



"The main thing is there will be no interruption of care and their caregivers will mainly stay the same," Charanza said, noting that the workers will now be employed by a different agency, but will perform the same services.

Dear Editor & fellow citizens:

Our local Castro County Hospital and its subsidiaries do an excellent job in general and can handle most medical, pediatric, obstetrical and many surgical and orthopedic problems quite well. But the hospital remains in some degree of financial difficulty, as do almost all rural hospitals. If our facilities were used more, all of our citizens could pay less for medical/surgical care, due to paying less for care in our community, as well as avoiding traveling, lodging, and eating expenses if using facilities in a larger city.

Since the enactment of Medicare, Medicaid and other laws which have been interpreted by lawyers to mean that anyone who presents to an emergency room must be treated as an emergency, regardless of their non-emergent status, especially small hospitals have been obligated to render "emergency" services. Most of these "users" generally present between 5 p.m. and 9 a.m. of the following day, or after 1 p.m. Saturday through 8 a.m. Monday, in order to avoid waiting in the clinic. Most who use the E.R. do not have emergent conditions and before 35-to-40 years ago Survivors include a sis- were managed at home symptomatically or by first aid measures - usually with resolution of their illness or minor injury. Many have either no intention to pay for services rendered or expect insurance or "social services" to pay for their evaluation and treatment.

Consequent to rules enforced by these governmental systems, a bureaucracy has developed beginning with the admissions staff of the hospital, then adding nurses, technicians, physicians, secretaries, accountants, transcriptionists, quality assurance managers, administrators, special assistants, etc., who must be paid, which increases hospital expenses. The "impatient" would likely have recovered, or at least improved, at home, but then the insurance company or "social agent" will decide the necessity of all this before payment or non-payment - and frequently decides on the latter.

Add to this the expense for exorbitant malpractice insurance premiums to be paid by the hospital, nurses, all physicians and ancillary personnel involved, not to mention the high cost of medications used, results in high costs, which must be passed on to the "patient" or his agent.

This example of mandatory costs involves not only E.R. care, but hospital care in general, which includes specialized tests, examinations, drugs and procedures which are even more costly.

At times a physician's judgment is erroneous and though he/she may be advised by a colleague with more experience/training that a certain approach is not advantageous, he/she may proceed with their plan regardless. It may be that the physician involved is motivated by fear of a malpractice suit, so that the more expensive route is taken - for example: referred to a larger hospital via helicopter (\$8,197.65), though no logical advantage in treatment is anticipated - for example: consideration of the patient's age, present status, comorbid conditions or their wishes, which may be known by family members, though not written down in a legal document. Whenever a transfer is advised, you or a responsible family member should insist on a second opinion before consenting!

My purpose for this letter is not meant only as an admonition for patients, but also for my medical colleagues, so that everyone may do his part to contain medical costs and keep our local hospital viable, because many lives are saved by its presence.






Violet-I-, an outstanding band from Lubbock will bring a hard and heavy


musical presentation. This band is extremely talented and is probably as good as anyone out there, known and unknown.

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

Hospital board reviews employee benefits

The Board of Directors of the Castro County Hospital District held its monthly meeting March 27, 2003. The board reviewed employee benefits and medical insurance programs. The increase in medical insurance was noted, as well as previous increases for general and professional and property insurance. The Hospital Auxil-

ized scheduling program for the clinic along with four new computers to make scheduling appointments and followups at the clinic easier.

The District has also updated the laboratory with a new information system to allow computerized order entry, retrieval of lab results and computerized billing.

The district is completing

iary purchased a computer- new HIPAA requirements to ensure patient privacy and provide standardization of insurance billing.

> The board approved a medical staff recommendation that the hospital no longer perform vaginal deliveries after the patient has already experienced a Cesarean section.

Board members also approved a district=wide financial analysis by an outside consultant. Reimbursements continue to decrease and costs continue to rise, and the hospital finds itself facing the same kinds of cuts that school districts are facing. The board hopes the analysis will assist in making sound decisions affecting the future of the district.

Members were told that billing and collection processes are being reviewed and improved and increased education and training are taking place.

The District has recently received two grants. The Amarillo Area Foundation gave the District at \$52,000 grant to upgrade computer software and assist with community outreach. And, the Organization for Rural and Community Affairs has given the District \$50,000 to buy two new EKG machines and rewire the hospital's computer system.

O. I had a small "fenderbender" with another motorist. Neither of us wanted to report the accident to our insurance company so he just agreed to pay my repair bill. Now he won't pay. The damage to may car is only a couple of hundred dollars. What can I do?

A. This may be a good case for Small Claims Court. I suggest you send him a certified letter asking that he pay, as he promised.

Let him know that if you cannot settle the matter, you will consider a claim in Small Claims

If you do not resolve the dispute, file a petition with the appropriate Small Claims Court.



The issue is divided into three propositions.

* Proposition 1 \$550,000, which would put a
new roof on the main
campus, new hallway and
classroom floor covering,
new lighting in south portion
of building, repainting all
classrooms, refinishing
hallway walls, renovating
restrooms for handicap
access, new exterior doors
and repairing outside walls.

* Proposition 2 \$200,000, centers on the
cafeteria, including a new
roof, replacing heating and
cooling units, new lighting,
repainting all walls,
renovating restrooms for
handicap access and new
exterior doors.

* Proposition 3 - \$210,000, would renovate the ag building and the bus barn.

In order to receive the State Facilities Funding, Nazareth ISD must generate about 15 percent of the debt payments from local funds. If Prop. 1 only is passed, the

tax rate increase would be about 3 cents; if both Prop. 1 and Prop. 2 are passed, the increase would be about 4 cents; for all three, the increase would be approximately 5 cents.

After the value reduction for agricultural use, the average taxable value for cultivated farmland in Nazareth ISD is \$175/acre and the average taxable value for pastureland is \$40/acre. If the bond impact would be 9 cents per \$100 valuation on cultivated farmland and 2 cents on pastureland.

For homes, with the 5 cent increase, the annual increase on a \$40,000 home would be 12.50; on a \$60,000 home, it would be \$22.50; \$32.50 on an \$80,000 home, etc.

Early voting started Wednesday, April 16, and will continue through Tuesday, April 29. Voting hours are 8 a.m. until noon and 1 to 5 p.m., weekdays, at the school, 101 S. First. Election day is Saturday, May 3, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

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



McCurry, a resident of Earth, was turning north at the intersection of U.S. Highway 70 and School Road 302 when his Chevrolet S-10 pickup was hit by a 18-wheeler hauling cottonseed from Olton. He had been on his way to school. According to DPS Trooper Becky Gentry, McCurry was apparently blinded by the sun and didn't see the westbound truck.

Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace Carolyn Hanson pronounced the youth dead at the scene.

McCurry was born on October 21, 1986, in Lubbock.

He was involved in the Springlake Earth athletic program, where he was the starting noseguard for the Wolverine football team. He also participated in field events during track season, throwing the discus and the shot put. A member of the S-E High School FFA Chapter, McCurry was drum

major for the Wolverine Marching Band and a student council member as well.

High School principal Karl Vaughn described him as "well-liked and admired, a great kid in every way."

Outside of his school activities, McCurry was a member of Springlake First Baptist Church, where he played guitar for the youth group.

He loved to farm.

For the past four years,
McCurry studied piano with
Harold Dean Carson of
Olton. "He was one of the
most special young men I've
ever worked with," shares
Carson.

Last fall, Carson assigned a piece he'd written titled "Holiday in Spain" to McCurry with a promise that once the song was learned, it would be dedicated to him upon publication. Ty's last lesson was on Sunday before his accident.

"He played it perfect from memory," said Carson.

The piece is now ready for publication with a

dedication to Ty McCurry.


