It is a curious paradox that the last Congress appropriated even more money than its bigspending predecessor- yet has come in for considerable praise for its activities in the direction of economy.

It sharply reduced WPA expenditures, pared appropriations proposed in the "self-liquidating" spending bill, all along the line, and otherwise showed its belief that the time for some retrenchment was at hand.
