**Wheat Producers Seeks Enabling Act; Legislature**

The Board of Directors of the Wheat Producers Association of Texas met recently in Amarillo to consider the possibility of framing an enabling act to be presented to the Legislature for raising funds to carry on the work of the Association. Mr. Leo Witkowski represented Castro County at this meeting.

The group studied the enabling acts of Oregon, Kansas, and Nebraska; and appointed Mr. J. R. Hogge of Amarillo to make an outline of the type of bill he thought would be best suited for Texas.

It was the concensus of opinion of those present that the growers of Texas would be willing to make a small contribution on the wheat they grow in order to finance and work out their own problems rather than ask the State Legislature for more taxes. The directors felt that by taxing themselves on

the wheat they grew the money could be used directly for solving the problems of the wheat growers in the State.

The attacks of greenbugs, cut worms, and mosaic root rot which practically eliminated the wheat crops in Texas in 1950-51 seemed to be the paramount research problems which need attention at this time.

The bill would probably ask each grower to contribute one-fourth of one per cent of the value of the wheat and this would be used to aid in solving research, marketing, and public relation problems as it relates to the growing of wheat. Since industry in general usually spends twenty times this amount on research alone it was felt by the group that no grower would object to the tax of ¼ of 1% of the value of the product.

The County Chaitman would appreciate the comments of the growers of the county concerning the varied reactions to legislation of this type.

# WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

**THE INAUGURATION:** The front of the National Capitol is taking on an entirely new look. The inaugural stands have been under construction for some time. This is quite an undertaking, as these stands spread completely across the front steps of the Capitol, and the seating facilities extend completely out to the edge of the original Capitol building, that is, the original building prior to the addition of the House and Senate wings. They cover a substantial part of the very wide streets and the parking area in front of the Capitol. Those of you who have visited Washington I am sure can visualize the tremendous extent of the temporary facilities that are built for inaugurations. There appears to be enough lumber being used to construct a sizable barn for all of the farms in a couple of Panhandle counties. All of this work is being done on the east side of the Capitol, which is the front of the Capitol. When the Capitol was originally built, it was con-

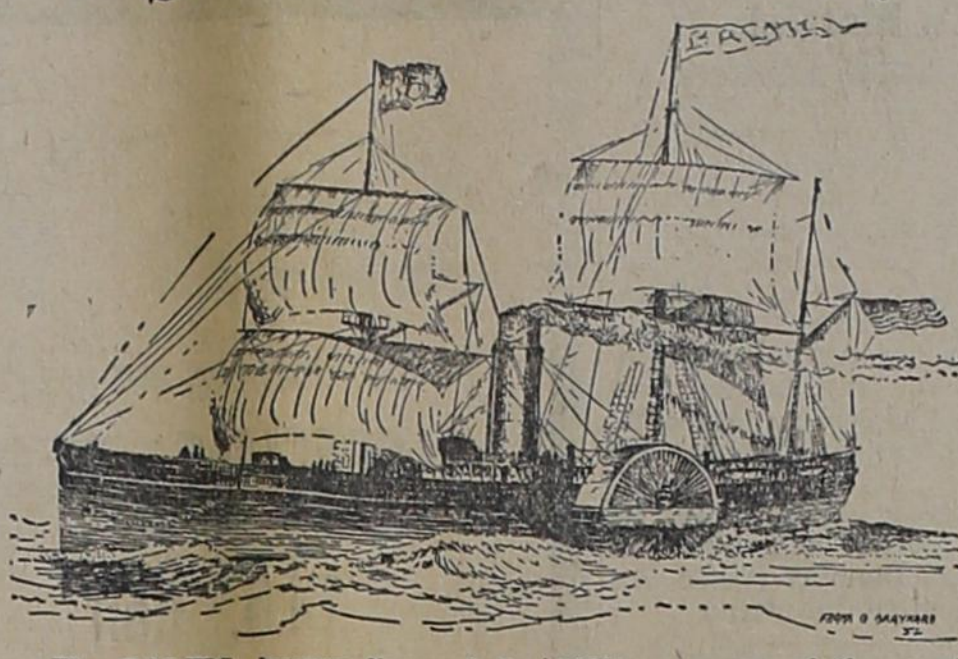
templated that the major portion of the business district of Washington would lie east of the Capitol and toward the Anacostia River. However, the story goes that most of the land in that section was bought up and quoted for resale at very high prices. The result was that the main business district of Washington was actually built behind the Capitol and to the West of it. The better residential district was also built in that direction. This section of Washington is known as the Northwest section. From downtown, from the Lincoln Memorial, from the Washington Monument, from the Jefferson Memorial, the tidal Basin, and practically all of the major government buildings including the White House, the view of the Capitol is not the front view, but the back view. The inaugural parade will extend through this section of Washington that lies behind the Capitol and west of it. Temporary seats have been built along the parade

route and are being sold at prices from \$3.00 to \$15.00. The tickets for the inaugural ball range in price from approximately \$12.50 per person to \$300.00 for a box. The members of Congress have been offered two tickets recently at a price of \$75.00 for the two. All of this adds up to the fact that the inauguration on January 20 will be most colorful. The cost of this operation is estimated at upwards of \$600,000.00.

**THE GATHINGS COMMITTEE:** This committee headed by Representative Gathings of Arkansas is conducting hearings concerning the type of programs on radio and television and the literature that is being sold on newsstands. The recent hearings have been concerning the literature that is being offered for sale, especially comic books and the pocket-size editions of novels. Some of these hearings have brought out very heated discussions between the committee and some publishers as to the suggestive import of the books. This suggestiveness is not confined to the title of the book nor to the reading matter inside, but it is illustrated by provocative and lurid pictures and thereby increase the sale of these books. It must be remembered that these books are not only for sale to adults, but are available to children of all ages for a very small purchase price. The problem posed in this field should be of great concern, not only to the parents in this country, but also to the publishers and the educators. I sincerely hope that the outstanding work that is being done by this committee headed by Congressman Gathings will have some beneficial result in awakening the people to the many dangers present.

**THE CHELF COMMITTEE:** The subcommittee of the Committee on the Judiciary investigating the Justice Department is headed by Congressman Frank Chelf of Kentucky. This committee has held some most interesting hearings and has brought out many important matters. The recent report of the Committee severely criticized the practices indulged by many government lawyers in what is known as fee splitting, that is, government lawyers taking part in private practice and also recommending certain law firms to people who were in trouble with the government. The Chelf Committee reports that in many instances gratuities have flowed to the government attorneys from the firms so recommended. This committee has done a fine job in digging out some of

## A Famous American Ship



The **BALTIC**, luxury liner of the 1850's was one of the most famous passenger liners ever built, according to the American Merchant Marine Institute. Only half the length of a modern oil tanker, the **BALTIC** and her three sisterships were the first to introduce steam heat afloat, an automatic bell-push system to call stewards, and a complete barber shop. She captured the Atlantic blue ribbon in 1852, being the last American steamship to break the speed record until the superliner **UNITED STATES**. She well justified her government building subsidy during the War Between the States as a naval auxiliary and as a transport. When her company's subsidy was withdrawn, the line collapsed and the trans-Atlantic passenger field was left virtually unopposed to the British. During her last decade of service, the **BALTIC'S** engines were removed and she became a member of fast passages as a sailing ship. She was built in 1850.

In this respect it should probably be said that matters between a government and one of its citizens should be completely and wholly clear of any question of favoritism or cloud of suspicion. The work of both of these committees will prove of great and permanent importance to the character, the morality and the integrity of the people of this country, unless these hearings are treated as temporary measures and the reports are pigeonholed and forgotten. The people themselves can prevent such a tragedy by demanding eternal vigilance in preventing repetition of the practices that have been uncovered.

### 5-Millionth Person Goes on Social Security Payroll

Mrs. Dolores Plaa, 23 year old San Rafael, California, widow, on December 4 became the 5-millionth person receiving monthly insurance payments under the social security law. Her children, Larry James, 4, and Michele Marie, 1, have joined 865,000 other youngsters receiving monthly survivors insurance payments.

Mrs. Plaa's husband, James P. Plaa, 30, a telephone line foreman, died November 17. His social security account includes credit for employment by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company and for service in the Navy in World War II.

The family will receive survivors benefits of \$168.90 each month from social security — \$68.30 monthly for Mrs. Plaa and \$52.80 for each child. Altogether, benefits paid the children alone

### Texas' Federal Polio Aid to be Curbed

Texas got a stern reminder of the financial pinch caused by its unprecedented polio outbreak when the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis scaled down emergency aid to state Chapters.

General Robert J. Smith, State Chairman for the 1953 March of Dimes, stated that the NFIP had to curb allotments because the record number of cases nationally had almost exhausted available funds.

He said the restriction in cash advances would prevail until the 1953 edition of the March of Dimes, which is exclusively the finances for the anti-polio activity.

"This does not mean that care will be curtailed for any patient needing help," said General Smith, who is president of the Pioneer Air Lines. "Pressing financial needs will be met, but hospitals will be requested to carry some polio care bills until money is available from the 1953 March of Dimes to be conducted January 2 thru the 31st."

The economy move, according to the General, was taken to insure all Chapters needing aid, a fair share of emergency funds until the end of the year.

Texas has been one of the main recipients of aid from the National Foundation, and this year has received more than one out of six dollars allocated by the NFIP for patient care.

"Under usual procedure," explained General Smith, "half of the March of Dimes funds are retained by chapters for local patient care, or, in emergencies, for supplementing national aid funds. The other half is remitted to the National Foundation for polio research, education, and the replenishment of chapter treasuries depleted by epidemics.

"Because of the increasingly heavy polio case load, Texas, for three years, has needed 100 per cent of the March of Dimes funds for patient care and thus has contributed nothing to research or education."

### Handel's Messiah At Hereford Sunday

The 18th annual presentation of Handel's Messiah will be held in the First Baptist Church at Hereford Sunday evening, December 14, at 7:30 o'clock. Singers from Amarillo, Dimmitt, Borger, Plainview and other towns will assist. The Amarillo Symphony Orchestra will play the accompaniments all under the direction of Mr. A. Clyde Roller from Amarillo.

Singers from Dimmitt will be Bennie Gollehon and Fawayre Murphy. All Dimmitt people are cordially invited to attend.

### LUBBOCK

The City of Lubbock's auditorium-coliseum committee Tuesday selected a site on the Texas Tech campus to build a \$1,750,000 auditorium-coliseum.

The committee's recommendation must be approved by the Lubbock City Commission, which decides when the three-block, 12,000-seat structure will be constructed. Tech's board of directors offered the city an area west of the Clifford B. and Audrey Jones Stadium on the north side of the campus. The committee is recommending to the City Commission to accept the site.

Lubbock citizens voted seven years ago on a \$1,750,000 bond issue for a combination auditorium-coliseum. The proposal dropped shortly after the bonds were voted, and was only recently pushed again.

As visualized by architects, the structures would join each other, adjacent to a proposed new freeway connecting 19th and 4th Streets. They would have a frontage of almost 900 feet—or three blocks. The coliseum would seat about 12,000 persons, and the auditorium would accommodate 4,000 or more and be suitable for the highest quality entertainment. Construction on the freeway is expected to start early in 1953.

The coliseum-auditorium would be owned and operated by the city, Tech paying set fees for its use.

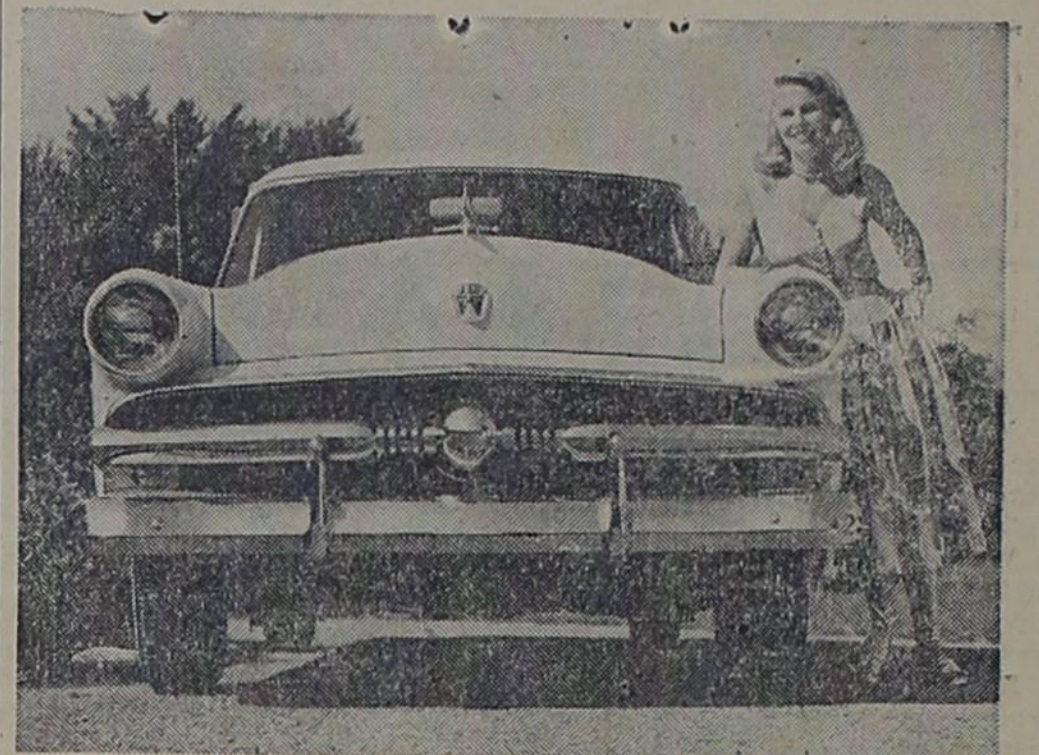

### Care Urged for Respiratory Disease

Carelessness in the treatment of respiratory disease is not only foolish but very hazardous, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who warned Texans today to be on guard against such illness as lead to pneumonia.

Dr. Cox pointed out that pneumonia can and does strike with little warning, and in many instances its forerunner is a simple cold, an attack of influenza, or some other respiratory infection.

"A cold or any other infection of the breathing passage which makes one constitutionally weak, especially if accompanied by fever, demands the immediate attention of the family physician, Dr. Cox said. "To self-treatment and fight on one's feet a condition of this kind is to endanger life unnecessarily. It is advisable to take all possible steps to avoid respiratory illness since they so frequently lead to that most dangerous complication—pneumonia.

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that it is important to build up normal physical resistance by sufficient

indoor ventilation, adequate, nourishing food, outdoor exercise, and sufficient sleep, but added that the family physician should be called immediately if, in spite of such care, a respiratory illness develops.

"Guard against pneumonia which is a communicable disease," Dr. Cox urged. "It may be acquired by direct or indirect contact with pneumonia patient. Reduced bodily resistance resulting from habitual disregard for normal physical requirements makes pneumonia doubly hazardous," he added, "and I cannot emphasize too strongly the importance of consulting a physician immediately upon the appearance of a respiratory ailment."

1 lb. Graham crackers  
1 large can evaporated milk  
½ lb. marshmallows  
1 lb. chopped pecans  
1 lb. pitted dates  
1 lb. raisins  
1 lb. candied fruits  
¼ lb. citron (if desired)

Roll Graham crackers and mix with milk. Add other ingredients. Press in deep mold. Let stand in refrigerator for 3 or 4 days.

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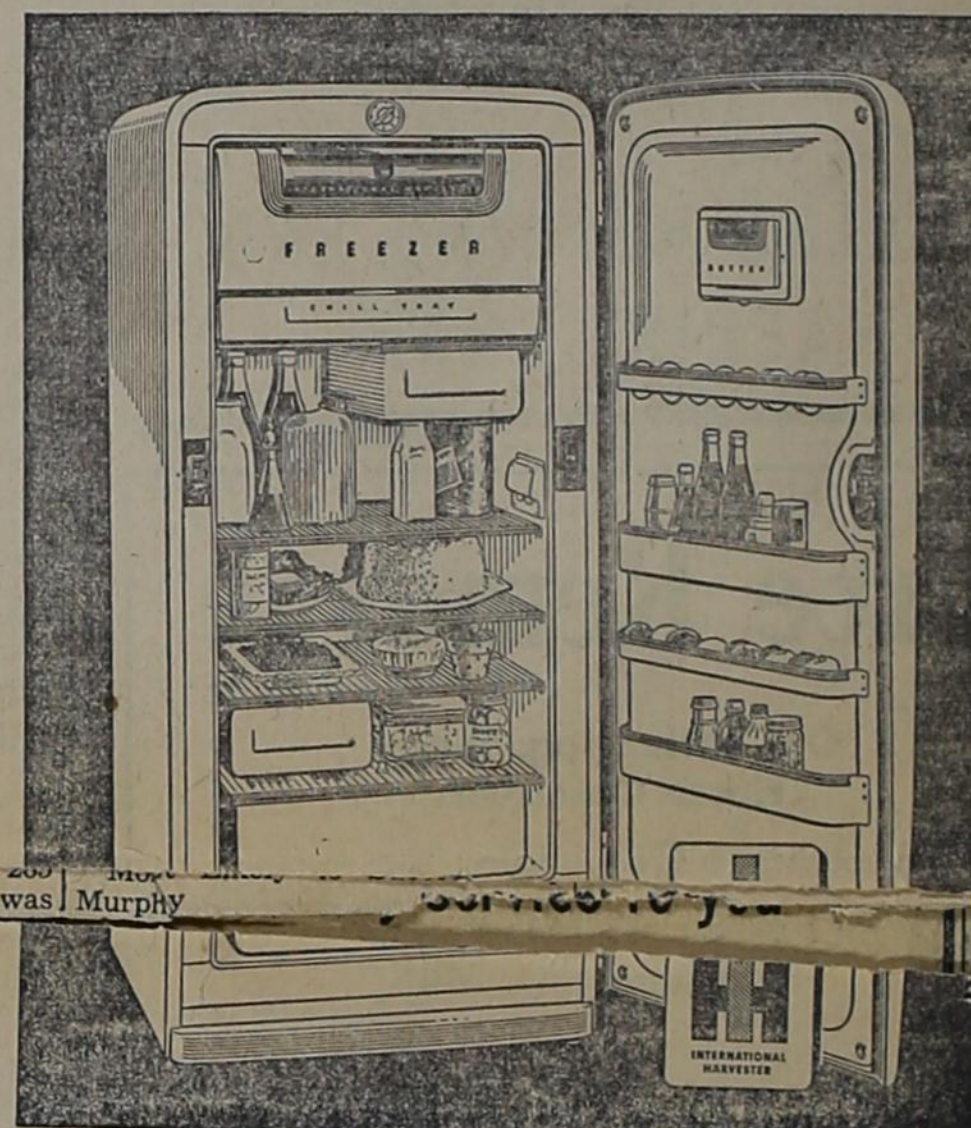
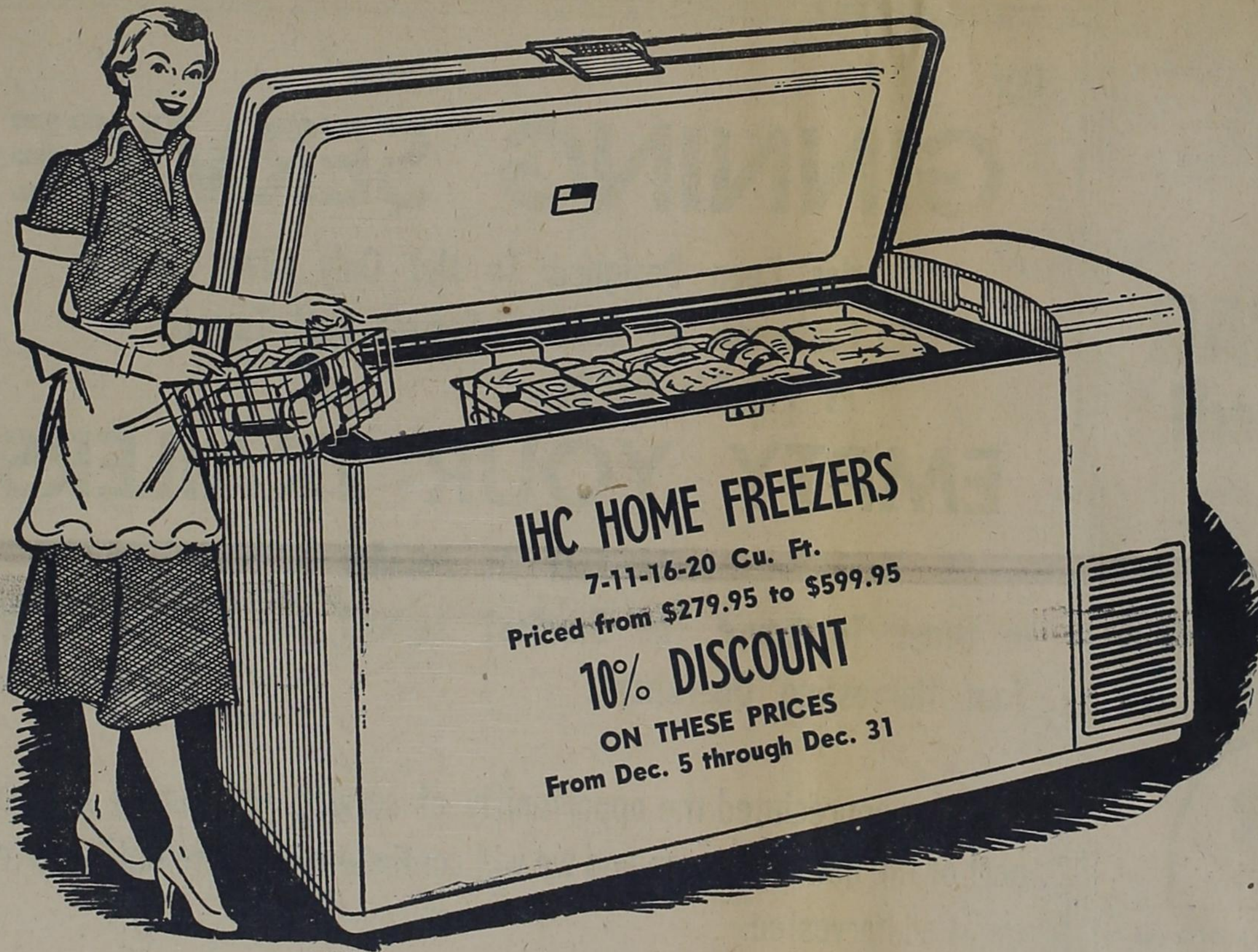
