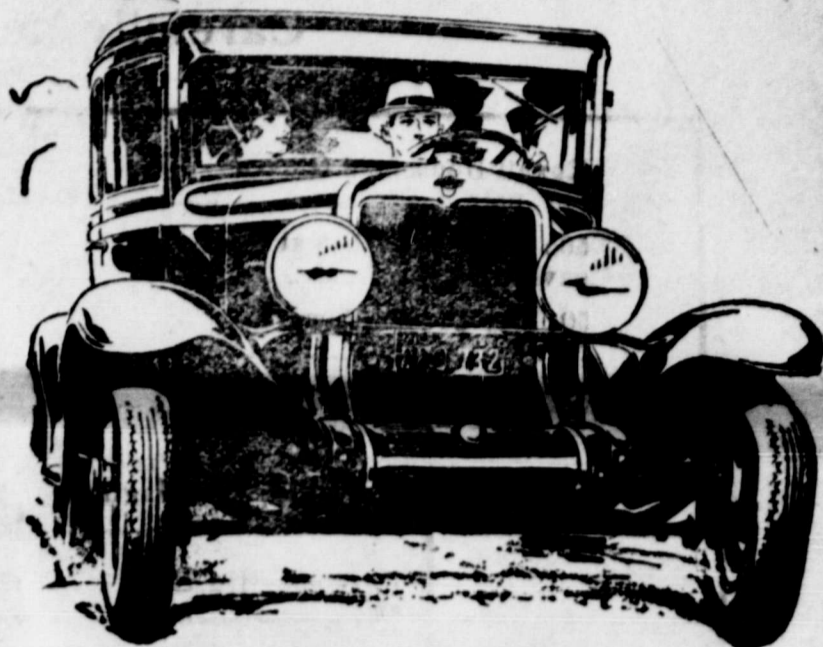

Good Hens, Good Pay in Chicken Business

The old joke about the cackling hen, and her owner who demanded, "chicken, is you lyin' or layin,'" has lost its humor. It isn't funny, now days, when the flocks do not lay enough to pay for their keep. The hen that eats regularly and lays only occasionally is a constant drag upon the profits of the farmer who is depending upon his poultry flock for a substantial profit.

Figures available from a test made by the University of Illinois indicated that the average profit on 264 flocks averaging 161 hens each was 86 cents per hen, but the average on the best two-thirds of the flocks was \$2.28 per hen. In other words, the "loafers" in the flocks were eating up \$1.42 cen's worth of the profits the good hens produced.

Presence of hens laying less than 90 eggs a year on farms throughout the country is standing between farmers and substantial profit from their poultry, according to United States Department of Agriculture figures. Need of better stock on the farms of America is paramount, according to investigators, because under present conditions, many farmers are conducting their poultry business at a direct loss.

Co-operation of the hatcheries of the country has been secured in an attempt to raise the standard of poultry on farms. Formation of

hatcheries into a business organization for the purpose of insuring farmers and poultry raisers of absolute fair dealing took place within the last year. These hatcheries, united under the slogan, "Hatchery Chicks for Greater Profits," are pledged to the production of chicks from good laying s'rains, to insure poultry raisers of a fair return on their investment.

Luther says he is going to play polo like six-bits and has already joined the team here.

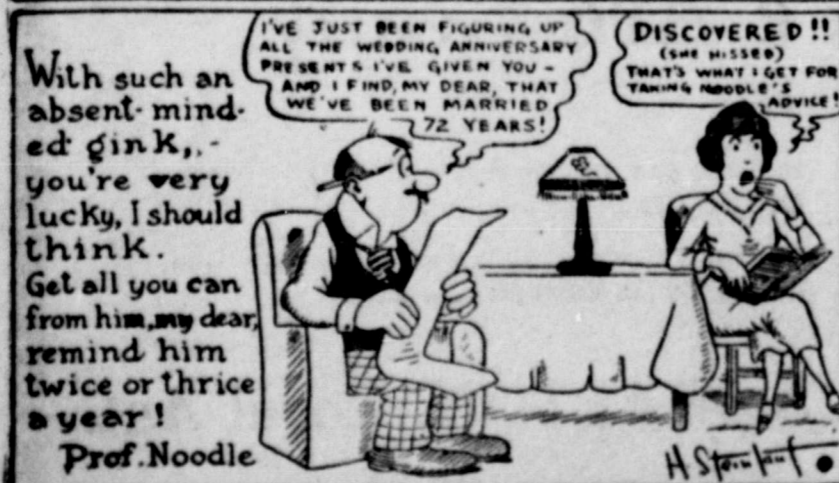
