A Serious Accident

Mr. and Mrs. L. S. Bird and son Irving happened to a serious accident on Sunday July 21st. While on their way home from Willis Point, where they had been attending a meeting, held by their son Ulmer. When they approached a one way bridge in their Buick coach, near Forney Texas, a car was parked on it, Mr. Bird started to slow down, and got his foot on both the breaks and foot feed at the same time, and could not stop, as soon as was necessary, seeing he was going to hit the car, he turned to go like he was going around the bridge, because he saw he had about 40 feet farther to get the car stopped in, than he would had in the road, but it was down hill and the brakes was not working any too well, and the car went over into the creek, but it didn't turn over, she just souzed her front end over into the far back, at a rate of about 25 miles an hour. The hind end of the car kicked up so high when it hit, that none of them got into the Wind Shield, but it threw their heads up against the top of the car above the Wind Shield. The creek was only about 2 feet deep, with a straight up and down bank to it. The boy Irving was hurt less than any of them, having only one stitch to fix up the gash cut over his right eye.

While Mr. Bird had a gash cut in the shape of a horse shoe, and at least as large, on his forehead, and the toe of which dropping down over his right eye brow. The Doctors washed out under this piece of skin clear up under the hair on his head, and took 30 Stitches on it.

Mrs. Bird was hurt worse than both the others. It took five stitches to sew up the two inch gash cut over her right eye three for the one under her chin and one stitch on her lip, besides having a Jaw bone broken, and was knocked unconscience. She and Mr. Bird was carried to the hospital at Terrell Texas, where they were taken care of, while they took Irving to Forney. Mr. and Mrs. Bird didn't arrive in Robert Lee until Friday of last week, hence the delay in this article.

All caused by carelessness of some one else, parking on a one way bridge. The more we see of finable laws, the less we think of them.

If that fellow had to serve 30 days in Jail for that, he would never again do it.

Legislatures could render a great public service if they would change about 90% of our finable laws to Jail sentences, ranging from one hour, up to as many days as the case justified, instead of trying to get on the front page with some little sensational speech that doesn't amount to anything.

Why fine one of these Jelly-Beans for speeding, when 24 hours, in Jail will break him from it, besides save a lot of lives? Yes, thousands of them.

HOUSE BILL NO. 157

Here's the new law boys you had better read it over carefully and clip it out and save it. It means business and effects YOU.

SECTION 1 Any person who is the driver of any truck, automobile or other vehicle containing any livestock or domestic fowl which is upon or being driven upon any land of which said driver is not owner, lessee, renter or tenant, or which is upon or being driven upon any highway, public street or thoroughfare, who fails to have in his possession and exhibit to any person or peace officer upon demand a written permit authorizing said movement, signed by the owner or caretaker of said livestock or domestic fowl or from the owner or any person in control of the land from which said driver began said movement shall be fined not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$200.00 for each head of livestock and each domestic fowl in said movement, unless said driver upon demand of any person or peace officer makes signs and delivers a written statement containing the information herein required to be included in permits. Said driver shall be fined not less than 25.00 nor more than 200.00 for each head of livestock and each domestic fowl in said movement which is not covered by all the following information. Name of place origin including name of ranch, or other place; point of destination including name of ranch, market center, packing house or other place; number of livestock or fowls with description thereof including king, breed, color and also marks and brands if there would be any. Failure or refusal of such driver to exhibit to a person or peace officer said permit or to make said statement, shall constitute probable cause for any peace officer to search said truck or vehicle to ascertain if it contains any stolen livestock or stolen domestic fowls and to detain said movement a reasonable length of time to ascertain whether a any livestock or stolen fowls are contained therein.

Any driver who has in his possession any false or forged permit or who makes false written statement shall be fined not less than 200.00 nor more than \$500.00 or he shall be imprisoned in the county jail not less sixty (60) days nor more than six (6) months, or he shall be punished by both such fine and imprisonment. It is further provided that all provisions of this act shall apply to slaughtered livestock and domestic fowls and butchered portions thereof.

Big Two Day Celebration of The Opening of Sweetwater Airport

A novel feature that has been added to an already thrilling program for the two day opening of the Sweetwater Municipal Airport on Saturday and Sunday, August 10th and 11th is four daily glider flights by Earl Aken, one of the foremost glider men in this country. This glider is a motorless plane designed and built by Mr. Aken of Breckenridge, and is the only commercial type glider in the State, and is the first glider to be registered by the Department of Commerce. Incidentally it is one of the best in this country and is capable of making ascensions of 400 to 500 feet without a motor. A new record will be attempted here on the large 26' acre Sweetwater Airport he stated.

Definite assurance that the latest type United States Army and Mexican Army planes will be here in special maneuvers and exhibitions made possible through special permission of the War Department.

Five fast races, dead stick landing contests, balloon bursting and other aerial exhibitions will form the nucleus for one of the largest Air Meets that has been held in the Southwest this year. Competition of at least 100 planes for the \$1500.00 in prizes is assured the committee. A crowd of 25,000 to 35,000 people is expected at the opening, and visiting notables will include Reg Robbins, Jim Kelly, Bob Cantwell, Erle Halliburton, Capt. Frank Hawks and many others.

No fuel is used in the plane but the boys have to have their nourishment, so the plane "Home Brew" has been selected by committee for the food plane. Pilot P. E. (Sanitary) Mahon and W. W. (cashier) McCatchen will fly the Home Brew. Official time-keeper, Hubert Buchanan been receiving some reports but has only let the Reporters have two of them. One sent down Wednesday morning at 10:42 saying "Every thing in good shape but have trouble keeping the birds from roosting on the plane at nights" Signed "Pilot." The other was sent to earth Thursday A. M. 6:08 saying every thing fine but the propeller is backing up now in a re-wind interval. The Colonies compiled and printed their own law books and king's rulings, but probably the first book pertaining to the United States at large is the "Reports of the Attorney General of United States—1785."

DUTY-FREE SUGAR THREATENS RUIN TO U. S. MARKET

DENVER.—Expansion of the sugar industry in the Philippines at the expense of the beet sugar industry of the United States is the plan of Philippine leaders, who hope to erect a sugar producing empire in the islands rivaling that of Java, with 1,000,000 tons' production by 1935 and a potentially unlimited output in the future. In spite of their present statements to the contrary, according to W. D. Lippitt of Denver, an official of the Great Western Sugar Company.

"Since the introduction of Congressman Timberlake's resolution proposing to limit the amount of Philippine sugar entering this country free of duty to 500,000 tons annually," said Mr. Lippitt, "Philippine leaders have declared that further expansion of their sugar industry is unlikely. Yet only four years ago a statement in the Central and Planters News, the official publication of the Philippine Sugar Planters' Association, predicted a crop of 1,000,000 and commenting on the unlimited possibilities of future exploitation declared, 'Another ten years of development will place us in a class with Java in so far as the production of sugar is concerned.'

"Imports of duty-free sugar from the Philippines in recent years have shown the highest rate of increase of any source supplying the United States, while the domestic industry has suffered losses in the majority of sugar producing states. The problem is chiefly agricultural, due to the production of sugar in the islands under low standard standards of living and wages with which the American farmer cannot compete."
