It's a terrible thing when one's life has been so spent that CONSTABLE OF CASTRO when one dies from an assassin's bullet, not an echo of sympathy is heard. However, such an incident was a reality when Sunday night, United States Senator Huey P. Long fell mortally wounded in his Louisiana State House at Baton Rouge, La., a victim of an assassin's bullet.




