Paving Work On Highway 86 West to Begin Soon

Construction work on the paving project on Highway 86 from Dimmitt 11.77 miles West to the Parmer County line will get under way soon according to an announcement by representatives of the construction company. The contract for the surfacing job was let late in April to the Ernest Loyd Construction Company of Fort Worth by the State Highway Department. The contract calls for flexible base and double asphalt surface. The low bid was \$114,263.00.

The construction company is moving equipment to Dimmitt and actual operations are scheduled to begin early next week. Caliche for base on the highway will be furnished from a pit in Parmer county nine miles south of Highway 86.

APARTMENTS NEEDED
Living quarters for workers on the project will be needed, and will be secured in Dimmitt if possible. Approximately eight families will need apartments and anyone who has an apartment available is urged to leave notice with Jack Trimble, Chamber of Commerce Secretary. Parking space and accommodations for ten trailer houses will also be needed. An estimated five months will be required to complete the project.

Warning Given On Control of Hog Cholera

Elsewhere in this issue of the News is a warning from Sheriff Houston Fowlkes cautioning hog raisers to burn carcasses of hogs dying of cholera. A state law, designed to prevent spread of the disease requires the burning of hogs infected with the disease. As an extra precaution hog raisers are urged to isolate any hogs suspected of being infected with the disease.

According to reports a number of hogs in the county have died of cholera recently, and all precautionary measures are urged to curb the spread of the illness.

Farmer Suffers Heart Attack

Mr. C. E. Warrick, Castro county farmer who lives 8 miles southeast of Hereford is receiving treatment in the Deal Smith County Hospital after suffering a heart attack Saturday night. Mr. Warrick was found lying beside Highway 51 three miles south of Hereford. A passing motorist reported to the Sheriff's office that he had seen a man lying beside the road. Upon investigating Sheriff Reese found Warrick lying face down beside the road. His pickup was 250 yards north of the spot where he was found.

Officers thought at first that he might have been the victim of a hit and run driver, but doctors at the hospital where he was taken found only lacerations on his face, caused presumably by the fall.

When he regained consciousness, the injured man reported he had suffered a stroke several days ago. He had had trouble with the pickup, and had started to (walk back to a garage south of the site of his car trouble when he fell. Physicians diagnose his case as a heart attack.

Railroad Commission Postpones Hearing of Bus Line Petition

The examiner for the Texas Railroad Commission again postponed the hearing for the Chisholm Trail Coaches, Inc., petition for a permit to operate an East-West bus line from Wichita Falls to Farewell through Dimmitt. The hearing, which was to have been held this week, beginning Tuesday, was postponed due to a technicality involving the issuance of a Charter to the bus incorporation. According to an announcement by Mr. Ray Grimes of Vernon, owner and operator of Chisholm Trail Coaches, Inc., a new date for the hearing will be set for the latter part of June or the first of July.

Believing that the new bus line would bring much needed service to a large section of the Panhandle, delegations from the various towns along the 250 mile proposed route, were making preparations to attend and testify at the hearing. A delegation of nineteen interested citizens from Dimmitt, to be among the first to testify at the hearing, left early Tuesday morning before announcement of the postponement was received by the applicant. The group from Dimmitt made the trip to Vernon in one of the Chisholm Trail Coaches large buses. On the return trip to Dimmitt the local men conferred with the Chamber of Commerce and City officials in some of the larger towns along the proposed route and believe that added enthusiasm in support of the project will result.

Keeping the poultry flock on full feed during the summer is important in good poultry production. Feed the layers all the laying mash they will consume.

Ticks cause the same damage to the calf as the hornflies and lice. A mixture of two pounds of 50 percent wettable DDT and one pound of 6 percent gamma BHC in 25 gallons of water will effect control of livestock pests.

Keep all the stoves on the farm in a state of good repair at all times. Never fill gasoline or kerosene stoves while they are burning. And, it's safer to fill stove tanks out of doors.

Our wonderful, productive Castro county is sporting its Sunday clothes, dressed for the fair—the County Fair—which it will bedeck with samples of the finest farm produce ever exhibited at a fall festival, or otherwise. It is easy to fall in love with the Panhandle-Plains especially that choice section named Castro County, upon the top-most peak of the vast empire called the staked Plains. On two occasions, in recent weeks, this writer has had pleasant trips in two directions from Dimmitt, one three hundred miles to the south-east, another nearly that distance to the east. Each route covered some of the finer agricultural areas of Texas. Beautiful Country, abundant moisture—in many instances maybe too abundant—but everywhere wonderful prospects for bumper crops. But nowhere along that six hundred mile route was Castro County contested for agricultural supremacy. No section of that fine area makes any pretense of touching the productivity of the nine hundred square miles of which Dimmitt is the County seat. When you are away from home, in sections where the fields are small, land rolling and erosion eating away at the topsoil, inquire about the price of land, observe business conditions, then come back home convinced that Castro County is the most under-sold area on the North American Continent. Intensified, diversified and fertilized farming in many areas is supporting more people and creating more business on land that a plainsman would hardly consider worthwhile to cultivate, while the merits of this beautiful country of waving grain and potential vegetable capital of the world go unsung. Approximately 95% tillable, the soil of Castro County is deep and rich, and with an abundance of underground water to assure moisture for growing crops when needed, this County of ours could support and enrich the citizenship packed into half dozen counties of other sections. Only in very recent years has Castro County begun to come into its own, show signs of a belated development which its natural resources deserve. Only recently have the highways of the county been paved making it possible for an outsider to cross the county with any semblance of comfort; irrigation now in its infancy is a new comer, modernizing of the towns of the county has just begun, and the many projects fostered by the County Chamber of Commerce are just beginning to take shape. The present citizens of Castro County and this section of the Panhandle will be the ones in a few years who will sagely recall the time in the not far distant past when Castro County, and neighboring Counties, were unbelievably underdeveloped. The process has set in passenger buses will crisscross our county, the transportation bottleneck will have vanished, small irrigated farms will flourish, intensified farming will increase the yield of this tableland manifold, our towns will, and must, develop in order not to be a laggard in the midst of development.

A number of Dimmitt business men and farmers went to Vernon Tuesday to appear at a hearing before an examiner for the Texas Railroad Commission. The hearing was postponed at the last minute because of a technicality. The new date for the hearing will be set during the latter part of June. It's a good guess that all of the men who made the trip Tuesday will again be ready to drop their work and make the trip again when the new date is set. Others should also plan to go. Mr. Ray Grimes, operator of the Chisholm Trail Coaches, Inc., will do everything in his power to give Dimmitt, and other neglected towns in this area, an east-west bus service. He deserves and expects our support.

Just a few more days and school will be out for the summer. Discussions of playgrounds and parks will be resumed, but very little if any constructive work will be done. When the teachers shed their responsibility for our children then the continuation of their recreation and education rests with the parents. Playgrounds and parks have been a source of real pleasure and recreation to the children of many towns and cities. Dimmitt will have an ever increasing problem unless steps are taken to provide adequate recreation facilities as they are needed in our growing town.

Ample moisture and ideal growing conditions for shrubs and flowers promises to make this a year of beautiful yards and gardens. Pointed toward the Flower Show in the fall, Dimmitt homes should be surrounded by beautiful yards all during the summer months.

SPORTS AFIELD

Within the last half century, hunting has become a mass pastime of a greater extent than ever before in this country. Likewise sport fishing has increased by leaps and bounds. Along with this increase, there is much evidence to indicate a decline in the average level of sportsmanship.

This decline in standards of conduct among sportsmen is a serious matter writes Dr. Ira N. Gabrielson in his forthcoming book "Wildlife Management." Dr. Gabrielson is president of the Wildlife Management Institute and formerly was head of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

He remarks that there are many different opinions as to what constitutes good sportsmanship, but all definitions should include some, if not most, of the following:

Shoot only when the game is clearly visible. Observance of this rule would eliminate many of the fatal hunting accidents that occur each year.

Shoot only when game is within range. Every man who goes into the field with a gun should know accurately its range and pattern.

Shoot only at individual targets. Don't shoot blindly into a flock of birds. If the majority of gunners would follow this practice, the losses could be greatly reduced.

Take only what can be used. Too many sportsmen like to play Santa Claus by bringing home game or fish to give to their friends. Too often the gift promptly find their way into the garbage can.

Don't be a limit hunter. Give the game more than an even break. Those who handicap themselves by self-imposed rules have many thrilling memories which are denied those who measure success by the number of kills.

Practice the golden rule toward your fellow sportsmen and land-owners. Land posted against hunting and fishing is the normal reaction to the ignorance, boorishness and stupidity, not to mention criminality of those who cut fences, trample crops, shoot livestock, and sprinkle farm families and homes with shot in their selfish anxiety to get the last individual bird and animal.

Sportsmen themselves have taken the lead in pushing legislation designed to conserve wildlife. Unfortunately many fish and game officials have been too busy with fascinating new problems to realize that certain basic necessities such as law enforcement have been neglected. Selling higher standards of sportsmanship to those who buy licenses would bring great returns in better-satisfied hunters, and at the same time lessen the difficulties of managing wildlife resources.

For Cooler Summers

You may not be able to do much about the temperature this summer, but you can do something about your house to keep a little cooler.

Inside house temperatures may be from 10 to 15 degrees cooler with insulation than without it, provided the house has enough ventilation, says W. S. Allen, extension agricultural buildings engineer of Texas A. & M. College. The insulation itself won't cool the house, but it will keep the heat outside during the day. Along with night ventilation, shading of the windows, awnings and shade trees near the house, insulation helps provide better cooling. The difference will be enough to make any house more comfortable when mercury climbs high, Allen says. Any home exposed to high temperatures in the summertime needs insulation, and the higher

or lower the temperature, the greater the need for it. Here in Texas it's most beneficial in the summer. Reflective insulation, which comes in metal foil or sheets, helps keep the sun's heat out of the house during the day, and allows for rapid cooling at night. So it is well adapted to the South, says Allen. Your house may be made cooler this summer by proper use of insulation. And don't forget that the fuel bills will be less next winter, too.


"WHERE'S THERE'S A WILL THERE'S A WAY"



On the other hand, a house with a basement has more usable space—space for storage, for the laundry, the heating plant, and for recreation and hobbies that can be enjoyed by all members of the family.

A modern forced circulation hot water heating system, fired with oil, will operate equally well from a basement or from a utility room, according to the Plumbing and Heating Industries Bureau.

A total of 438,000 central domestic oil heating installations were made in 1948 bringing the total number of central domestic oil heating installations to over four million—4,132,591 to be exact.

Cleanliness, convenience, and adaptability to automatic control are some of the advantages of oil heating.

CLOTHES and the EQUIPMENT
College Station, May 15—Choosing the summer wardrobe to suit the home laundry equipment is an idea suggested by Gladys Dar-

den, extension assistant home management specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

The Texas homemaker can save time and energy, especially in the summertime, if the family's clothes are well fitted to the washing and ironing equipment. By this, Miss Darden means that the homemaker can put the ironer to the fullest use if she chooses styles that are easy to iron flat—dresses that fasten all the way down the front, for instance. In contrast, puffed sleeves, embroidery, lace and small ruffles are difficult to iron by machine.

Small, flat buttons on clothes will go through the wringer better than large buttons or buckles, and the smaller buttons are easier on the rubber rollers, too. There's less chance for deep creases in the thinner fabrics than in the heavy linens and the napped fabrics like bath towels and corduroy, Miss Darden says. Sashes and ties are extra trouble not only in the washer, but also in the wringer. Fold them inside the garment before wringing to keep them from catching and tearing.

Clothes which need little ironing—if any—save much tiresome labor in hot weather. These include terry cloth and corduroy robes and coats, seersucker dresses and suits, and knitwear, especially for children.

In an automatic dryer these

fabrics keep their shape and avoid creasing. A dryer is excellent for fluffing any napped fabrics, says Miss Darden. But she warns that if the clothes are left too long in a dryer so that they be-

come "bone-dry", the dryer may create them, especially if there is a heavy load.

Time and labor may be saved by wearing clothes that fit the equipment.

Cotton Classed Without Cost

College Station, May 15—One out of every two bales of cotton ginned in Texas the past season was classed without cost for nearly 97,000 farmers in Smith-

Doxy improvement groups.

This same service will be available again this year, John L. McCollum, southwest area manager, Production and Marketing Administration's cotton branch, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Dallas, announced.

Participation in Texas was higher last year than at any time since the program went into operation 11 years ago and prospects indicate it will be even higher this season, McCollum pointed out.

Latest count shows farmers ginned over one and a half million bales on which they received classification and market news service, both without cost. Total ginnings for the state amounted to more than 3 million bales.

Any organized improvement group which adopts a variety of cotton, files application, arranges for sampling and meets certain other requirements is eligible for this service on the coming crop.

Applications should be filed as soon as members have planted their cotton, but not later than July 1, for all counties lying entirely or for the most part east of the 100th meridian, and July 15 for those lying entirely or for the most part west of the 100th meridian. Latest date which applications may be received is August 1 for the eastern block of counties and August 15 for the western block.

Instructions and application blanks may be obtained from county agricultural agents, offices of Production and Marketing Administration, the area cotton branch office, or cotton classing offices in Austin, Dallas, Galveston, Lubbock and Abilene, McCollum explained.

Joseph Press of Framingham, Massachusetts, came out of World War II service with the Presidential Unit Citation, the European Theater of Operations Ribbon with six battle stars, the American Theater Ribbon and the designation "quadriplegia."

The latter term means that Joe Press lost the use of all four extremities—lost the use of both hands and both feet.

Despite his disabilities and his confinement to a hospital bed Joe Press is conducting an import-export business with almost a million dollars in orders.

Because he refuses to let a serious handicap keep him from being a useful citizen, Press has been selected as the "Hero of the Month" by the Disabled American Veterans.

The selection is part of a national program to honor each month a seriously disabled veteran who has successfully rehabilitated himself.

Press started his business in June, 1947. He has agents in India, Brazil, Japan and France. He has the national distributorship of a line of rare French perfumes.

He has imported bamboo products from Japan and such commodities as flour, copper tubing and aniline dyes. He has orders for prefabricated Houses, Diesel engines, tractors, alkalies and galvanized pipe that total close to a million dollars.

This business is conducted from a hospital bed at Cushing General Hospital with the cooperation of the hospital authorities and the assistance of a hired secretary.

The conquering of his own personal handicaps has been just as thrilling as his business success.

Serving with the Army Air Forces as a Staff Sergeant attached to the 391st Medium Bomb Group, 9th Air Force, he suffered a broken neck while taking part in an athletic program near Laon, France.

Following hospitalization in France he was transferred to Cushing where he has been ever since. Informed he would never walk again, Press nevertheless stood up for the first time with the use of leg braces between parallel bars.

For one year he spent an hour daily practicing balancing between parallel bars and learning to take steps. A year later he stood up with the use of crutches. Because he has no movement in his hands at all, leather cuffs were devised by him so his hands could be strapped at the hand grips of the crutches.

One of his biggest thrills was moving his feet six inches along the floor. Within a period of time he had increased his ambulating distance from six inches to a quarter of a mile.

Physicians at Cushing believe Joe Press is the only person who has lost the use of four extremities who can ambulate with the use of crutches and braces.

Joe, not married, credits his rehabilitation to the personnel of Cushing, the superior rehabilitation program for paraplegics and his membership in the Fred S. Murphy Chapter of the Disabled American Veterans in Framingham.

He was born in Meriden, Connecticut, was graduated from the New Haven High School and attended New Haven College of Commerce. Before entering service he was in the insurance and financial business.

Give The Range Plants A Chance

In many areas of Texas, range lands were overstocked last year, and the bad effects from this practice will last for several years, says A. H. Walker, extension range specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

Overgrazing not only makes it harder for the valuable range grasses and plants to grow and make seed, but it also causes the soil to pack. This means less pore space in the soil and a lighter covering of litter on top of the ground. Ranges in this condition receive little benefit from the hard, dashing showers that are common to Texas during most of the year. On the other hand, reminds Walker, ranges that have been only moderately grazed have a turf that will slow down the run-off and will give the water a chance to soak into the soil. Such range land will soak up water from two to four times as fast as overgrazed ranges.

Less run-off means less erosion and more water in the soil. The increase in the stored water supply in the soil and the saving of valuable topsoil makes range plants grow larger and better. And any ranchman will tell you that more grass means a larger calf crop, heavier calves at weaning time, lower feed costs and better conditioned breeding cows in the herd.

It is always well, says Walker, to think in terms of future effects on the range when you're

stocking a pasture. It is better still to make a close check on the amount and kinds of forage plants growing on the range and then stock in proportion to the amount of vegetation available. Light to moderate stocking will give the more desirable plants and grasses a chance to reproduce.

It is a slow and often trying process to bring back into production a badly overgrazed pasture, but it can be done. Walker says it's more profitable and better management to base the stocking rate on the ability of the range to produce desirable forage over a long period than to put too many livestock on the range when it looks good.

Texans Located By Speech Habits

Denton, Texas, May 15— You don't have to see a West Texan walking to tell him from his East Texas brother—his speech habits will mark him almost every time.

That's the conclusion of Dr. E. S. Clifton, North Texas State College English professor who is conducting a research project to study speech habits of Texas. Usage of certain words almost conclusively draws a line between an East and a West Texan, he says.

Chances are that a West Texan has never heard of "blinky" milk; whereas almost any East Texan knows that it is soured milk. The words "where" and "nor" tends to come out as "whur" and "nur" when West Texans use them, Dr. Clifton points out.

Dr. Clifton's study, to be published upon completion, includes material on what people call objects, what forms of words they use to express their thoughts, and how they pronounce them.



KITCHEN MEMO BY JEAN CLARKE

Many a good homemaker hesitates to cook fish. Yet it can be cooked so many different ways and is a welcome change for a main course. *Fish Casserole* uses either fresh or frozen fillets. Wash 2 lbs. fillets. Wipe with cloth. Break into large chunks and place in greased casserole. Cover with 1 pt. sour cream, 1/4 lb. grated cheddar cheese, 1 small minced onion, 1/2 cup white wine (or 1/4 cup lemon juice), 1 tsp salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper. Bake in moderate gas oven (375°F.) for about 30 mins. Serve on hot noodles—2 cups noodles boiled in salted water for about 8 mins. Serves 4.

A new aluminum foil that saves cleaning time can be put on the bottom of your broiler to catch grease from cooking foods. Use once and throw away.

There are only three uses for cold water in the average home but there are 140 different uses for hot water. An automatic gas water heater ensures a reliable supply of hot water whenever it is needed.

Take eggs out of the refrigerator ahead of time when you plan to beat them. They whip up faster and better at room temperature.

Simmering is an excellent cooking method used by good cooks to retain food values. Turn the gas low to simmer position to keep soups, stews, vegetables and fruits gently cooking.

Evaporated milk can be soured by stirring in well 2 tbsps. lemon juice to one cup milk.




Cancer Control Measures Being Realized in Nation

Houston (Special)—The cancer control goals of a previous generation are today almost within our grasp, J. Louis Neff, executive director of the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society, said today in a letter to cancer control leaders of the state, urging them to intensify their aid to the 1949 fund-raising campaign of the Society.

"We must not slacken the pace of cancer education, service, and research. Thirty-five years ago cancer was the seventh cause of death in our nation," he pointed out. "Today it is the Number Two Killer. What will it be tomorrow, unless we intensify our cancer control work?"

Mr. Neff's letter came as the Texas Division of the Society begins its fourth year of cancer control work in the state. The Texas organization was founded on May 8, 1946, and in this brief time has become one of the leading public health movements in Texas.


The executive director warned members of the Society that they "dare not relax the pressure."

"You might be helping to build something which some day might save your life," he reminded.

Discussing cancer control progress, Mr. Neff said:

"A few years ago our scientists could see almost no correlation between the few verified facts about cancer. Today they have a mass of information, all correlated, and they are finding new clues to causes and new methods of treatment."



Housefly Is Carrier Of Many Diseases

Austin, Texas—Countless thousands of lives are lost annually throughout the nation, from diseases that are transmitted by the common housefly. Dysentery, diarrhea, typhoid fever, tuberculosis and many other disabling and even fatal diseases are spread by flies, and the control of houseflies becomes of great importance

when considered in the light of public health. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that in order to protect our families we should make sure our homes are fly-proof through proper screening, and then concentrate on eliminating filth, garbage, and other breeding places for flies. "See that your windows, doors, and porches are screened so that the stray fly from some careless neighbor cannot molest your fam-

ily," Dr. Cox said, "and make sure that your grocer observes proper sanitation standards and keeps your meat, food and vegetable supplies screened from flies. "Then direct your efforts to eliminating all fly breeding places such as open garbage pails, open privies and other filth that offers the fly proper warmth, moisture and food. Flies thrive on filth, and inasmuch as one female housefly will lay from 600 to 1000 eggs per season, it can easi-

Dr. Cox recommended organized efforts as being effective in ridding a community of flies, and emphasized that no matter how clean one family's home and premises are, they are still not safe if another home down the street leaves exposed filth where flies can breed.

Diphtheria Is On Rampaign In Texas

Austin, Texas, May 15—With 14 reported cases of diphtheria within the past week, and a total of 397 cases reported in the first 19 weeks of this year, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, is urging Texas parents to have their immunized children Schick tested to determine immunity, and if inoculation is necessary, to have it done immediately. "There is a widespread belief that once immunity is established it lasts forever", the State Health Officer said. "This is not always true. In some cases it diminishes and finally dies out, and reinoculation is necessary in order to protect the child. "Every child who will enter

school next term should be inoculated or Schick tested now, because it takes from three to nine months for immunity to be completely established after the injection is administered." As long as cases of diphtheria occur, a child is in danger unless protected by immunization. The germs throw off a powerful poison which goes all through the body. It is particularly harmful to the heart, blood vessels, nerves and kidneys, and serious complications often accompany the disease. Some of the more dangerous complications are bronchopneumonia, to which the patient is particularly susceptible; paralysis, which may last for days or for as long as 3 or 4 months; or permanent injury to heart, nerves or kidneys. "The best thing to do with diphtheria, is to stop it before it starts," Dr. Cox said. "When tox-

oid is injected under the skin, the system manufactures a disease-fighting antitoxin which can successfully resist the disease. Children of school age should be inoculated or Schick tested now, so that immunity will be established or nearly so, before the opening of the next school term."



PEACH UPSIDE-DOWN-CAKE

Yield: 6 to 8 servings

1/4 cup Swift'ning	1/2 cup milk (about)
2 cups sifted flour	1/4 cup butter
2 teaspoons double acting baking powder	1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt	1/2 teaspoon almond extract
2 tablespoons sugar	2 to 3 cups sliced peaches
1 egg	Whipped cream

Cut Swift'ning into flour which has been sifted with baking powder, salt and sugar, until the mixture is the consistency of cornmeal. Make a well in mixture. Put egg into measuring cup. Add enough milk to measure three-fourths cup. Stir together. Add to flour mixture to form a soft dough. Turn onto lightly floured board. Knead six times. Roll out to form an 8-inch square. Cut several gashes in dough.

In a heavy skillet, combine butter, sugar, and almond flavoring. Cook until sugar is melted, stirring constantly. Pour into 8-inch square baking pan. Lay peach slices over sirup in pan. Top with biscuit layer. Bake in a hot oven (450° F.) 25 minutes or until biscuit topping is well baked. Turn upside-down out of pan onto serving platter. Serve warm or cold with whipped cream.


