### NORTH ROAD WPA PROJECT LIKELY

### NORTH HIGHWAY PROJECT PASSES STATE WPA OFFICE—TO WASHINGTON

In conversation with County Judge Percy Estes the fore part of the week The News editor was apprised of the fact that Castro County had submitted a project to the W. P. A. for work on the highway north of Dimmitt to the Deaf Smith County line. This is taken care of in two projects, the first incorporates 4 1-2 miles north from the city limits calling for grading, drainage with caliche and light oil topping.

This project has been sent to the state offices at San Antonio where it was okayed and is now in Washington where it will receive final action within a short time.

The next 10 1-2 miles to the county line at a controlling point between Hereford and Dimmitt is being made hp and will be submitted in the near future.

### WAY 86 PETITION IS SIGNED

### ASKS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT TO SURFACE HIGHWAY 86 THROUGH COUNTY

A petition was circulated over the county this week and forwarded to the State Highway Engineer at Austin bearing the names of several hundred citizens praying the Highway Department to finish and top Highway No. 86 East to the county line. It will be remembered that the grading and drainage work has been completed in Castro County, and the Commissioners court and the citizens of the county believe the need sufficient to warrant an early completion of the road.

Copy of the petition is given:

We, the undersigned citizens and officials of Castro County, respectfully petition your honorable Body for aid in securing aid on Highway 86 through Castro County.

We submit the following reasons for such improvement:

1. That Castro County has no paved roads.
2. That Highway 86 is one of the most important connecting links in Texas, shortening the route from S. W. Oklahoma, and northern Texas, into New Mexico and Colorado by more than 100 miles.
3. That Castro County now has grading and drainage structures complete from Dimmitt east to the Swisher county line.
4. That Swisher county has secured the ROW for 86 through from one side to the other, and has submitted Preferred Projects No. 1, and No. 2, east and west from Thulia, and that Briscoe county has completed projects, and projects intended to complete through that

when completed will give county the shortest direct route through all parts of the state of Texas, which might be considered in this county.

### BOBCATS READY FOR GRID BATTLE

### COACH BATCHELDER'S TEAM IS PRIMED FOR OPENING CONTEST OF SEASON

Following two weeks of intensive training, Coach Howard Batchelder's Dimmitt High School Bobcats will get their first taste of battle this Friday afternoon when they blast the lid of the 1935 season with a gridiron encounter with the Kress eleven. Anxious to revive the football spirit which has sadly waned in the past few years, the players and their mentor have been bending every effort to whip a smooth working potential eleven into shape capable of taking this initial test of a full and heavy schedule.

Just what sort of a football team the visiting Kress delegation will present against the Bobcats is undetermined, but they have always had a reputation of being a bit tough, so an interesting game full of the incomparable gridiron thrills is promised the fans as they get a glimpse of the local machine that will carry the colors of the high school and community in the coming season.

Some sore or more of the high school athletes have responded to the call for football players and this year's team will feature good weight and plenty of speed. The forward wall will average 156 pounds with the backs tipping the scales at 157 pounds. Sadly lacking in fundamentals the charges have worked diligently under the tutorage of Coach Batchelder until they look like a real football eleven. Plenty of fight has made up a great deal in what was lacking in the fundamentals of the game, and in a few weeks Dimmitt High School will be able to hold its own with any of the neighboring teams in gridiron warfare.

In a meeting of the squad the fore part of the week Bill Snapka transfer from the Flag Community, was chosen as captain of the 1935 Bobcats and will lead the team in Friday's contest.

Considerable color will be displayed in the opening clash as the Bobcats will be donned in their new uniforms from head to toe while on the sidelines a peppery pep squad in uniform will furnish incentive and backing for the boys in the conflict.

While it is to early for an errorless team to have been developed Coach Batchelder has developed a fine club, one steady and strong on the defense and on the offense one capable of producing yards through the line, around the wings or through the air. It will be a game worth seeing, and the support from the entire community will go a long way towards making this year successful on the gridiron.

The game will begin at 3:30 p. m. at the high school athletic field.

**LET'S BACK THE BOBCATS**

You've all done a mighty fine job in co-operating towards the successful opening of school. One splendid success deserves another—and this Friday afternoon affords us another opportunity to support another Dimmitt enterprise when the Dimmitt High School Bobcats open the 1935 football season on the local gridiron against the invading Kress high school eleven.

Football has been sadly neglected in the activities of the local schools, and with the reorganization of the system a healthy athletic program has also been installed in the educational program. We are fortunate to have a capable coach, an enthusiastic superintendent and an energetic faculty and student body. With this excellent set-up bespeaking the success of the local schools, both scholastically and in its extra curricula and activities, it is our duty to get behind the football team and insure them our full support and backing this season.

Prospects are bright for a winning eleven and with the help of the citizens Dimmitt will again rank with other Panhandle neighbors on the gridiron. An attractive schedule has been arranged giving the local fans six home games.

To the Bobcat team we would repeat a slogan our coach once gave a high school team on which this writer was a member: "It isn't the size of the man in the fight—it's the size of the fight in the man." The same holds good today, so reward your coach, your school and your town with your best every minute you are on the gridiron.

**A TERRIBLE SENTIMENT**

It's a terrible thing when one's life has been so spent that when one dies from an assassin's bullet, not an echo of sympathy is heard. Especially is this tragic when the person holds a place of public trust and commands a place in the spotlight of national affairs. However, such an incident was a reality when Sunday night, United States Senator Huey P. Long fell mortally wounded in his Louisiana State House at Baton Rouge, La., a victim of an assassin's bullet.

From the time of the shooting until Senator Long died Tuesday morning this writer failed to hear any word of regret over the act which ended the Long "Hitleristic" regime. A murder is an awful thing, but to live to build such a strong resentment in the minds and hearts of fellow citizens is even more tragic and uncalled for. Senator Long's rule was one of greed, hatred and anarchism, and while this writer is opposed to such an end we feel that Louisiana and perhaps even the United States is freed from the clutching coils of a dangerous menace.

May this tragedy prove a lesson to future self-appointed dictators.

**ENGLAND PREPARES**

The British, looking ahead, prepare to defend the Suez Canal, and their naval supremacy in the Mediterranean Sea. Soldiers are being sent to Malta, the island base, and to ports nearby the Canal. The fleet in the Mediterranean is being greatly strengthened, so that it will be more powerful than what Italy may have at its disposal for attack.

The British feel that Mussolini is going wild. They do not know what the future has in store for them, but they

are quietly preparing to take care of their vast colonial interests and safeguard their trade lines. If the League of Nations decides to apply pressure on the Italians, in the form of sanctions, as the British favor, the English will be ready with their fleet to see to it that no surprise attack imperils their interests.

The Italian Dictator is talking plainly. Mussolini says any action by the League will be opposed with military force. He counts on a divided League . . . fearing to speak in this manner if he believed France, Britain, and other countries, were united and ready to meet the issue. Unfortunately, only the British seem to be inclined to accept the full responsibilities, and only then if the others unite with her. On the other hand, if Italy trespasses upon British rights, the British will act, even alone, and they are preparing for whatever comes.

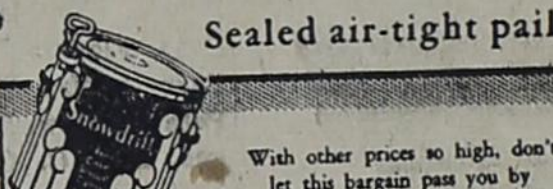

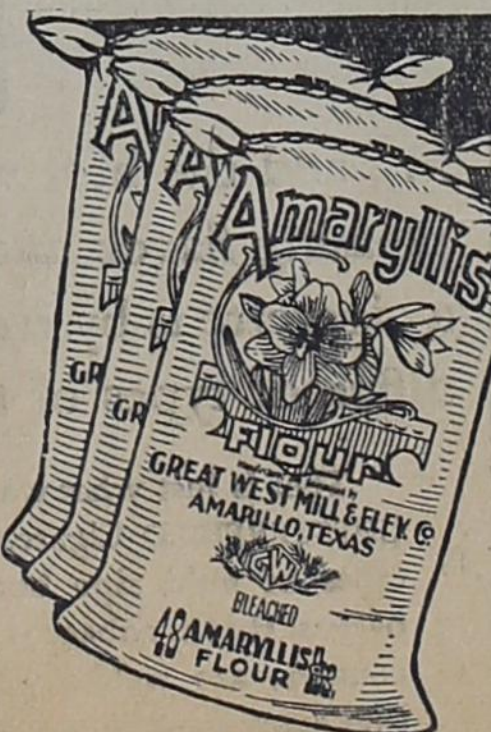

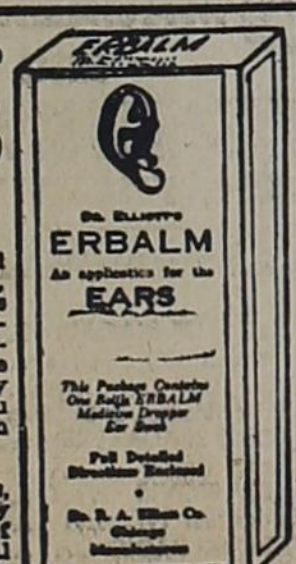
