Briefly discussing the benefit this Precinct should derive from his Aid: We have been paying a $\operatorname{tax}$ af 75 c on the one hundred dollar valuation to take care of this bond issue. Now, with this dollar valuation, which will net a saving of some $\$ 35,000.00$ a year for this precinet. $\$ 1300000$ of this bond indebtedness has been paid lesving $\$ 87,000.00$ outstanding, and with the State paying $\$ 2,371.66$, it will only leave $\$ 34,628.34$ that the tax payers will have to pay on this issue without State Aid. I believe this $\$ 34$, 62834 can be made eligible for State aid, but it will have to be made eligible by a State wide move because the law does not apply to it as it now reads.

I wish to assure you that I am now working in cooperation with other interested parties over the State on such legislation, and I am hoping that we will get the desired results at the next ular term of the Legislature, or at least make a satisfactorystart.

ART. 66684 p -7. Administrative provisions.
'(a) All bonds, warrants or other evidences of indebtedness eretofore issued by counties or defined road districts, of the State, which mature on or after January 1, 1933 and in so far as mounts of same were issued for, and the proceeds actually exda 1 , the d a part of the system of desiguated Siate igh a said systember 1.1922, or that

The amount of such eligible indebtedness is to be determined s hereinafter provided. In the event the State Highway Commiss on has on a date prior to September 17, 1932, indicated its intention of designating as State Highways the public roads of any County or road district in this State, and has recorded such apply." Therefore, that part of this bond issue that is not receiving State aid, which amounts to $\$ 34,628.34$, will be eligible when the legisiature removes that clause specifying the date a road had to be designated, which was, on or before September 17, 1932 However, all parts of the Precinct will share alike in State id that has been granted
